Obituaries

G.G. (Graeme) Coull

Graeme Coull, who died in Christchurch on October 1, 2004, gave nearly two decades of playing service to the St Albans Cricket Club from the mid-1940s to the mid-1960s, and from then onwards became an ardent and supportive friend of the club.

Graeme came straight from Christ's College, playing a few games in the club's second grade side before being selected in the senior side, where he enjoyed a successful career between 1946-1959. During this span of 13 years Graeme played 59 games, scoring 1704 runs at an average of 22.13. He had a top score of 109 not out. He also complemented his batting with many spells of timely medium pace bowling, taking 47 wickets.

The tall, ginger-haired, beautifully spoken, elegant batsman soon started to be noticed by the Canterbury selectors, particularly after a successful stint in a number of games as the New Zealand Universities' captain. In the summer of 1954/55 he made his Plunket Shield debut for Canterbury. Although Graeme's Canterbury career spanned eight summers he only played eight matches, managing 162 runs and seven wickets.

Graeme was a stock and station agent and lived a lengthy period in Hawarden, and as a consequence his cricketing availability and longevity was not as long as the club would have liked.

Graeme was a popular member of the club and will be sadly missed by all those that knew him. He is survived by his wife Anna and three siblings.

R.G. (Bob) Condliffe

During the last year cricket and our club, specifically, lost one of its most colourful and jovial characters, Bob Condliffe.

Bob was never short of a good story to tell you and he had an entertaining way of keeping those listening captivated.

Bob only played for the club for two seasons, however in his first (1945/46), as well as playing, he responded to a call to fill the vacancy of club secretary. He held this post for one year and in this time showed himself to be a very good administrator.

Bob was a competent left-handed batsman and accomplished wicket-keeper with a penchant for standing up to those with some pace.

He had a top score of 55 in a modest total of runs and snaffled 15 dismissals in his 20 senior games with St Albans. Bob did get to play one game for a Canterbury XI against an Ashburton side in 1946.

Once Bob retired from playing the game he then pursued his dream of one day umpiring in first-class cricket, which he achieved, going on to be a very popular and respected member of the Canterbury Cricket Umpires Association.

Bob was also a very good rugby referee and lawn bowler. He also had a spell on the Canterbury Cricket selection panel and, by all accounts, was a thoughtful, considered and knowledgeable member of this panel.

Bob, or as he was affectionately known in his later years, "Captain Mannering", will be sadly missed.

President's Report

On behalf of your executive and committee, I have much pleasure in presenting the Annual Report and Accounts for the 2004/05 season, the 100th in the club's history.

Well, what can one say? A season that was SIMPLY THE BEST and, as Tina Turner would also add, better than all the rest.

Right from the Annual General Meeting, held at the Robbie's on Riccarton Bar and Bistro meeting room in early August, through to the CCA prize-giving function in the middle of April, the club had many sublime moments of triumph, paroxysms of delight and a myriad of dazzling and historic milestones and achievements.

Enveloping the whole season was of course the club's centennial activities and celebrations. These acted as a catalyst and driving force for all the members and supporters, and I believe ultimately helped keep the focus on our primary objective - to win as many grades as we could - while enjoying the great game of cricket. A special section in the middle of this book has been devoted to the very successful and pleasurable activities and events this centennial generated.

On the playing front the season started with the time-honoured six week get-together at the CCA indoor centre for pre-season training and the scrutiny of the many newcomers. Peter Mayell, the convener of the senior selection panel, was obviously very happy with his winter recruitment and the subsequent turnout, to comment "I think there's going to be some real stiff competition for places this year". How well did his words ring true, as the club fielded three very competitive morning grade sides.

The backroom boys had also done their part, securing the services of Ryan Watson, a player/coach of Zimbabwe descent but now living and plying his trade as a professional cricketer in and for Scotland. We welcomed Ryan and his new wife Lisa to Christchurch in October and both quickly became integral parts of the club.

Ryan also had an outstanding season on the field, just being pipped for the CCA Club Player of the Year award. His 600 runs, 40 wickets and 15 catches was a super return, in what was really an incomplete season. Ryan missed four playing days as he had been granted a late start due to his wedding and then took a two-week break in November to represent Scotland in the ICC Intercontinental Cup finals for second-

tier cricketing countries in Dubai. Ryan starred for the victorious Scots, passing 50 in all three of his innings as well as taking seven wickets.

Ryan and Lisa's personalities and friendly dispositions quickly endeared themselves to the club members. At the time of writing we are hopeful that they may return, but national selection for Scotland may preclude this.

As well as securing the overseas player other appointments and key personnel were sought and put in place. They included Stu McCullum for his second year as the senior women's coach and Mike Dickie as our club's first reserve women's coach. On the men's side Kelvin Scott was appointed captain/coach/selector of the second grade team and Andrew Bailey was appointed coach of the third grade team.

Robbie's on Riccarton, although under new ownership, quickly confirmed that they would again be on board as the club's sponsors. Other funding avenues were also sourced and we were lucky to gain possession of the same rental property that we had had the previous summer. This was well utilised by Ryan and Lisa, Nigel Tubb and two young amateur cricketers from England, James Hawley and Jonathan Miles, who had arrived for a season with the club.

Opening day duly arrived and the Oval looked a picture with the trees in full blossom. The Upper Valley side from Wellington was playing a composite men's side from the club on Hagley 4, a game which we ultimately won by one wicket thanks to an exhilarating century from Michael Davidson.

The weather, which was to be dull, cold and cloudy until Christmas, was actually brilliantly fine and warm - no knee-jerk panic about what to do if the day was wet ... thank goodness!

The nets were in full use and at 3.30pm the Mayor of Christchurch, Garry Moore, arrived to officially open the Centennial season, just as one of his predecessors did at the 50th jubilee in 1954, and also at our very first opening day in 1905, 100 years ago.

Instead of shrugging and sounding quite maudlin the two club captains, Tony Falloon and Kay Houlston, were in upbeat moods. The BIG season was about to get underway.

The club entered eight men's sides and seven women's and girls teams. The only grade we didn't have a presence in was the men's

fifth grade. We started the season with all guns blazing and finished with all our guns still blazing, such was the enormity of the success that our club enjoyed. To win six grades, come second in six more, third in two others and thus again earn the symbol of overall club supremacy, the prestigious Petersen Shield, was an outstanding achievement by the club. It was indeed a vintage year - everybody stand up and take a bow.

Congratulations must go to the Premier men's side under the captaincy of Stephen Cunis and Aaron Johnstone, who led for most of the season but only clinched victory on the last day of the summer. To win the inaugural CCA Metropolitan six-team Premier competition in the centennial year (emulating the win in the 50th jubilee year) was a great effort and outstanding historical milestone. The right old hullabaloo that was heard, after the last ball had been bowled, showed overwhelming euphoria, pride, team unity and celebratory relief. An oenophile might say that there is plenty of 'bottle age' left in this team.

Second grade, under the leadership of Kelvin Scott, also had good reason to be in celebratory mood. The club had not enjoyed second grade success for 11 years, and the margin that this win was achieved by showed what a good team effort can achieve. This side is usually a 'railway station' due to the number of top level players that our Premier side has and the resulting changing of the team due to representative selectors' whims, injuries and other unforeseen unavailabilities. Well done guys.

When one has a team of individuals that the 4Bs do, it is hard to think of anything else other than success. However strong the team sheet may look the job still needs to be done on the field. Tony Falloon is too shrewd to be lulled into any form of talked-up favouritism, as this team once again 'did the business' and won the grade title for the second time since the grade was re-introduced three seasons ago. Congratulations to all the 'BBBBs'.

Cricket is a game that both genders and all abilities and ages can play and enjoy. The next team that won a grade is one which embodies this ideal. Yep, the second grade women, surely one of the more visible teams in the club, under Mel Reid and Trudy Rolton's astute direction, won again for the second year in a row - unbeaten on the field of play, too. This team has unity, camaraderie and confidence plus more than just a wee bit of ability. Saints would be a lot poorer without this bunch of sociable, vocally stentorian players who are terrific after-

match and club function attendees. Great effort girls ... go get them again next summer.

Over the years the club has placed a good deal of time, expertise and coaching into ensuring that the secondary level girls (third grade) enjoy the game and develop as cricketers. Since third grade was re-instituted 13 years ago, St Albans sides have won silverware on eight occasions, and this season was no exception. Great effort girls, and congratulations to those girls who were given captaincy opportunities. Your team is the future of the women's side of the club, in particular the senior and first reserve sides of years to come. Thank you to Andrew Tahuhu, Murray Gain and Paul and Vicki Wilkinson-Baker for your efforts in helping manage the team and keep it focused and enthusiastic.

Finally, competition honours went to the club's fourth grade Senior Traditional girls team. Under the management of Neil Bennett these girls swept all before them. Throughout the season various challenges and targets were given to this team and by lifting the bar the girls have become a much better and very competitive team, both individually and as a unit. The fact they are a team of great trainers played no small part in this, too. Some of these girls will move up to the next grade in the coming season and I am confident that they will most certainly cope. Congratulations to all team members.

As well as those six teams that finished with silverware, the men's Premier side came second as beaten finalist in their one-day competition, the senior women came second in their two-day Trophy competition, while the third grade men, sixth grade 'A' men, President's grade men and fourth grade Junior Traditional girls all finished second.

As a point of interest, the club would have also won the third grade men's two-day competition and first reserve women's one-day competition had they each been playing in separate rather than combined one and two-day competitions.

The club has quite a few sponsors who we are indebted to for their continuing support of the club and as such I would like to take this opportunity to thank these companies.

Robbie's on Riccarton are the club's major sponsor and chief watering hole. To the new owners Andy and Jim Jacques, go our sincere thank you for your support and efforts.

Thanks also to Debbie Johnstone at Harcourt Vision Real Estate Bishopdale, the Eureka Trust through Graeme Parker and the Thai Orchid restaurant for their support of the club side which went to Auckland in April to represent the Canterbury province in the National Club Cricket Championships.

I should also pass on our thanks to the Christchurch City Council who acknowledged our centennial activities in a variety of ways, many that made savings for the club.

Finally to the two parent bodies that we ultimately answer to - New Zealand Cricket and Canterbury Cricket go our thanks and gratitude for your support. NZC specifically for ODI tickets and the CCA for, amongst other things, free indoor facilities prior to our Auckland trip as well as a very well engineered and timely cricket ball sponsorship.

Outside of the centennial events, high points of the season included the quiz night, which was again professionally run by Duane Pettet and Scott Mason, while the Christmas Party, end of season wind-up and the club prize-giving night were all well attended and seemed to be popularly received.

We as a club executive and committee have over the last few years moved away from organising a multitude of club events and social functions to concentrate on the core values of what we are all about. Of course this is not to say that we won't or have no inclination to introduce new ideas or pursue new ventures - indeed we welcome new ways of thinking.

The after-match socialising continues to be the glue which keeps the club's social fabric in good working order. Many preening popinjays have been overheard using the pavilion as their place to tell stories, address issues, espouse theories and generally vent their opinions and

ideas on topical cricketing issues. The bar continues to be a good source of revenue, and our thanks go to our barmaid Jules for her tolerant, personable and efficient manner.

The club continued with the popular 12-team, 6pm-start Tuesday night Twilight competition for business houses, social clubs and teams made up of friends. The competition was played in a good competitive but sociable atmosphere. The announcement of the results after each day's play were often a highlight and keenly looked-forward-to part of the evening. Thank you again to Kevin Snook who organised this part of the cricketing week.

The club once again used Robbie's on Riccarton as the venue for the prize-giving function. Held on the Tuesday just after Easter it again proved popular, with former Canterbury and New Zealand coach Denis Aberhart being the guest speaker and awards presenter. His entertaining and thoughtful speech was well received.

Nigel Tubb was announced as the club's player of the year. Nigel had an outstanding season in scoring 879 runs, including two centuries - the second of which came in the final game against Riccarton when the team was in a spot of bother, ultimately helping win that game and the competition.

The Peers Cup for efforts on and off the field went to Duane Pettet while Peter Mayell received the Personality of the Year award.

Andrew Cuttriss and Amanda Dickie were acknowledged as the club's two most promising players while Nigel Tubb and Amy Satterthwaite were rewarded as the club's two most improved players.

Several other milestones and achievements were recognised during the evening which about 100 club members applauded, laughed at or wiped tears from their eyes as the following recipients received their accolades and/or their rewards.

The renowned and acclaimed (or ill-famed) Rod McCurdy award this year went to the celebrated fourth grade 'A' player Ian Smith. Many appropriate occasions were highlighted, including a spectacular 'mounting' effort of a President's grade player fielding on the overlapping boundary.

The Gunna Award for claiming they were 'gunna do this' and 'gunna do that' many times during the season went to Andrew Bailey, while the

Stumbling Block award went to Graham Curgenven, who finished the season on 299 '4B' career dismissals.

The Noel Love Trophy which goes to the older St Albans member who shows outstanding enthusiasm, dedication, camaraderie and social interaction, both on and off the field was awarded to Selwyn Cox.

The King Hit champion for the most sixes went to Matt Sutherland with 21 sixes. The various economical bowling awards went to Kelvin Scott (10 overs, 10-4-14-4), Alice Forbes (9 overs, 9-4-7-1), Jason Guest (8 overs men's, 8-6-3-1) and Trudy Rolton (8 overs women's, 8-3-6-1).

Pat Gallagher had the dubious distinction of having the most runs (25) hit by opposition batsmen from one of his overs, while Mike Satterthwaite (23 runs coming from three sixes, one four and one single) claimed the prize for most runs off one over as a batsman.

The ignominious "Ducks Galore" trophy went to David O'Meara and Chris McFarlin with five each.

Club members were again proud to hear that Chris Harris and Chris Martin were still wearing New Zealand colours. However, Harry's time on the park was cut short by a serious injury which occurred on Australian soil in the early part of the summer and subsequently ruled him out of all cricket for the remainder of the season. We will be waiting and watching over the 2005 winter to see if Chris can regain his fitness and his cricketing prowess to once again press for selection.

Chris Martin continued to soldier away with the new ball, mostly in trying conditions and against outstanding opposition (namely, the Australians). He duly got his reward with wickets against the Sri Lankans in the latter part of the season. In the second Test at Wellington Chris took 6-54, which is now the top bowling figures for any New Zealander against Sri Lanka. Great efforts Chris, the club is proud of you.

On the women's front, Sarah Burke, Amanda Green and Beth McNeill all wore the New Zealand strip during the summer. However only Sarah was selected for the World Cup in South Africa in March, a tournament which saw New Zealand bundled out in the semi-finals by India. Australia went on to win its semi-final and then it beat India quite convincingly in the final. Well done girls, our club has a proud tradition of New Zealand selections - your efforts help keep this tradition alive.

Complementing this group of New Zealand players was another large assemblage of club members who, through their abilities, gained selection in various CCA men's, women's and girls' representative teams during the summer. These names are listed in the respective club captain's reports, however it is always encouraging to see so many from our club be accorded this extra honour. We, as a club, endeavour to nurture a supportive environment for representative selection and the large number of members who do gain selection are firm testimony of this working well.

At the CCA prize-giving night in mid-April, the club was obviously well represented due to the large number of grades we won. However, a group of four club members also received individual awards for achievements and success attained during the season.

Firstly, Aaron Johnstone received the Chattel Hayes Memorial Trophy for making the most wicket-keeping dismissals in Premier men's two-day Trophy matches with 27, while Ryan Watson won the Stephen Lester Memorial Trophy for taking the most wickets in the Trophy competition with 34.

Amy Satterthwaite was selected as the recipient of the Trish McKelvey Trophy giving to the Most Valuable Player at the national women's development tournament.

Finally, Trevor Thornton, one of the club's President's Grade squad members, won the newly instigated secondary schools coach of the year award, after his work with the Christchurch Boys' High School Under-15 A team during the season. Well done to the four of you.

I believe that the last 12 months have been one of the busiest in the club's history. What with trying to organise an overseas professional player/coach, four to five other coaches, some amateur players (plus accommodation for all), the centennial, the regular Tuesday Twilight competition, club finals day, putting together a team to represent the club at the National Club Championships in Auckland (and funding it), to the final wrap-up of the end of season do and two prize-giving nights, the committee has worked tirelessly on your behalf.

Much of the work is done away from the usual scrutiny of the membership and is, on the whole, taken for granted. Those that put their name forward to serve on your behalf do so as volunteers. Their reward is not monetary but the satisfaction that the club continues to build and improve and, with it, continues to be ranked up in the top 10 cricket clubs in New Zealand.

The current committee and executive take cognisance of the various social and health and safety responsibilities that are constantly being put before us by the many government or city council agencies. We endeavour to work to, and have, best practice strategies and goals. We hope that our reputation is sufficiently high that we can continue to be a role model cricket club.

As well as the many representative players that the club has, we also have a large group of people from the wider St Albans family of current or former players and administrators who give untiringly of their time, expertise and experience to help the sport in a plethora of leadership and supporting roles.

Among these are: Stephen Boock, currently a NZC board member; Catherine Campbell is employed by NZC to run women's cricket; Mike Satterthwaite is on the CCA board; Kirsty Flavell is currently the Canterbury women's first XI coach; Vicki Burt holds a full-time role at Canterbury Cricket; Mike Dickie coached a Christchurch under-17 women's team; Vicki Wilkinson-Baker was a manager of a Christchurch under-14 girls team; and finally Pierre Flavell who, up until a month ago, was employed full-time by the CCA as their marketing and funding manager.

Another group are on various advisory committees that the CCA have. Peter Mayell is on the Club Cricket Advisory Group, while Beth McNeill, Graeme Craigie and Alan Jamieson serve on the Women's Advisory Group.

Mark Ogier continues to give the CCA the benefit of his scoring expertise, while in the media we still have John Coffey, Marg Francis and Paul Rutledge reporting and commentating on the game.

The club also has a large contingent of volunteers, who work unflinchingly and who have endless energy, and without wanting to single out anybody in particular, in case I miss someone, I would however like to thank you most sincerely for your efforts.

During last summer Graeme Craigie, who has been the organising face of the under-14 girls section of the club, had a tragedy in his personal life with the passing of his wife June. This and other things had a detrimental effect on Graeme's health and, as a consequence, Graeme reluctantly needed to relinquish this position. We wish Graeme well, and hope that we continue to see him at the club some time in the future. His two daughters, Rebecca (who coached an under-14 girls

team) and Caitlin (who played in the third grade girls team), continued their association with the club.

These sad circumstances created a vacuum for a wee while, but after a period of time a number of the parents and Nicola Payne, who stepped into Graeme's position, rallied around and we saw the season out in a relatively normal fashion. Thank you to everyone for your help over this time.

Eleanor Horne, continued with her catering role, which she has been doing now for some time, and has a regular and loyal patronage.

Mark Ogier, although with changing circumstances, kept the Premier men's scorebook up to its usual high standards. Mark has indicated that he will not be available to score next season, due to family and work commitments.

To Tom O'Carroll, our groundsman, thank you for your efforts during the summer. Your job is not an easy one, with something over 350 bosses on any given Saturday. Michael Davidson, from the Premier men's side, was lucky enough to secure the assistant's job at Hagley for the summer and I'm sure that this helped build a rapport with the groundstaff that we haven't had since the days of Garry Walklin.

Last summer saw the first season of the new-look, renamed first grade competition that was controversially put in place. The top six sides that qualified in the new Premier grade were East Christchurch Shirley, St Albans, Riccarton, Sydenham, Lancaster Park Woolston and the recently merged club Old Boys Collegians (formerly High School Old Boys and Old Collegians).

The unlucky clubs, Burnside West Christchurch University and Marist, both played in a combined competition with six suburban clubs under the banner of first grade. Marist won this grade and will take Sydenham's position in Premiers as they were relegated as the sixth placed side.

This format has been agreed to for two summers and then a review will be undertaken to see what might happen for future seasons. Whilst the club had a "bob each way" when it came to supporting the new format, I personally felt it worked OK. Perhaps a bit of fine tuning for next summer might be in order and, to that end, the CCA have asked for submissions and sent a questionnaire for the captains and coaches to express their own opinions.

I do have sympathy with the clubs that end up playing in the first grade competition and I would hope that some sort of accommodation can be reached for these clubs. Alternatively, these clubs should look seriously at a merger or amalgamation, as this may be the only lifeline available in the long term.

Like all good winning runs, there will be a time when the continuity of stable, reliable and dedicated management will come to an end and a changing of the guard is partially undertaken. While you read this report, you will probably be unaware that several of our long-serving and loyal office holders and volunteers will have served notice that they will be retiring from, or be unavailable for, next season's management committee.

As such I would like to pass some comments on a few selected hard-working and dedicated individuals - our club owes a lot to them.

Firstly we have Selwyn Cox, who without a doubt has been an outstanding bar manager and committee person for nigh on 30 years. Selwyn has advised the club that he has finally served his last beer, carried his last crate (and keg) up the stairs and has trudged the aisles of the liquor outlets looking for the best deals he can find for the last time.

Club members will not be aware that Coxy spends many hours making purchases, stocking the fridges, doing stocktakes, filling gas bottles, organising ice, keeping the bar tabs up to date as well as trying to collect payment and, finally, organising bar staff and cleaning when needed. Much of this is done during the hours before 6am. By my count Selwyn has been in charge of the bar operations, which has netted the club in excess of \$135,000 over a period of 28 years.

Made a life member in 2001, Selwyn's behind the scenes management of hospitality issues will be a very hard act to follow. To find someone these days who you can trust to do the job properly and who is scrupulously honest will be a big test for the club and will be one legacy that Selwyn leaves behind.

Selwyn was not only a bar manager, but a very dedicated committeeman as well. Not one with a hidden agenda or profile to keep prominent, he often said very little at meetings but when he did it would be thoughtful and considered. Selwyn was often the champion of the underdog and was the moral backbone of the club. If he didn't think it was right, he told you so.

Thank you Selwyn, for your loyalty and commitment. Remember that now you have been freed up from club duties, a couple of big seasons with the bat in President's grade beckons.

Lorraine Stewart (Selwyn's better half) has also advised the club that, after six years as the club secretary, she too will not be standing for re-election. This has been Lorraine's second stint on the committee, after two summers as the women's club captain in the mid-1990s.

Lorraine, who took over from the legendary Eleanor Horne in 1999, has carried out the role and its duties in a very professional and accurate way. Everything was always up to date and nothing seemed to stress Lorraine. Her minutes and correspondence were always well constructed and concise, with one of her strengths being able to judge the occasion and choosing the right words when it came to putting pen to paper.

Thank you Lorraine, for your contributions, you will now have more time for sunbathing and/or reading. Hope to see you often during the summer.

Back in May 2002, when Errol Saunders, the women's club captain of the day, bade goodbye to the club, I had fears that this position would be very hard to fill with an appropriate person. I had asked several of the more senior women's members in the club and all had turned it down. Finally, after a bit of badgering, some arm-twisting and a couple of meetings with Mum and Dad, a shy medium pacer named Kay Houliston finally gave in and said "I'll do it ... but only for two years". I'm really pleased that Kay stayed on an extra year (her third) and fulfilled the role over last season's centennial summer.

Kay has signalled that golf may be on the offing, but I'm quite sure that there are still one or two unsuspecting opposition batsmen still prepared to be a Houlston victim, whether it be in serious or social cricket. Thank you Kay, you have been a rock which I could rely on.

Finally there is Mark Ogier, who has been the senior men's scorer for the last seven seasons and has intimated that, for the time being, he is putting away the pens and turn his attention to other activities.

Over the years Mark has beavered away in the hot sunshine, often with little thanks or recognition, and I think it would be fair to say has on occasions been taken a wee bit for granted. It's only when Mark has been away that one truly recognises his real worth to the senior men's side. His neatness, accuracy, ability to complete individual scoring charts and other player requests all at once, whilst also answering the continuous phone calls seeking the score, stood him out as a person who could perform well under pressure.

Over the years Mark's ability has been recognised by Canterbury Cricket, and he has scored many significant games at the Test and representative venues around the region. Our club has been lucky over the years to have had a succession of top scorers and now the challenge will be to find the next one. If he/she is as half as competent as Mark has been, we will be well served.

A good team man and friend to all those that play Premiers, Mark's genial demeanour and cricketing knowledge will be missed. Thank you Mark, I hope that we will get a few President's grade games out of you. After all, as you have said many times, "I do score more runs than anybody else in the club each season" - heaven knows that the President's grade team might need some of those!

There may also be others on the committee that will decide in the next week or so to also take a break from club administration. Thank you one and all for your efforts over the last 12 months.

Like those that have had many summers on the executive or committee, we hope that this may not be the end of your "innings", and that at some time in the future you may well decide to have a "second innings".

The club held 11 committee meetings throughout the year, and at the time of writing this report only one further meeting has been scheduled. The attendance register is provided for your interest.

The 19 centuries scored is well above the average of 13 over the last 30 seasons and represents a welcome return to normality after an especially lean 2003/04 season, when only seven were scored. Only four of the last 30 seasons have exceeded this number of tons, with the record of 23 being scored in 1993/94 and 2002/03.

However there was a record low of seven six-wicket bags, beating the previous worst of nine in 2002/03. This is well under the average of 17 six-wicket hauls over the last 30 years and is only a quarter that of the record of 28 in the 1988/89 season.

Well done to Matt Sutherland and Kadion McDonald for topping the best batting and bowling performance tables respectively.

Matt's 201 not out is his second double century for the club, remarkably equalling the career-best score he first achieved in 2001/02. They are the only double tons scored by any player for the club in the last 49 years. It also keeps up his run of having one innings of over 150 in each of the last four seasons, topping the club's season batting charts on three of those occasions.

Kadion's 8-26 is her St Albans career-best figures, bettering the 5-32 she took for the first reserve grade side last season.

St Albans 100 Not Out

For most people reading this annual report the fact that the club celebrated its centennial during the season is now consigned to history and now that the back-slapping and hype of the tremendously successful events have subsided, our thoughts quite rightly turn to the future.

However, the season review would be incomplete if the centennial celebrations and activities were not well documented and all the people who were associated with them were not only lauded and thanked but the whole historical occasion and milestone is also given some pre-eminence.

It was in November 2003 that the first serious discussions were held, by the then committee of the day, regarding the club centennial which we knew was fast approaching. Specifically, what would we do, who was going to do it, when would we do it and what might the cost be.

It was decided to spare former (and many of them older) members from the time-consuming organisation of such a mammoth undertaking and, as such, a small group from the current committee would be appointed to organise the celebrations. We wanted the older or former members to enjoy the celebrations, rather than be heavily involved with the day-to-day arrangements.

The following committee was chosen to decide the various events, funding, tracing and tracking down of former members, memorabilia, publicity and organisation on the days themselves. This committee was made of Alan Jamieson (chairman), Lindsay Serra, Selwyn Cox, Graham Curgenvin and Scott Mason. The other major decision was to have a short, six-month organisational focus, rather than meander along for a year or more doing bits and pieces here and there at a more sedate pace with no absolute driving force.

It would be fair to say that we had our moments. Not everybody agreed on everything and there were some compromises. However, everybody had the club's interests at heart and all wanted a successful, high profile, professionally organised and cost-efficient coterie of activities. The feedback which we received after the various activities and also since the season has finished, suggests that all these objectives were met. Great credit must be given to the organising committee for these successful outputs.

From the outset the committee wanted to have a four-day celebration.

Once we had decided to use the One-Day International between New Zealand and Australia at Jade Stadium on Tuesday, February 22 as our starting function, it didn't take long to settle on the remaining three days' events.

Friday (February 25) saw golf (at the Russley Golf Club) and bowls (at the Fendalton Bowling Club), followed in the evening by the Meet and Greet and announcement of the men's and women's teams of the century, also held at the Russley Golf Club. A big thanks to Bob Mather and Noel McGregor for their enthusiastic organisation of the golf and bowls tournaments respectively.

On the Saturday (February 26) we had our big club day, where all club teams played on Hagley Oval or the adjacent grounds of Hospital Corner, Polo Grounds and the Hagley Sports Centre ground, followed in the evening by the centennial gala dinner at Addington Raceway.

On the Sunday (February 27) the current senior men's and women's teams took on past club legends XIs in Twenty20 games on the Oval. They were followed by final speeches and the second address by our overseas speaker to conclude the festivities in the club pavilion.

For the record, the centennial bowls trophy was won by Alan Bailey, while the centennial golf trophy went to Phil Eyles. The Twenty20 games were won by both the current men's and women's sides, though both were very close matches - I suspect a bit of manipulation about them!

The biggest and most difficult job was trying to track down former members and, in the end, we had about 1000 accurate addresses to work off - from about 3000 names which we started with. So, you can see the massive mountain that we had to overcome. As such, we deliberately categorised people into six groupings, which we ranked in importance and potential of attending.

At the top of the list was all the players who had played for New Zealand or Canterbury. This was followed by all administrators and then, in descending order: former senior players, all other long-time members, the current membership not covered by the other grouping and finally anyone else who we could locate an address for.

Close on the heels of the search for addresses, for time and effort expended, was the commissioning of three appropriate speakers and emcees for the various functions. Obviously, this is an area where great care needs to be taken as we all know functions can be less than memorable if the speaker is poor or has inappropriate material. In the

main, I feel that we hit the green button with all of our selections and all four functions that had an element of formal discourse and entertainment about them were well received.

Firstly, we had the former Australian opening batsman Michael Slater as our guest during the lunch break at the ODI. Although relatively new on the public speaking circuit, he gave an entertaining insight and some opinions on his career, followed by some more serious comment on the current state of world cricket.

The celebrated duo of emcee Pete Smith and 1974 Commonwealth Games 10,000-metre gold medalist Dick Tayler entertained and “roasted” many current and former members at the Friday evening conversazione.

Our main overseas speaker was the former Australian and New South Wales opening bowler Geoff Lawson. His two commitments (the gala dinner and the drawing of stumps on the final day) were top drawer and exactly what the guests at the functions felt was appropriate for the occasion. In his two days with the club he quickly got the feel for the moment and, with his easygoing and friendly disposition, he quickly made himself at home. His demeanour was appreciated by all that came into contact with him. Thank you to Peter Mayell for looking after him during his stay.

Stephen Boock kindly made himself available to be the master of ceremonies at the gala dinner and, as we all know, his professionalism and presentation ensured those that may have slipped into the state of ennui were kept awake.

It is also pleasing to report that the whole centennial umbrella of events and all their costs were completed under budget, and a small surplus was made. Many, many thanks to the large number of people who gave donations. Some very generous ones were received. It was certainly these funds that helped take the pressure off and allowed the little extras or the over-budget functions to be brought into line but, more importantly, still presented in a grand and professional way. Suffice to say it also ensured that the centennial committee didn't have too many sleepless nights or develop any more grey hair.

Finally, I would just like to say how pleased we were with the support that we got for the various functions and activities. All four days were greeted with gloriously fine weather and you could not have asked for better climatic conditions. Sure, there were many members that could not make the celebrations and we had in excess of 150 apologies. There

were also five or six prominent former (and local) players who I was personally disappointed did not show any interest, however, that's life. The many hundreds that did show interest were well rewarded and I believe all enjoyed themselves.

Many old stories were retold and memories relived as those who had not had any contact with former team-mates for many years renewed acquaintances and friendships. About 20 came from overseas, about another 50 from around New Zealand, while the balance came from within the Canterbury province or locally. I am also pleased with the turnout of the women who also embraced the occasion with enthusiasm and vigour. It was an occasion for all to enjoy.

At the opening day function the mayor of the city, Mr Garry Moore, congratulated the club on reaching such a tremendous milestone in his speech and, with it, challenged the club to have one of the most successful seasons in the history of the club. Looking back, I think we could say "yes, Garry, we did".

Finally, I would take this opportunity to invite any who attended any of the centennial functions and are not current members, to not be strangers and we hope that you may take the opportunity to pop into the pavilion during the season and enjoy some club spirit and conviviality.

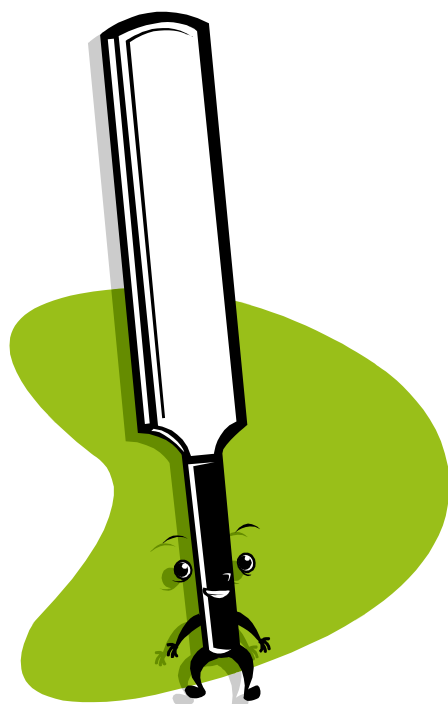

With St Albans celebrating its centennial this season the senior men's side, and the club as a whole, was expected to produce a bold showing. The team managed to achieve that, making the final of both the local one-day competition for the fourth straight year and the National Club Championships in Auckland. Unfortunately, we missed out on the spoils on both occasions but we did win the highly sought-after and hard-fought two-day championship title, after some last minute jitters in the final round against Riccarton.

This was the first season of the new six team Premier two-day men's competition and that, along with overseas professional Steven Knox not returning, the team headed into unfamiliar territory. However, with the solid core of experienced players from last season and a few promising new faces the team gelled well and put the performances together on the field.

The batting was well served this season, with new overseas pro Ryan Watson, Nigel Tubb and Michael Davidson providing solidity in the top order that St Albans had lacked in the last couple of seasons. Along with Stephen Cunis, Andrew Bailey and new recruit Carl Solomons, we never had the problem of falling behind the run rate.

Nigel Tubb was the best performed batsman having by far his best season at the club. In previous seasons he had a tendency to be reckless at times but found this season he could consistently perform while still maintaining his attacking stroke-play.

Ryan also proved invaluable and consistently performed well with both bat and ball during his first stint as a pro in New Zealand, as well as adding a great deal of experience when Stephen Cunis was away on representative duty.

As a bowling unit the side created its success by being able to tie most teams down and take wickets whilst doing so. Even with main strike bowlers Stephen Cunis, Chris Martin and Chris Harris away for long

periods, due to representative commitments or injury, St Albans proved it had good depth in the bowling department with Brad Smith, Andrew Bailey, Andrew Denford and English amateur Jonathan Miles once again proving they can consistently take senior wickets.

However, a large amount of the team's success was due to experienced spin bowlers Ryan Watson and James Ward. After figuring out early in the season many senior batsmen were not overly strong against accurate spin bowling they exploited this fact to good reward. Along with Sandy MacLeod and James Hawley we were never short of a quality spin option.

There were many highlights during an eventful season. The first was the early season win against a strong Old Boy Collegians side, where we chased down 230 off just 27 overs, on the back of solid performances from Nigel Tubb and Andrew Bailey.

Also, the final day against Riccarton where the two-day title was still on the line, and we managed to bat the best part of the day to secure the trophy, after being in a little trouble at the start of it. It was fair to say that the Lion Red proved to be popular that night!

The other major highlight was the performance of an inexperienced team that went away to Auckland for the National Club Cricket Championships and surprised even themselves with how well they performed. Standout performers were Andrew Denford and James Ward, while 16-year-old Ben Langrope showed he could be an exciting player to watch in the future. Thanks must go to Murray Griffin for the time he put in to organising the trip and a lot of the success achieved in Auckland can be attributed to Murray.

2004/05 National Club Cricket Championships

By winning the Christchurch one-day competition last season - for the second time in succession - the senior men qualified to take part in the end-of-season tournament hosted by the Cornwall Cricket Club in Auckland on April 5-10.

It was St Albans' third appearance at the event, having previously taken part in 1995/96 and also last season. Due to a remarkable number of unavailabilities the team took on a developmental look, with a number of players plucked up from the second grade team, mostly either yet to make their senior debuts or with only a small taste of Premier cricket under their belts. Just six members of the squad took part in the previous season's event and, of those, only James Ward was also present way back in 1995/96.

The full team was: Aaron Johnstone (captain), Kelvin Scott (vice-captain), Dean Anderson, Andrew Bailey, Rob Cooney, Andrew Cuttriss, Julian Danby, Michael Davidson, Richard Davidson, Andrew Denford, Ben Langrope, Liam O'Sullivan, James Ward, Murray Griffin (player/manager) and Duane Pettet (scorer).

The teams representing the other five provinces were: Howick Pakuranga (Auckland), Fraser Technical (Northern Districts - Hamilton), United (Central Districts - Palmerston North), North City (Wellington) and Green Island (Otago).

The worst fears of how competitive this new-look team might be came to the surface on the first morning as they slumped to 80/7 against Fraser Technical. However, a stunning all-round display from 16-year-old Ben Langrope righted the ship and set the scene for an extraordinary week for the unheralded St Albans team. Langrope smashed 61 off 69 balls batting at No. 9 and then took 3-28 with the ball to power Saints to what was, in the end, a resounding 65-run win.

The next game saw another newcomer to the fore, with second grader Andrew Cuttriss taking a wicket with his second ball on senior debut before adding two more in a captivating spell of 3-2 off four overs. Cuttriss joined forces with senior spinning pro James Ward, who continued his long-time love-affair with the Cornwall Park pitches by taking 4-19. The pair demolished the Howick Pakuranga middle and lower order, the Aucklanders losing their last seven wickets for 32. The Saints batsmen had no trouble polishing off the required runs with more than 20 overs in hand to make it two from two victories.

It was the turn of big-hitting Andrew Denford to make his mark on day three, belting a swashbuckling 77 off 59 balls on the largest of the three grounds against United. The Palmerston North side only briefly threatened to chase down Saints' total of 263/9 before Cuttriss starred again by taking three quick wickets to remove the middle order and effectively end the United challenge. With three wins in as many days, the other teams were taking notice and a final berth was within reach.

Arguably the finest day of the tournament for Saints came next as they pulled off a Houdini act against warm tournament favourites Green Island. Defending a moderate total, due largely to Julian Danby's gritty 75, Saints hung on grimly thanks to veteran pace bowler Murray Griffin's efforts against his former club and James Ward's amazing 10-over spell of 0-12. However, they looked down and out when the Dunedin side only needed 22 to win off the last four overs, with five wickets in hand. In an inspired move, captain Aaron Johnstone turned to part-time bowler Kelvin Scott. What followed was 17 balls of complete mayhem as Scott engineered a remarkable collapse, Green Island losing their last five wickets for nine runs. Saints the victors by 12 runs and delirious scenes followed (and which went on long into the night!) as a spot in the final was guaranteed.

The fifth match was the most lopsided of all, as St Albans massacred a tired, injured and generally disinterested North City team already keen to head back to Wellington. Nevertheless, Saints showed no mercy and took full advantage of this and the almost farcical dimensions of the No. 3 ground. Andrew Denford's 16-ball 50 was easily the highlight of the day. A little surprisingly, in a score of 397/9, the highest individual scorer only made 67 and the team's total was nowhere near the record on this ground! The comprehensive 288-run win sealed an perfect round-robin run and the satisfaction of qualifying top for the final.

Unfortunately, the final proved to be one match too many for the team. Batting first, Saints couldn't gather any momentum during their innings, unable to muster anything more than a modest total. The experienced Green Islanders timed their run perfectly, getting up for the game that mattered most, to professionally put away a flat St Albans side, despite some late jitters.

Despite the final disappointment a lot of positives could be drawn from the performance of the team in Auckland. Every member of the squad made a telling contribution at some stage during the campaign, and the newer members to the senior environment put their hands up for consideration for the Premier side in the coming season.

Finishing second was easily the best performance at this event for St Albans, having placed a dismal fifth in 1995/96 and sixth last year. The team came within a whisker of emulating the underdog-comes-good feat of the Otumoetai Cadets. The Tauranga-based side featured no big names but played as a tight team unit to win last year's title, having learnt their lesson from being repeatedly thrashed in games the year before.

Sadly, the Golden Lions will have to wait until at least 2007 to try and go one step further, as their loss in the Christchurch one-day final in March means East Christchurch Shirley will go to Auckland next season.

New season, new captain, new team - it was a step into the unknown. With no preconceptions things unexpectedly started with a hiss and a roar, winning our first two-dayer outright with five minutes to spare on the opening day of the season. Amazingly there were hat-tricks in both of the first two matches, both to left-arm spinners - Brad Eyre (on the first day, with his first three deliveries of the season!) and Matt Lawson.

They weren't to be the only outstanding individual feats for thirds this season, with the team holding its own on the club's batting and bowling leaderboards. The team's workhorses reaped appropriate rewards with Blair 'Boycott' Glover notching an unbeaten 131 against Parklands, Dave 'Latham' Guthrie a superb 7-21 against Burnside and Bryce 'AJ' Hackett swinging havoc against Sydenham with 6-22. Honourable mentions go to the one-man wrecking crews with bat in hand, Dan 'Flintoff' Johnston (a devastating 105 against Burnside, coming in at 14/3) and Michael Johns (a classy 84 against Sydenham, when at one stage we were 38/6).

Performances such as these spearheaded a great start to the season, culminating in a nine-point lead at the Christmas break. However, frequent secondments to second grade, unavailabilities and a few still suffering from a New Year's hangover led to a critical mid-season slump which we just couldn't quite climb out of in time. We eventually conceded the title to a deserving Lancaster Park Woolston side with two weeks left.

It's easy to think 'what if?' about pivotal moments during the season and wonder what might've been after such a great start, but we should be proud of our achievements nonetheless, especially considering it was a largely new squad which also had to withstand a high turnover of players (31 in all). Eight of these got the call-up to second grade and performed admirably when they received the opportunity in their winning campaign.

Third grade has always been a stumbling block for St Albans, now having gone 14 seasons without success, with our performance the equal best since 1990/91. In fact, had the grade's format been the same as that for Premiers and seconds, we would've won the two-day title by 3.44 points but, alas, in a combined competition our one-day cricket let us down.

Playing on uncovered pitches also added a slight luck factor to the equation, thanks to the vagaries of Christchurch's "summer" weather - though that evened itself out reasonably well across the whole season.

There were many enjoyable moments throughout the season including, but not restricted to, the much-maligned fielding prowess of Matt 'Jonty' Grenfell and yours truly, Andy 'Kobe' Bryant's nickname calls in the field, James 'Grover' Suter's hysterical appeals for leg before wicket, the sordid tales of Ash 'Tuffey' Blacknell's after-hours exploits and Michael 'Tin Roof' Johns' unique brand of 'sledging' that may not have found favour with a few opposition captains but rarely failed to put a smile on our faces.

Cheers guys, hope to see you all back again next summer - a top three position beckons.

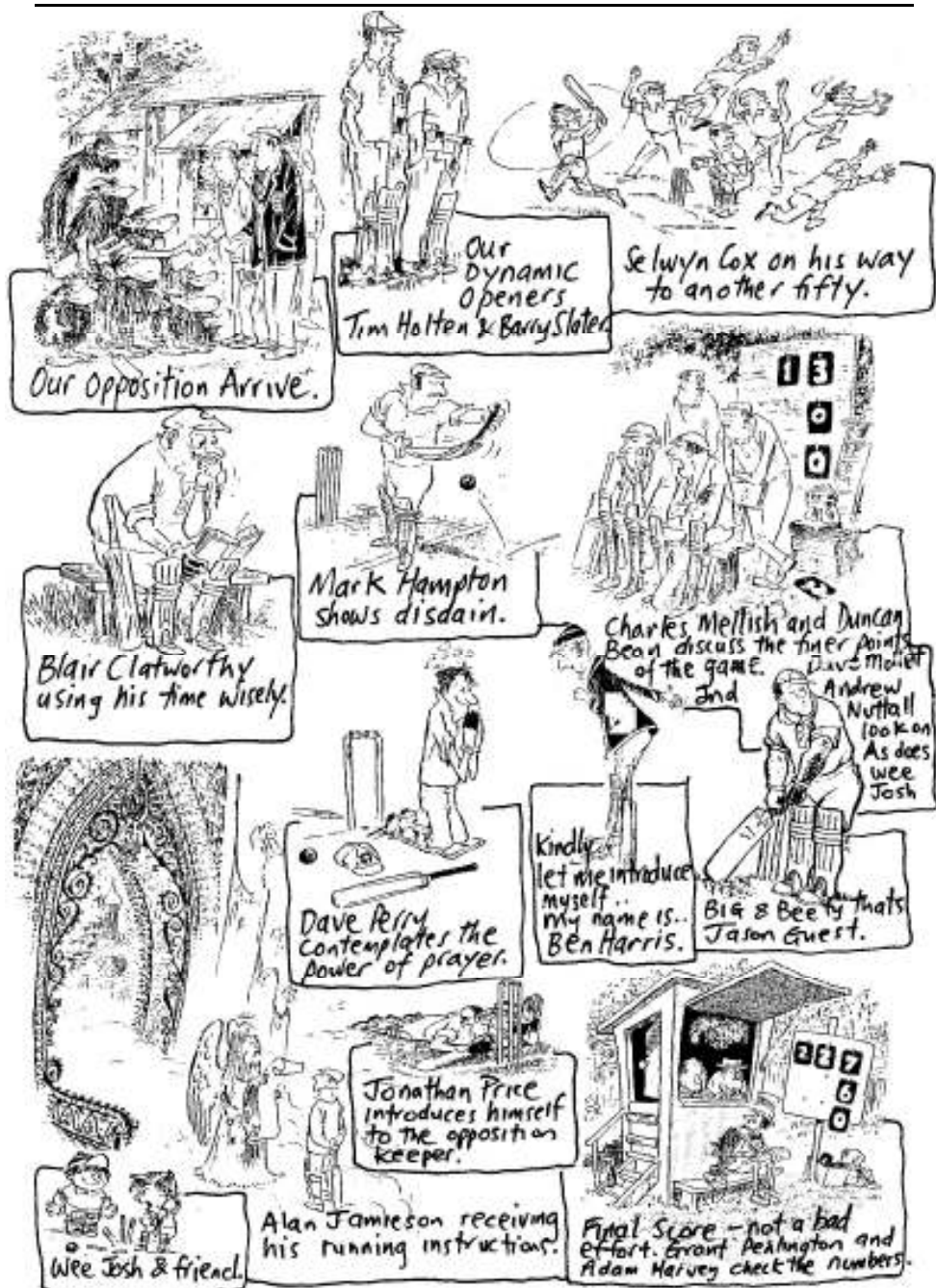

This summer the club entered three under-14 girls teams, in the beginners' grades of the women's competitions, one down on the 2003/04 season.

Following a survey of players by the Women's Advisory Group, the Canterbury Cricket Association decided to abandon the traditional playing of games at one central venue in favour of scheduling fixtures where possible on "home" pitches. At the women's cricket debrief of the season it will be interest to gauge the reaction this new initiative.

Team entries across the grades by the other clubs were a little disappointing and some serious promotion, or a major drive, is required by the CCA, in conjunction with the clubs to get more girls playing. Other sports spend good money and are energetic and single-minded in their initiatives to get the Primary and Intermediate school-aged girls to play their code. Cricket is being left behind and this will have a profound impact in the years ahead, unless something dramatic is done NOW.

On the home front our three teams performed admirably, with the Senior Traditional side winning its grade by an imposing 53 points. The Junior Traditional team finished a very creditable second. The Junior Average grade does not keep results or points, as the grade is designed to be a developmental and non-competitive introduction to the game. All girls get to bat (in pairs) for four overs, each facing an equal number of balls and later, when in the field, each girl gets to bowl several overs on rotation.

Junior Average

This is cricket as it should be played, with energy and enthusiasm being the hallmarks. This season the side managed to share the "victories and losses" with many of the games being very close affairs. Bowling styles varied considerably, but with the improvement over the summer dot balls became more common. The batting was always entertaining with many tip-and-run efforts challenging the fielding

team as they attempted to gain run outs. But in the main our “hares” beat the throws. All of the team were new to the game, and the encouragement of all the players to each other was great to see.

Well done to the girls for staying reasonably committed at practices, although numbers did drop off towards the end of the summer. The coach, Clare Forbes, was also particularly pleased to see good positive support from the parents who turned up each Saturday morning. Particular thanks to Donna Paterson and Wendy Robison for providing the organisation and transportation of gear, particularly in the post-Christmas period.

This year’s squad was as follows: Maddisen Bruhns, Abigail Robison, Taylor O’Brien-Smith, Rebecca Falconer, Kerri Paterson, Sophie Shamy and Emily Longdill. All the girls who were present at the end of season break-up and prize-giving were equally acknowledged as Most Improved players.

We started the season with some experienced players and some who were completely new to cricket. Despite this everyone was very enthusiastic right from the beginning, on and off the field.

They all tried hard to improve during the season - especially when chocolate was involved!

Our opposing teams consisted of a wide range of abilities, and unfortunately our higher standard of bowling was not always an advantage. However, we had some excellent wins and some narrow losses. Everybody improved their bowling, with the amount of extras decreasing and the number of wickets increasing, as the season went on.

Batting also improved, with the girls finding gaps and running more between the wickets. Many of our players achieved their highest score, with some of them retiring at the mandatory 30-run mark. Everyone was enthusiastic when fielding. It was great to see the team supporting each other and I think, at times, our opposition were surprised at just how noisy we could be!

The team was very social and I think this enhanced their enjoyment of the game. I would like to thank the girls for all the effort and cheerfulness they put into this season. The performance of four members of the team needs to be recorded in fuller detail. Going into the last week of the competition these four girls had batting averages over 50 which, given the innings only lasts 24 overs and they must retire at 30, are very good statistics.

This team deserves to be congratulated for the spirit in which they played the game and I hope they continue to play and enjoy their cricket in the future.

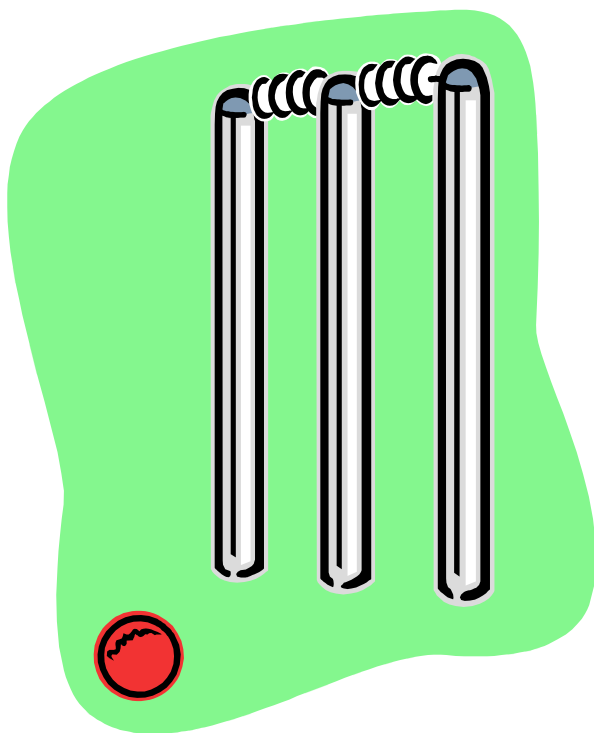
Conclusion

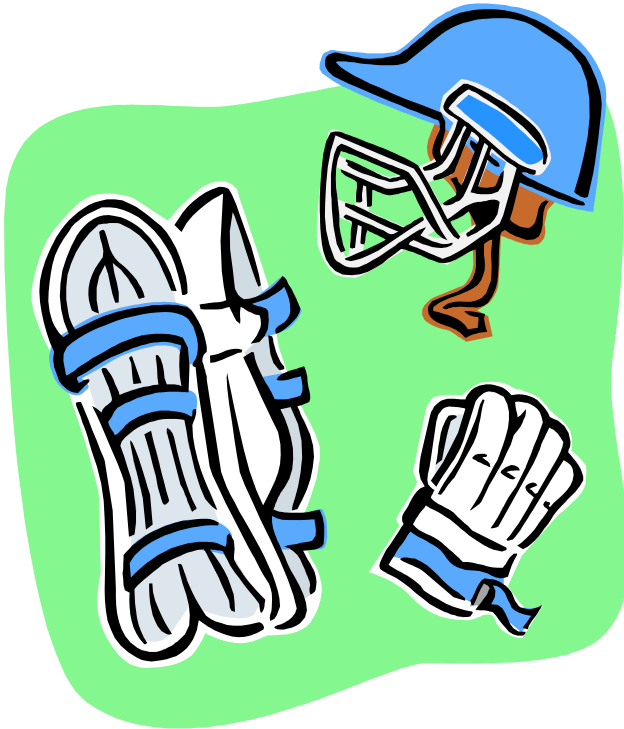

It is with regret that I must report to members a deficit for this year of \$9949.


It was not entirely unexpected that costs would increase over previous years given that we were undertaking centennial celebrations together with the pressures of our senior men's team performing in a new format competition.

We had to spend money to ensure both of these events were successful and this was accomplished. It will, however, always be a major objective of this club to avoid relegation from the Premier competition.

Although expenses were up over \$14,000 from the previous year several major expense areas will not occur again this coming season. Repairs to the pavilion, bank and credit card merchant fees, cricket ball purchases, playing gear and coaching costs should all be significantly down in this coming season. In addition, the Cornwall tournament was our most successful yet, but did not receive the fundraising support of earlier years.

In line with the general level of increasing costs and the need to provide excellent facilities for club members your committee has decided that subscription levels need to be increased this season.

Your committee has a tried and proven formula for managing the club's operations within its funding resources and I am confident that this coming year will see the club's finances revert to a small surplus again.

Notes to the Financial Statements

(for the year ended 31 May 2005)

Note 1 - Statement of Accounting Policies

St Albans Cricket Club is a non-profit organisation. The financial statements are general purpose and prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice.

Unless otherwise stated the accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of earnings and financial position on a historical cost basis have been followed.

The entity qualifies for differential reporting because the Club meets the framework for differential reporting as the Club is not publicly accountable and is small.

Changes in accounting policies:

There have been no changes in accounting policies which have been applied on bases consistent with those used in previous years.

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

Accounts Receivable are stated at their estimated realisable value. Debts which are considered uncollectible are written off. There is no other provision for doubtful debts.

Stock on Hand - Bar Supplies has been valued at cost.

Stock on Hand - Ties has been valued by the Committee.

Equipment on Hand has been valued by the Committee.

Fixed Assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation has been calculated using the rates shown in the Property, Plant and Equipment Schedule (Note 2). Material, Nets and Girls Material have not been depreciated as the committee charges to expenses all repairs and maintenance of the material.

A mortgage security over the pavilion is held by Westpac Banking Corporation. At 31 May 2005 there were no advances drawn against this security (2004 - nil).

Related Party transactions:

The Committee are also members of the Club and pay subscriptions on the same basis as other members. Services provided have been supplied on normal commercial terms.

AUDIT REPORT

We conducted our audit in accordance with New Zealand Auditing Standards. We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial report is free from material misstatements, whether caused by fraud or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial report.

Other than in our capacity as auditors we have no relationship with or interest in St Albans Cricket Club, other than one partner being an ordinary member of the Club.

Qualified Opinion

Control over the income for certain fund-raising activities and income from bar trading, prior to being recorded is limited and there are no practical audit procedures to determine the effect of this limited control.

In this respect alone we have not obtained all the information and explanations that we have required.

In our opinion:

- except for adjustments that might have been found necessary we have been able to obtain sufficient evidence concerning income from certain fundraising activities and income from bar trading;
- the financial statements fairly reflect the financial position of the entity as at 31 May 2005.

Our audit report was completed on 29 June 2005 and our qualified opinion is expressed as at that date.
