Obituaries

M.A. (Marg) Francis (née Alabaster)

It was with great shock and sadness when we heard the news that Marg Francis, the former St Albans senior women's wicket-keeper/batsman had died at the age of 58 after being stung by a wasp while gardening. A severe allergic reaction left Marg in a coma during February and life support was discontinued.

Marg was a stalwart and legend of the club, making 176 appearances for the senior women's team from her debut in the 1962/63 season until 1991/92, a fantastic record spanning four decades. In this time Marg scored 1644 runs and took 47 wickets, however it was her skills behind the stumps for which she was renowned. To this day her tally of 171 wicket-keeping dismissals stands as a club record for the Premier women.



Marg also captained the senior side in the 1983/84 summer to win the grade - the first title for the women's side since they amalgamated with the men some seven years earlier.

Marg represented Canterbury between 1971/72 and 1983/84 and holds the record for the most first-class dismissals for the province with 72 (45 catches, 27 stumpings).

After retiring from the game Marg became a selector, initially picking Canterbury teams. This was followed by a six-year spell on the New Zealand women's selection panel.

Marg also wrote knowledgeably about the game, being women's cricket correspondent for The Press for over 20 years. Marg's good way with words, thorough research and attention for detail made her an obvious choice to contribute a couple of historical chapters for the St Albans 75th jubilee book.

An honorary associate member of the club, Marg also served in many administrative or representative roles during her time at and for the club.

Marg was a no-nonsense type of person who had a deep love for children and their development. She was a very laconic and laid-back lady who was always a super host and fun to be around. She had an excellent organisational streak, being able to very easily talk others into helping out when required. Marg's contribution to women's cricket, not only at St Albans but in the province as well, cannot be underestimated - it was truly immense.

Many touching tributes were made at her funeral, which culminated with old team-mates forming a guard of honour with cricket bats as her coffin was carried to the hearse.

Marg is survived by husband Colin and sons Tim and Simon.

R.H. (Roy) Scott

Roy Hamilton Scott, who died in early August 2005 aged 88, joined the St Albans Cricket Club in 1936 after moving to the city from Clyde in Central Otago. Although he only played 22 senior matches for the club (over the period 1936/37-1940/41) he might have played more had World War II not intervened, necessitating clubs to band together due to reduced playing numbers.



Roy was encouraged to move to the combined West Christchurch/Old Boys club where he played another 28 matches. Once the war was over he joined Riccarton, where he played his remaining seasons. He was a cricketer who was beloved, especially by the younger enthusiasts. Strong of shoulder, he bowled at a lively pace, whipping the ball away sharply. He was also a very aggressive right-hand batsman. His signature shots were booming lofted off-drives and the straight-hit six.

For St Albans Roy scored 401 runs at 16.04 and took 44 wickets at 24.52. Roy played one Test for New Zealand against England at Lancaster Park in 1947. He also played 20 matches for Canterbury, having his first taste of provincial cricket in the 1940/41 season when still playing at the St Albans club.

J.M. (John) Ruston

John Michael Ruston died in Brisbane, Australia on April 30, 2006, after a short illness, at the age of 65. John provided 15 years of playing service for the St Albans club from 1958/59 until 1972/73. In the summer of 1968/69 John was the highest scoring batsman in club cricket with 533 runs. He played two games for Canterbury in the 1962/63 season. He later played for the Harewood Cricket Club in the Christchurch Suburban senior competition and then completed his career at the Riccarton Cricket Club.

John scored 5784 runs in his 149 games for the club, which makes him seventh most prolific batsman in the 101 years of the club's existence, with a top score of 101. As a fieldsman he claimed 76 catches and, as a stand-in wicket-keeper, effected 37 dismissals including eight stumpings.



These are statistics, the bare facts. They do not convey the dominating fact that John was a cricketers' cricketer, a colourful character who always played the game as it deserved to be played. He was a talented 17-year-old when he first arrived at St Albans from Papanui High School and he made an immediate impression with his tough, uncompromising approach. He was also responsible, over many years, for coercing many of the Papanui High School first XI players to join the club. Many went on to be very successful St Albans cricketers and administrators.

He captained the St Albans seniors men's team during a period when Canterbury cricket was extremely strong. His innovative leadership and consistent batting won him respect from all of his contemporaries. He was a thoughtful player who knew the game extremely well. His knowledge of cricket was superior to that of most.

He was honest, some would say blunt, but was always encouraging and helpful to his colleagues. As his widow Annette observed recently, "with John, what you saw is what you got." We are all the poorer for John's passing. He was one of cricket's good guys.

To the thrill of many past and present members, John and Annette made the trip back to Christchurch for the club's centennial weekend in February 2005, such was his affection for the club that he got so much pleasure from playing for and, with it, the lifetime friends he made.

John is survived by his wife Annette, son Geoffrey and daughter Joanne.

H.M. (Helen) Steere (née Watson)

On October 18, 2005, the St Albans Cricket Club lost one of the three foundation members of the original St Albans Women's Cricket Club with the death of Helen Steere at the age of 89.

Helen, along with her cousin Joan Stevens (née Webster) and Peg Hooper, formed the St Albans Women's Cricket Club in 1937, after the club which Helen had initially played for folded from lack of numbers.

Helen was a stylish left-handed batsman with many shots and had the ability to combine stout defence with an uncanny flair to score freely when required. Helen scored 7111 runs (fourth best in the history of the women's side of the club) in 222 senior appearances (fourth equal most for Saints). These figures are testament to her longevity, fitness and commitment, not to forget her love for the game. Helen was made a life member of the club in 1997 and was named 12th man in the St Albans women's team of the century. Helen was also a member of both senior sides that managed to humble Marama for a mind-bogglingly low total of three in 1952/53 and Oddfellows for 11 in 1950/51.



Born in Christchurch in 1916, Helen lived most of her life in the Belfast/Marshlands area. She biked to cricket each Saturday, using this as a way to "warm up" before she batted (or fielded). Recognised as a popular "people person", Helen had a bright personality and just lived for cricket each Saturday in the summer and across the year for sport in general.

Although arguably good enough, Helen was unlucky not to play more representative cricket, mainly due to financial constraints. She made the most of her limited appearances for Canterbury and never let the side down. We are told that few girls playing for Canterbury at the time showed more enthusiasm or team spirit than Helen. People spoken to will attest to the dedicated organisation and driving force of the three "originals" as the reason why the women's side of the club is and has been so successful.

After Helen retired from cricket she took up golf which, not surprisingly, she also excelled at.

Helen is survived by her two sons, Des and Peter, and her only daughter Valerie.

President's Report

On behalf of your executive and committee, I have much pleasure in presenting the Annual Report and Accounts covering the 2005/06 season, the 101st in the club's history.

When one looks back on the last 12 months and tries to put an informed overview to interested parties, one can't help but be a tad disappointed with the overall season and the resulting outcomes.

If there was frustration about the centennial afterglow it was a sense that the summit had been reached, that completing the century was an end in itself, job done and we can all put our feet up now.

Unfortunately we paid the price with some very mediocre performances, both on and off the field, compared with the high standards we set the year before. We need to reset our goals and determination to ensure that we as a club move from being a journeyman club, which is what we slipped to, back to one of New Zealand's top 10 clubs, where leadership, innovation, killer instinct, competitiveness and lasting impact are again embraced.

The season did start well enough with a vibrant and well attended Annual General Meeting being held in early August at Trevinos, where all the executive and committee positions were filled. This was followed by really terrific attendances from both sections of the club at indoor pre-season trainings. A large number of new members attended these sessions and both Peter Mayell and Nicola Wilson (née Payne) were heard to comment on the level of commitment being shown.

Opening day arrived, the weather gods played their part, as they had during September, and expectations were high. At the same time the club captains were registering new members, a Premier men's selection was again playing their annual pre-season match against Upper Valley on a very good Hagley 4 pitch. A new trophy had been suggested and at the end of the match "The Embers" were presented to the Wellington side, who were victors on the day. The score overall now stands at 3-2 to St Albans. Thanks to Tom O'Carroll for his excellent pitch, which was positively commented on by the visitors.

The weather during the summer was, on the whole, very good with some very hot Saturdays after Christmas. The top teams only lost one Saturday when it teemed down all day. Ironically for the Premier men it was the second day's play against a very weak Marist and the 18

points on offer went begging. It was a costly set of circumstances that maybe contributed to the side only finishing fourth. The afternoon grades (sides that play on uncovered wickets) lost three Saturdays, due in the main to waterlogged grounds from rain on the Friday.

On the playing front success was limited to two grade wins. Tony Falloon's 4Bs paced themselves nicely to pick up the combined Christchurch Metropolitan/Suburban first reserve grade title on the last afternoon of the season; while the first grade Blue women's side, with Mike Dickie as coach, pretty much led the grade from start to finish, finally winning by a handy margin. Congratulations to both sides and all those that played in these teams.

The club did have some more success with the two first grade women's sides (the Blues and the Golds) tying for first in the inaugural Twenty20 competition which was held over the last four weeks of the summer. Our Premier men's side also had success in this form of the game by winning their Plate final against Lancaster Park Woolston. This game will be remembered for two different and significant reasons. Firstly, due to the time of year it was played in (on the cusp of the daylight savings changeover in March) the match was reduced to 15 overs per side and was played in near darkness for the last 10 overs. Secondly, for the outstanding century made by Michael Davidson. "Stom" opened the batting and was unbeaten on 105 off 52 balls when the innings finished. A match-winning innings if ever there was one!

Once again the club invited Steven Knox back for his sixth year as the club's player/coach after it was learnt that Ryan Watson, the centennial season professional, wasn't able to make it. Unfortunately Steven's season was cut short when, after learning that his father was in poor health and not getting any better, he decided (with the club's blessing) to return to the United Kingdom in mid-January to be with him. Steven's departure had an immediate effect on the multiplicity of roles and responsibilities that he had within and outside the club. His coaching contracts, club duties and run-production in the top men's side, not to forget his general presence around the club, was to be sorely missed.

To be fair I think that everybody within the club understood the circumstances and the vacuum that needed to be filled in the last 10 weeks and, in the main, this was achieved - to a lesser or greater degree, depending on where you stood. We hear that Steven's father is slowly responding to treatment.

We are currently in the process of finalising our new professional, as both Steven and Ryan are expected to be in the Scottish World Cup side, and his name should be able to be announced at the AGM. We are confident that Steven's replacement will succeed in our playing conditions and environment, while exuding the same club spirit and ethos of former overseas players.

Two other lads and one lady also visited the club from England and the Netherlands for the summer. James Needham, Nick Massey and Marjolijn Molenaar all enjoyed prosperous and successful summers. They continue the overseas influx of amateur players to our club.

Once again we must acknowledge the family of sponsors which the club has. Without this loyal group of local businesses, coupled with the significant contribution that the Canterbury Cricket Association and other charitable trusts make to our incoming finances, many of our initiatives, little extras and things we take for granted would be under threat. There is no doubt that the sourcing of funds is getting tougher and tougher by the season. The amount of paperwork required for an application and then, as follow-up, authenticating the proper and authorised use of the money is mind-boggling.

To Chevron Quality Cars (Chris Bird), Big Pizza (Paolo Antonacci), Churchills Public House (Bevan Gerling), Harcourts Vision Real Estate (Debbie Johnstone) and Grant Thornton - Chartered Accountants (Trevor Thornton) go a big thank you.

We would also thank the charitable trusts for their regular support of our club. They are recognised on the inside front cover of this book.

Over the past couple of seasons the CCA have also contributed to keeping our costs down with the sponsorship of a different part of the club's expenses. Last season was no exception and we would like to thank Richard Reid and his team for their grant to help defray ground rental charges.

On the social front the club had an enjoyable season. The after-match turnouts back at the pavilion were on the improve. Our three historical parties - opening day, Christmas party and end of season "hooley" - were well received and patronised. Club spirit was right up there amongst the best for ages and this was shown through the regular attendance of the lower graders on a Saturday evening after play had ceased. Usually team success is a well-known driver in keeping the social fabric of the club in good working order and it was testament to the teams that the camaraderie and esprit de corps was still strong.

The bar again traded well and in Jules the barmaid we had a rare jewel.

Eleanor Horne continued in her familiar catering role, keeping many a punter happily satiated with her supply of lunchtime and after-match snacks. Thank you for your ever-reliable service, Eleanor.

Our groundsman, Tom O'Carroll, again had a difficult job trying to please everyone each and every Saturday. But, in his typically unperturbed fashion, knuckled down to do an admirable job under often-trying circumstances. Thank you for your efforts during the summer, Tom.

The club continued to host the Tuesday evening Twilight competition, which was as popular as ever. Thank you to Kevin Snook for his ongoing organisation of the 12-team, 20-overs-per-side competition. He is a proficient and practised organiser who is not prepared to accept less than 100 per cent from teams and players.

In a switch with tradition we ran the annual club prize-giving night at the pavilion in the second week of April. This proved to be a popular venue and occasion. Over 100 club members turned up to witness Everton Snell, the prolific run-scorer and captain of the sixth grade men's side, presented with the club player of the year trophy by our guest speaker and presenter John Wright.

Everton was a popular winner of the club's supreme award, having scored over 980 runs during the summer. Shame that he fell for a relatively low score in the final match of the season as he would have otherwise reached the coveted 1000-run mark. For his part, John Wright, the former New Zealand opener and Indian national coach, gave a witty, informed and eloquent dissertation on the latter years of his many cricketing guises. His friendly, down to earth and, at times, laid-back style made him a hit with the members, particularly those he sat beside or spoke to individually.

During the evening all of the club's awards were presented, with the Peers Cup going jointly to Chris O'Brien-Smith and Mike Dickie. The personality (or personalities) of the year were Neil and Mary Cross who, as club members know, emigrated to New Zealand from the UK at the beginning of the season. Brother and sister Dean and Erin Bermingham were acknowledged as the club's two most promising players, while Neil Cross and Lea Tahuhu were rewarded with the title of the club's most improved male and female players. Many other playing achievements and milestones were recognised during the evening, some in a more hilarious vein than others.

The notoriously acclaimed Rod McCurdy award went to Tony Falloon, the men's club captain, first reserve grade captain and bar manager, who had a very interesting experience with his team's new ball and its whereabouts against Merivale-Papanui. The mighty story fully deserved the jibes, raucous cheering, wild scenes and beating of tables when his name was announced - this award certainly maintains its popularity. The Stumbling Block this year went to Pat Gallagher, who scored the club's only 99 during the summer, while the Noel Love Trophy, which goes to the club member who displays outstanding enthusiasm, dedication, camaraderie and social interaction, went to John Harris.

The King Hit crown for most sixes went to Graeme White with 22, while at the other end of the spectrum Ben Darch had the honour, if somewhat dubious distinction, of receiving the Duck Trophy with a tally of eight ducks (three of which were of the golden variety).

The other two awards I'd like to mention were the most economical bowling performances for the season. In fully completed 10, nine, and eight-over limited-overs matches, the best were: Matt Lawson (10-5-9-2), Alice Forbes (9-1-14-3) and Kevin Williams (8-2-9-0). Many of the other trophies won on the night are listed at the rear of this publication.

As well as our own prize-giving function a number of people from the club turned up at the CCA Club and Provincial Awards evening, held a week later at the Canterbury Horticultural Centre. Our club had a lean night except for the two grade-winning captains receiving trophies on behalf of their teams. Rowan Milburn received the Canterbury women's fielder of the season trophy while Chris Harris collected the bowler of the season prize for the men's side, both fully deserving of their awards. Chris capped off the evening by being named the men's player of the year. Congratulations to all concerned.

On the representative front, we were proud to supply one New Zealand player in the form of Sarah Burke, who played for the White Ferns against India in March. This was a somewhat diminished representation from that of recent years due mostly to the absence of a pair of players who have regularly worn national colours. Chris Harris has been recuperating from a major injury and Chris Martin shifted provinces to Auckland at the end of last season.

However, the club still continues to produce a fine stable of players who gain higher honours. As many as 28 St Albans members were chosen in various CCA men's, women's and girls' representative teams during the summer. These names are listed in the respective club captain's reports - congratulations to all involved.

Tony Falloon and Grant Penlington have both advised the committee that they will not be seeking re-election onto the club executive for this coming season. The three roles which these two gentlemen held - Tony as bar manager and men's club captain, Grant as secretary - are very important and pivotal to the success of the club. Tony has been men's club captain for four years and during this time has been a tower of strength to me personally. His efforts on behalf of the general club member has been very thorough and dedicated. Grant, although not completing his term, did a competent job in a friendly and efficient manner.

At the time of writing this report I am not aware of any others on the current committee who are not standing for another term. I would encourage any club members who may harbour a desire to put something back into the club, by being on the club committee or through another area (coaching etc), to make yourself known. We need all the volunteer help we can generate.

During the year the club executive and committee met on 11 occasions, with only the July meeting not recorded on these attendance records. It shows the attendances at meetings by your elected representatives along with the total number of years that these people have had on St Albans executives and/or the general committee.

John Harris was once again a popular club patron and he has agreed to stay on for at least another summer. John's regular circuits of the playing fields of Christchurch on a Saturday afternoon to view club sides and have a chat have been and are warmly received by club members. As indefatigable as ever, it is nice to know that we have an elder statesman keeping a weather eye on affairs. Thank you John, for your continued interest.

It would also be remiss of me if I didn't mention the enthusiastic and committed support of our Community Cricket Coordinator Nigel Marsh. Employed by the CCA as a development officer with specific responsibility for four clubs (including ours), Nigel has been a tower of strength in helping with coaching when needed and, more particularly, with his facilitating of a fledgling relationship between our club and Christ's College, which we hope to develop significantly during the next season and beyond. Nothing is too much trouble for the likeable South African and we appreciate his efforts.

As club members may be aware, an independent review committee, put together by the board of Canterbury Cricket, was engaged to analyse and examine many areas of the game in the city. These categories included the success or otherwise of the last two years of Premier men's cricket, the positioning of cricket for the future, its clubs, grades, structures, geographic alignments, mergers, administration, club relationships with secondary schools and junior sections. From the findings it has to be decided where to go from here and where we want it to go in the next couple of decades. The competition from other traditional summer sports is now as intense as ever and the spillage into the summer months by the winter codes is ever greater. Our sport needs to fight back, be proactive and innovative in our efforts in order to maintain our summer dominance.

The first part of the review has been tabled with the CCA board, who have accepted and ratified the recommendations. This, in simple terms, means that the current six-team Premier men's competition will revert to the old eight club/team format with no promotion/relegation. Suburban will also return to their former eight-team structure. As part of the acceptance of any club to either of these competitions is the need to ensure that the new criteria which has now been set are fully met in order to be a Premier club. Some of these criteria have been "stepped" over the next three seasons, however our club will need to be proactive in meeting a couple of these minimum requirements. Considerable in-depth discussions, strategic alliances and some innovative ways will be required in the next few months if we are to

fulfil these obligations. We are in a changing and fluid situation and a big effort will be required. It will cost the club time, effort and some funding, however the downside of not meeting these compliance standards are considerable. Hopefully the combined metropolitan/suburban first reserve grade will continue next summer as is the hope that one or two more of the afternoon grades will be combined with teams of similar ability from the other association.

Like the “good citizen” club that we are, many of our current players, administrators, active or former members are involved in other parts of the wider Canterbury Cricket umbrella. Over the years our club has produced an outstanding crop of volunteers and, in some cases, paid helpers who give their time and expertise to help the sport prosper. Kirsty Flavell, Mike Dickie, Vicki Wilkinson-Baker, Beth McNeill, Mark Ogier, Duane Pettet, Alan Jamieson and Lindsay Serra have all given of their time over the summer in various roles, while Catherine Campbell, Peter Mayell (New Zealand Cricket) and Vicki Burt (CCA) are employed on a full-time basis. Mike Satterthwaite is a CCA board member while Stephen Boock is on the board of NZC.

In a couple of weeks time the club will hold its 102nd AGM. The dates, times and agenda can be found at the front of this Annual Report. New blood will be required on the committee, pre-season training will get underway and the normal across-the-board recruitment of players will be well advanced. Many questions will be asked, with the answers only found at the end of March 2007. We have had our slumber and season off, so now is the time to awaken our senses, flex the muscles, arouse the motivation and get primed for another outstandingly successful six months.

Good luck in your winter pursuits - we look forward to seeing you at the AGM, pre-season training or, for the majority, opening day.

Men's Club Captain's Report

Top Individual Performances

It was a par season in terms of the number of tons and six-fors achieved in 2005/06. The 13 centuries registered is right on the average number scored over each of the last 30 seasons, while 10 six-wicket hauls is somewhat below the average of 17 in the same period.

Nevertheless, within this lot were some extraordinary one-off performances. Sixth grade newcomer Dan Hutchinson's 9-15 off eight overs clearly topped the bowling table, and was the best figures achieved by a Saints player since 1986/87.

Fourth grade captain James Alabaster topped the batting charts with an equally incredible feat, scoring an unbeaten 194 out of a team score of 262 in 39.5 overs. He came in with the total at 6/3 and later added 136 for the final wicket, of which the No. 11 made just five!

Other notable achievements were sixth grade captain Everton Snell and Premier all-rounder Michael Davidson posting two tons each during the season. Davidson's first took just 50 balls to reach and was the first Twenty20 century scored in all Christchurch club cricket.

Hutchinson is the only player to appear in both tables after scoring an even 100 just two matches after grabbing his nine-wicket haul. He is the first person to score a ton and take a six-for in the same season since Andrew Denford and Monique Pettet achieved it in 2001/02.

Matt Sutherland maintained his run of scoring a century in each of the last five seasons, but unfortunately he fell short of making it five 150-plus scores in a row after being stranded on 128.

A number of names on both lists have featured here many times before. Batsmen with multiple appearances are: Kelvin Scott (8th 100 for the club), James Alabaster (6th), Matt Sutherland (5th), Everton Snell and Michael Davidson (3rd and 4th each) and Nigel Tubb (3rd). For the bowlers: Alan Jamieson (19th six-wicket haul), Ray Brown (11th), Roger Ford (6th), Murray Griffin and Duane Pettet (2nd).

Two bowlers also took hat-tricks during the season. Kerry Tate's was rather unusual in that he didn't take a three-for (in either innings) ... and that it took him eight days to accomplish! He snared his first two victims to end the first day's play and then had to wait a full week before he could complete the feat with a perfect yorker. It was also the third hat-trick taken by a third grader in the space of 15 months.

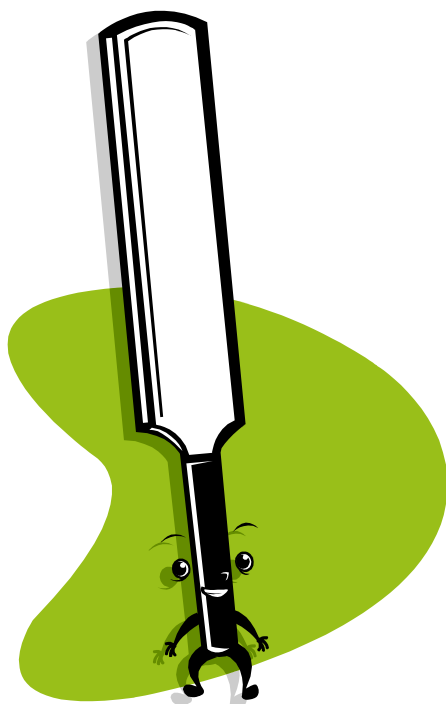

The 2005/06 season proved to be a difficult one for the St Albans Premier side. With several valuable players from last season not returning we had an inexperienced look to the side at times. Nigel Jones (formerly Tubb) was a late arrival and then had to depart early for his club commitments in Ireland, coupled with the unexpected departure of overseas professional Steven Knox due to family illness, meant we really lacked a consistent top order for a large part of the season.

However it started very promisingly with a hard-fought narrow win in the dark in the opening one-day match against a strong Old Boys Collegians side and a much more dominant outright win against Marist two weeks later after first innings forfeitures. From that point on it was a tough ride for the team in the two-day competition with many very tight matches fizzling out to draws. We only managed to win two more games outright for the remainder of the season, against Lancaster Park Woolston and Old Boys.

We proved much more competitive in the one-day format and, just after Christmas, had won five of our first seven games with one match abandoned. It was looking like St Albans was heading towards another final berth when we lost a crucial game to our bogey side, Burnside West University. In a heartbreaking finish, which saw us go from a strong position at 152/4 after Nigel Jones and Neil Cross added 103 for the fourth wicket, the middle order and tail struggled to keep up with the required run rate on a dying wicket and we fell agonizingly short by just two runs.

On the positive side the season produced a great amount of promise with Dean Bermingham proving he is a more-than-capable opening bat by three times passing the 50 mark. Also Neil Cross, in his first season in New Zealand, added a lot of experience to the team as well as scoring plenty of runs - particularly in the second half of the season. But the batting struggled a little with Sandy MacLeod and Liam O'Sullivan joining Jones and Knox in departing at various stages in the season. It meant the line-up changed around a little more than was perhaps liked, but the

dependable duo of Chris Harris and Stephen Cunis again scored runs when available. It was not until late in the season we really hit our straps with the willow when Michael Davidson (two centuries) and Cross (four 50s) gave us something to bat around.

Our bowling was well served with Michael Davidson (43) and Brad Smith (42) consistently stepping up and taking wickets, along with Richard Hooper who joined the team part-way into the season and took 29 wickets from just 11 matches. Again St Albans proved to have a quality spin option with Cross taking 25 wickets with an economy rate of under 3.5 runs per over conceded. Add in the dependable contributions of Harris and Cunis and we were always capable of bowling a team out.

A number of highlights came from the season including the four-wicket win over Old Boys on the back of a five-wicket haul from Neil Cross and Michael Davidson's superb 119. Davidson also scored a belligerent two-a-ball ton in a 50-run win over LPW in the Plate final of the Twenty20 competition. Nigel Jones scored a fine century against Burnside to add to three 50s he scored during the season. Brad Smith managed two five-wicket hauls against LPW and Sydenham and Cross' five-for against Old Boys was his first in Christchurch. Richard Hooper took six wickets against LPW as well as three four-wicket bags - one of which against Riccarton included a superb hat-trick. After dismissing Paul Millar, who had batted the entire first session, he then proceeded to claim the scalps of Luke Vivian and Canterbury representative player Iain Robertson with tremendous deliveries to complete the feat.

All in all, not the greatest of seasons results-wise for the Premier men but plenty of encouraging performances to build on for 2006/07.

Despite another hiccup along the way, again versus the Predators, we managed to reach the final match of the season facing a simple equation: lose and the title is gone; draw and keep our fingers crossed for other results to go our way; or just win it to take everyone else out of the equation and break the St Albans third grade hoodoo.

Sadly, it was a lacklustre final-day-of-the-season effort that scuppered our hopes. After going toe-to-toe with Lancaster Park Woolston on the first innings, the batting collapsed in a heap in the second dig and no miracles were forthcoming defending a paltry target of 100.

A season's on-field record of 10 wins, three losses and one draw (compared with an 8-6-1 ratio last year) should perhaps have yielded a more positive outcome in the final analysis, but it was our inability to compete with the few stronger teams in the competition and hold our nerve when the heat got turned up in the make-or-break games.

Nevertheless, it wasn't all doom and gloom, with many players, established and up-and-coming, showcasing their talents on the field (and sometimes off it). Kerry Tate's "eight-day hat-trick" was quite a feat. James Needham (131) racked up the best innings of the season for

the team, making Riccarton pay dearly for dropping him while still in single figures. Given his prodigious talent it was not a surprise to see him swiftly elevated to seconds and subsequently Premiers.

Blair Glover was his dependable self at the top of the batting order, racking up more than 500 runs for the second season in a row. "The Rock" faced a whopping 1081 balls in all, showing powers of endurance and concentration that can only but be admired. If only he could just up that scoring rate a touch so he'd stop being stranded in the 80s and 90s!

Congratulations to team player of the year Bryce Hackett, whose win was more for the 33 wickets (including 26 top-six batsmen) he picked up with his banana-benders ... than for his stupendous season tally of 50 wides!

Of those regulars not yet mentioned, your contributions with bat, ball and in the field were greatly valued. The fact that as many as 12 of you went on to play second grade cricket, mostly acquitting yourselves well, speaks volumes of your abilities. A captain never likes to lose any of his players, not least at crucial junctures of the season, but one can at least be heartened by the positives from such a trade-off - in-form players are rewarded with opportunities to test themselves and further their game.

Thanks to the 13 players who don't appear in the statistics on the next page (Phil Banks, Sam Barry, Mark Child, Ben Darch, Darryl Harris, Joel Huston, Marcus Jesen, Shane Knyvett, Ollie Robinson, Matt Sutherland, Ben Thornton, Logan van Beek and Kevin Williams) for their contributions as fill-ins. Their combined output was 112 runs at 8.62, eight wickets at 15.88, two catches and one stumping - figures that deceive as to the actual contribution made by these players' simple presence on the field.

Thanks also to selectors Pete Mayell, and latterly Alan Jamieson, and Stephen Cunis for giving us a kick in the backside late in the season with some much-needed coaching assistance and helping to show us a glimpse of our true potential, both as players and as a team unit.

There was a fine camaraderie within the team as the established players got even more used to playing together. It certainly showed when third grade was often the most represented side at club events throughout the season. Hopefully we can carry this momentum into next season as well.

I look forward to making it third time lucky in 2006/07 and finally get that monkey (which is mutating into a King Kong-sized beast) off our backs and claim a third grade title for Saints after 16 years wait. Winter well and be prepared for some hard slog in the pre-season nets!

In conclusion, we hope to see as many players back next season as possible. Enjoy your winter sport and we look forward to seeing you all in October.

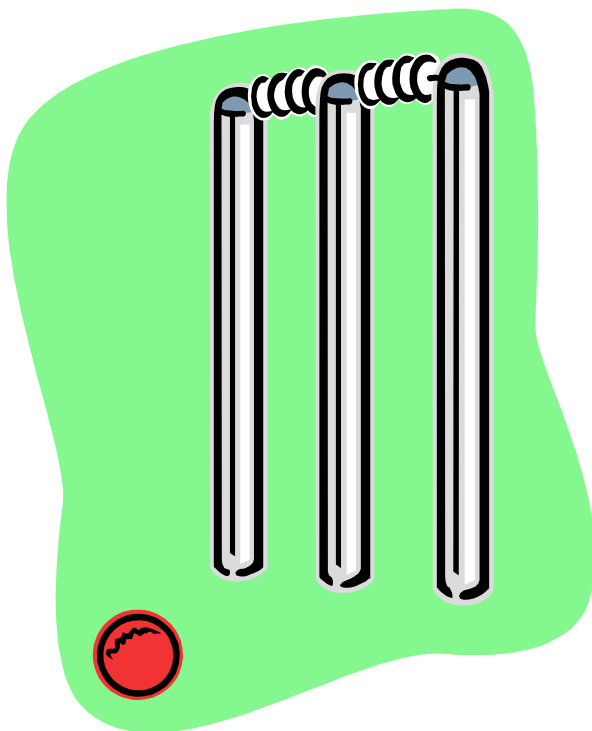

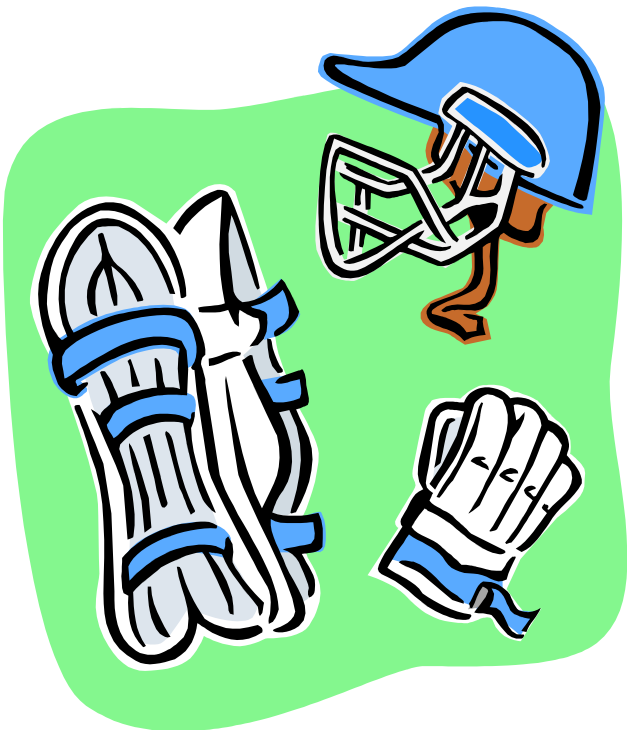

Qualified Opinion



Notes to the Financial Statements

for the year ended 31 May 2006

Note 1 - Statement of Accounting Policies

St Albans Cricket Club is a non-profit organisation. The financial statements are general purpose and prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice.

Unless otherwise stated the accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of earnings and financial position on a historical cost basis have been followed.

The entity qualifies for differential reporting because the Club meets the framework for differential reporting as the Club is not publicly accountable and is small. The club has taken advantage of all differential reporting exemptions.

Changes in accounting policies:

Except for the allocation of depreciation on Fixed Assets introduced in the 2000 year, there have been no changes in accounting policies which have been applied on bases consistent with those used in previous years.

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

Accounts Receivable are stated at their estimated realisable value. Debts which are considered uncollectible are written off. There is no other provision for doubtful debts.

Stock on Hand - Bar Supplies has been valued at cost.
Equipment on Hand has been valued by the Committee.

Property, Plant and Equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation has been calculated using the rates shown in the Property, Plant and Equipment Schedule (Note 2). Material, Nets and Girls Material have not been depreciated as the committee charges all repairs, maintenance and replacements to expenses.

A mortgage security over the pavilion is held by Westpac Banking Corporation. At 31 May 2006 there were no advances drawn against this security (2005 - nil).

Related Party transactions:

The Committee are also members of the Club and pay subscriptions on the same basis as other members. Services provided have been supplied on normal commercial terms.

Treasurer's Report


The accounts presented to members record a deficit of \$1820 for the year. Although it is disappointing not to be able to report a surplus we have, in large part, turned around the large deficit of the previous year.

Although expenses were kept reasonably under control the deficit has arisen primarily from a shortfall in funding, relative to past years. It does highlight the heavy reliance we are under, along with almost every amateur sporting club in New Zealand, to obtain funding from gaming machine funding charities.

Without their support it would be very difficult from your committee to provide the standard of facilities that are so necessary for you to get maximum enjoyment from your cricket.

The committee has decided to recommend no further increase in subscription levels for this coming season as the increase last year was quite substantial. It was a pleasing aspect of this past season to have virtually all subscriptions paid up before balance date.

I am confident, however, that with reasonable levels of financial support from the various charitable trusts being again received, your committee will manage its expenditure prudently and be able to report a small surplus in this coming year.

St Albans Cricket Club Constitution

Note: For the sake of clarity the term 'his' means his or her

1. **THE NAME** of the Club shall be **THE ST. ALBANS CRICKET CLUB INC.**
2. **THE OBJECTS** for which the Club is established are:
 - (a) To foster and preserve the playing of cricket within the Club.
 - (b) To raise and preserve the standard of cricket within the Club and generally.
 - (c) To take all necessary steps to support the authorities controlling provincial and New Zealand cricket.
 - (d) To use the funds of the Club as the Club may consider necessary or proper in the payment of costs and expenses in furthering or carrying out the objects of the Club or any of them including the employment of Counsel, Solicitors, Agents, Officers and Servants as shall appear necessary or expedient.
 - (e) To purchase, take on lease or exchange or hire or otherwise acquire any real or personal property and any rights or privileges which the Club shall think necessary or expedient for the purpose of furthering the objects of the Club or its Members and to sell and exchange, let, bail or lease with or without option to purchase or in any other manner dispose of any such property, rights or privileges as aforesaid.
 - (f) To do all such things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of the above objects.
3. **THE REGISTERED OFFICE** of the Club shall be situated at Hagley Oval, Christchurch.
4. **THE CLUB COLOURS** shall be Dark Blue, Light Blue and Gold.
5. **THE CLUB EMBLEM** shall be a Lion in some form.
6. **MEMBERSHIP**

Any player seeking to become a Playing Member of the Club for a particular season must do so in writing to the Committee at the beginning of that season and every subsequent season. The Committee shall have the right to decline or impose conditions on any application for Playing Membership. Life Members of the Club shall be elected by the Club at the Annual General Meeting or any other General Meeting upon the unanimous recommendation of the Executive Committee. Honorary Members may be elected by the Club at any Annual or Special General Meeting or by the Executive Committee. Life Members and

Honorary Members shall be entitled to the same privileges as Playing Members of the Club.

7. TERMINATION OF MEMBERSHIP

- (a) Any Member may at any time resign from the Club on giving to the Secretary notice in writing of his intention to do so but such Member so resigning shall remain liable for the payment of any subscription or other sum due by him for that or any previous Financial Year and will not be entitled to any refund for any subscription paid or other monies paid by him in advance.

PROVIDED THAT the Executive Committee may at its discretion refund to any Member so resigning any portion of his subscription as it shall think fit.

- (b) Any Member who is nine months or more in arrears with his annual subscription or any monies due by him to the Club shall be liable to have his Membership terminated by the Executive Committee but any such Member shall not be released from his liability for any such arrears of subscriptions or other monies due as at that date of such termination.

8. ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTIONS

- (a) Subscriptions shall be fixed for the following sections of the Club for the ensuing season by a Resolution of Members present at the Annual General Meeting or at a Special General Meeting of the Club.

Sections of the Club

- 1. Adult Men
 - 2. Adult Women
 - 3. Full-time University, Polytechnic, Training College Male Students and Under-18 Men
 - 4. Full-time University, Polytechnic, Training College Female Students and Under-18 Women
 - 5. Secondary School Pupils
 - 6. Primary/Intermediate School Pupils
 - 7. Social
- (b) Any Member who is not able to play throughout the season either because of absence from Christchurch or for other reasons shall be entitled to apply to the Executive Committee for a reduction (if any) in his subscription and the amount of such reduction (if any) shall be at the discretion of the Executive Committee.
 - (c) The subscriptions of all Playing Members shall be due and payable three days prior to the opening day of competition play as set down by the Canterbury Cricket Association Incorporated.
 - (d) The Executive Committee may at its discretion remove from the list of Members the name of any Member whose subscription or any part thereof for the current season shall be unpaid by the 30th day of November and such Member shall thereupon cease to be entitled to the privileges of

Membership without, however, being released from his liability for the arrears of subscription due.

- (e) The subscription of Playing Members elected during the season shall be due and payable immediately upon their election. The amount of such subscription shall be at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

9. **OFFICERS OF THE CLUB**

- (a) The Officers of the Club shall be: Patron, President, Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Auditor, Bar Manager, Club Captain (Men's Section) and Club Captain (Women's Section); who shall all be ex officio Members of the Executive Committee except for the Auditor and Patron.
- (b) The Executive Committee of the Club shall consist of a maximum of twelve Members with a minimum of one Member from each of the men's and women's sections as well as ex officio Members as per Rule 9(a).
- (c) All Officers shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting provided that the Executive Committee shall have power to fill any vacancy that may arise in any office.
- (d) A vacancy may be deemed to have arisen on the Executive Committee if any Member shall be absent from two consecutive Meetings (either General Meetings or Committee Meetings) without leave of absence from the Executive Committee.
- (e) The Executive Committee of the Club shall appoint such sub-committees and delegates as required.
- (f) The Executive Committee of the Club shall have the power to co-opt any Member to the Executive Committee that it sees fit at any time. It will co-opt sufficient Members at its first Meeting to ensure compliance with Rule 9 (b).

10. **MEETINGS**

- (a) The Executive Committee shall meet at times as itself shall decide.

PROVIDED THAT three Members of the Executive Committee shall have the power to call at any time a Meeting for the Executive Committee of which due notice has been given to all Members of the Executive Committee.

- (b) At all Meetings of the Executive Committee the Chairman or such other Members of the Executive Committee as the Executive Committee shall elect shall take the chair. In the case of equality of votes the Chairman shall have a casting as well as a deliberative vote.
- (c) Seven Members of the Executive Committee personally present shall constitute a quorum at Committee Meetings.

11. COMMON SEAL

- (a) The Executive Committee shall be responsible for the safe custody and control of the Common Seal of the Club.
- (b) Whenever the Common Seal of the Club is required to be affixed to any deed, document, writing or other instrument such Seal shall be affixed pursuant to a resolution of the Executive Committee by the President or the Secretary and any one other Member of the Executive Committee authorised to affix the Seal and the persons so affixing the Seal shall at the same time sign the document to which the Seal is so affixed.

12. ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

- (a) The Annual General Meeting of the Club shall be held annually between the end of the Club's Financial Year and prior to the Annual General Meeting of the Canterbury Cricket Association Incorporated and there shall then be presented the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the previous season. Officers of the Club shall be elected for the ensuing season and general business shall be dealt with. Not less than fourteen days' notice by circular letter and by advertisement in a Christchurch daily newspaper of such Annual General Meeting and the business to be transacted thereat shall be given by the Secretary.

PROVIDED THAT with the consent of two-thirds of Members present at an Annual General Meeting any business may be dealt with for which notice has not been given.

- (b) At Annual General Meetings and all Special General Meetings the President or such other Officer of the Club as shall be elected by the Members shall take the Chair and every Member present shall be entitled on every motion to one vote exercised in person and in the case of an equality of votes the Chairman shall have a casting as well as a deliberative vote.

PROVIDED THAT no Member of the Club whose subscription for the previous season is unpaid or whose subscription for the current season is unpaid as at the 30th day of November or is still unpaid at any later date on which such Meeting may be held shall be entitled to vote either personally at any General Meeting of the Club. The mode of voting at General Meetings shall be decided by the Members present thereat and entitled to vote.

- (c) Quorum at General Meetings shall be twenty (20) financial Members of the Club.

13. SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING

A Special General Meeting of the Club shall be called by the Secretary upon receiving a written requisition from any four (4) Members of the Executive Committee or from any six (6) Members of the Club, such Meeting to be called within fourteen (14) days of receipt of such written requisition and to be convened by notice as provided in Rule 12 hereof specifying the business to be transacted.

PROVIDED THAT with the consent of two-thirds of Members present at a Special General Meeting any business may be dealt with for which notice has not been given. Any such Meeting will be carried out in accordance with Rule 12.

14. PROXIES

Proxies at General Meetings will not be acceptable.

15. ALTERATIONS TO THE RULES

- (a) No Constitutional Rule may be altered, added to or rescinded except by resolution of a two-thirds majority of votes cast at the Annual General Meeting or a Special General Meeting called for such purpose.
- (b) Any Special General Meeting must be convened as per Rule 13.

16. CONTROL AND INVESTMENT OF FUNDS

- (a) All monies received by or on behalf of the Club shall forthwith be paid to the credit of the Club in an account at any Bank or Savings Bank as from time to time shall be decided by the Executive Committee, and all cheques or withdrawal slips on the account shall be signed by the Secretary or the Treasurer and one other Member of the Executive Committee, subject to the condition that the Executive Committee cannot commit the Club to expenditure in excess of \$20,000 (twenty thousand dollars) for any single project without the prior approval of a General Meeting of the Club.
- (b) The Club may from time to time invest and reinvest in any such approved Trustee Savings Bank or Trustee Security and upon such terms as the Executive Committee shall think fit the whole or any part of its funds which shall not be required for the immediate use of the Club.

17. BORROWING POWERS

The Club shall in addition to the other powers vested in it have power to borrow or raise money from time to time by the issue of debentures, bonds, mortgages or other security rounded or based on all or other of the property or rights of the Club or without any such security and upon such terms as to the property or otherwise as the Executive Committee shall think fit and all borrowing powers conferred by this Rule may be exercised by the Executive Committee.

18. MINUTE BOOK

The Secretary shall keep a Minute Book of all proceedings of the Club which shall be produced at every General Meeting and every Executive Committee Meeting.

19. **BYLAWS**

The Executive Committee shall have power to make, amend, rescind and enforce bylaws for the good management of the Club and such bylaws shall be notified to Members by notice affixed to the pavilion at Hagley Oval or shall notify Members of such bylaws in such other manner as the Executive Committee shall see fit.

20. **DISCIPLINE AND COMPLAINTS**

- (a) Any Member or persons having any complaint to make concerning the Club or any of its Members must state his complaint in writing addressed to the Secretary stating fully the grounds of such complaint. The Secretary shall then call a Meeting of the Executive Committee and shall notify the Member or person making the complaint and shall also notify the Member or Members against whom such complaint is made to attend such Meeting and thereupon such complaint will be considered by the Executive Committee according to the evidence submitted to them by the Member or person making the complaint and the Member or Members against whom such complaint is made. The Executive Committee shall have power to discipline any Member or Members and shall have power to terminate the Membership of any Member or Members for conduct prejudicial to the good name and interests of the Club. Upon receipt of any such complaint against any Member or Members, the Executive Committee shall have power to suspend each Member or Members pending the consideration by the Executive Committee of such complaint.

PROVIDED ALWAYS that no such suspension under this Rule shall remain in force for a period exceeding twenty-one (21) days.

(b) **Appeals**

Any player or team, aggrieved by any disciplinary action taken or penalty imposed by the Executive Committee in terms of these Rules shall have a right of appeal provided that notice of such appeal shall be given in writing to the Secretary within fourteen (14) days after the notification of the Executive Committee's decision.

21. **AUDIT**

The Statement of Income and Expenditure and Balance Sheet for each Financial Year which shall end on the 31st day of May, shall be audited by one or more Auditors elected at the preceding Annual General Meeting of the Club. The Executive Committee shall have power to fill any vacancy occurring in the office of Auditor.

22. **WINDING UP**

In the event of the Club being wound up, the surplus assets after payment of the Club's liabilities and the expenses of winding up shall be devoted to such objects or purposes associated with the game of cricket as the Executive Committee for the time being shall in its unfettered discretion decide.
