Obituary

C.F. (Charlie) Collins

It was with great sadness that we learnt of the death of Charlie Collins, who died on Monday, July 26, 2010 in Christchurch after a short illness. At the age of 96, he was our oldest living member and was last seen at the club when he had the honour of opening the 2006/07 season.

Charlie joined the club in November 1937, coming straight from Christchurch Boys High School and was a hard-working, bustling, medium-pace stock bowler. He played mainly in the club's second and third XIs, taking many wickets with a best of 6-32 in the old Second A grade. Charlie was also known as a busy person around the club, taking on and organising many fundraisers, working bees and social functions.

However, it was on the administrative side of cricket that Charlie made his real mark, leaving an outstanding legacy when he retired. He was club secretary for seven seasons between 1946 and 1953. He also served a two-year term as the president of the club between 1961 and 1963. Following this term he was honoured with life membership at the club's annual general meeting in 1963. According to mates from the same era, Charlie was a loyal and staunch "one club man".

Charlie also held a number of administrative posts at higher levels, including acting as the chairman of the Canterbury Cricket Association between 1955 and 1959 and as the CCA's president between 1971 and 1973. He was also honoured with life membership of the CCA and New Zealand Cricket for his outstanding service to cricket.

To cap off a distinguished career, Charlie was made an Officer of the Order of the British Empire (OBE) in 1983 for services to cricket.

A private family service was held in accordance with Charlie's wishes. Charlie is survived by his wife Dulcie and two sons.

Postscript: the honour of being the club's oldest-known living member now belongs to Ray McLauchlan. At 92 (and a half) Ray now carries the flag for all the older gentlemen in the club.



President's Report

On behalf of the Executive and Committee, I have much pleasure in presenting the Annual Report and Accounts covering the 2010/11 season, the 106th in the club's history.

How can one adequately compile a report that covered such a traumatic, devastating and deadly summer and give it full justice? With great difficulty. Hence this season summary is different in format and approach to previous such reports, as I often make reference to the events relating to the two major earthquakes and the ongoing rebuilding effort. Yes, the 2010/11 season was truly life-changing, with over 180 deaths and major property and infrastructure damage - not just to the CBD, which was almost obliterated as we knew and had grown up with, but also to the many thousands of homes in the city and suburbs.

The club held its customary Annual General Meeting in early August, with most positions being filled by returning committee members. The exception was that of the women's club captain's position, which remained vacant at the time. A successful season with several grade wins, a strong social scene and a healthy financial position was in prospect. However, five weeks later, on September 4, the city was struck by a massive earthquake measuring 7.1 on the Richter scale and centred about 10km under Darfield. This rocked the city and surrounding areas, causing considerable damage to the CBD, homes, roading, power, water and sewerage systems. Buildings were weakened and people were spooked but, fortunately, the 4.30am shake caused no direct fatalities. The many aftershocks that followed constantly reminded us that we might not have felt the last of Mother Nature's grumpy persona.

The season still managed to get underway on time, with only minimal alteration to the draws and ground allocations required. The club entered eight adult men's sides, three adult women's sides and one junior girls team. This was later amended when our women's Twenty20 side withdrew after a few weeks due to lack of numbers. We did, however, welcome a new men's team to the club. It was their wish to play in the new men's Twenty20 grade, one that they found very challenging.

The season was progressing well, with the Premier men's side winning the Twenty20 tournament played over the long Show Weekend break. Congratulations to Aaron Johnstone and his side, who went through

their three round-robin games unbeaten and then won the final against Old Boys Collegians. Other sides in the club were figuring strongly and, as the mid-season break approached, teams were in a buoyant mood and several grade wins looked in prospect.

The Christmas/New Year break came and went, with teams generally performing well one week and then not so good the next. Despite this an above-average season was developing, with maybe three more grade wins in the offing. However, as we all know, at 12.51pm on February 22 a powerful and most deadly earthquake hit the city. It registered at 6.3 on the Richter scale and although a lesser magnitude than the original quake the epicentre was extremely close to the city and was only 5km in depth.

The city was devastated as liquefaction left masses of silt everywhere; roads concertinaed; cliffs in the hillside suburbs crumbled to the ground, with the rest becoming unstable; boulders tumbled into homes; rivers searched for new ways to flow; and buildings toppled, leaving the CBD looking like a scene straight out of war-torn Bosnia. It was utterly unbelievable and, as I write this report, over 3000 aftershocks have rattled the city, of which 10 have been over 5 on the Richter scale. The latest major scare being caused by twin jolts on June 13, which measured 5.6 and 6.3. Fortunately, no further deaths have occurred and those buildings that were already ear-marked for demolition because of the earlier shakes have had a little more help from the earth's natural geophysics.

For days and weeks afterwards we watched and waited as search and rescue teams from within New Zealand and all around the world worked their way through the worst-affected buildings to rescue those who were trapped. However, the mortality figure kept rising and a large list of names of those who had perished was confirmed and posted. Most people knew of someone or their family who were affected by the death of a loved one. As a cricket club we were holding out hope that the wife of former member (and now promising umpire) Richard Hooper, Amanda, would be found alive. But, tragically, she was not. Our sympathies go to Richie and his two young daughters.

I should also make mention that our club did have about half a dozen members affected by major property damage. In some cases members have left the city to live permanently elsewhere, while others did initially move away but have now relocated back to the city. Others have simply been forced to find new living arrangements. All in all it was a dramatic and sad early end to the season.

Although our cricket pavilion and grounds at Hagley Park were, in the main, unaffected, it was decided by all the clubs, the CCA and other stakeholders to cancel the season with five weeks remaining.

There was an argument put up that clubs - in particular their junior sections - should try and play some non-competition games as a way of bringing some relief and a semblance of normality back to the sport. This was taken up by some clubs and helped give parents and others the chance to divert attention from their own personally upsetting circumstances.

The CCA decision resulted in all teams being given the placings where they currently stood on their grade ladders immediately after the earthquake. Fortunately for us, the 3A men's team were in pole position at the time and congratulations must go to Tony Falloon, Scott Mason and the lads from the BBBBs for bringing further success to St Albans. No other club teams were leading their grades, but a couple were only very narrowly behind in second place and could be considered somewhat unlucky. A couple more were in third place and were similarly unfortunate. Overall, it could be said that we had an indifferent season, particularly on the men's side. Given the circumstances, however, this was very understandable. The old adage that it is always better to be leading than to come home with a wet sail could not have been better illustrated.

The women's side of the club had an even more challenging summer, one which was full of major contrasts. Firstly, congratulations go to Amy Satterthwaite, Kelly Anderson, Lea Tahuhu and Janet Brehaut, who were selected in the New Zealand team. The White Ferns hosted Australia during the summer then went on a winter tour to Australia and the UK. Our congratulations also go to Meg Kendal and Amber Boyce for being selected (along with the others) in the Stephen Cunis-coached Canterbury Magicians team that won both of the women's provincial competitions this summer.

However, on the club front, in spite of having these elite players, we struggled to get enough players of requisite standard to be able to consistently field a full, competitive Premier team each Saturday. With the club not having a second XI in the Division 1 grade we just didn't have the reservoir of talent to draw replacements from, particularly when our representative players were away. We do thank the many fill-ins that helped out as without their assistance the situation would've been even worse. This lack of numbers impacted on the results and their final position on the table.

This situation needs to be seriously addressed and become our number one task for the women's side of the club before next summer. We need to recruit extra players so as to have a quality roster at Premier level, while also having enough girls to play at Division 1 level. Those on the rung below must be capable of playing quality cricket and have the desire to improve and seek promotion. This in turn will put pressure on the current group in Premiers and enlarge our pool of competitive top-level players. Furthermore, we need to find a motivated and energetic women's club captain if we are to return to the halcyon days of the past. Positive moves are being made to find a suitable person to fill this position as I write this report.

As has been customary we once again welcomed a group of amateur players from the UK. Tom Robertson, Lloyd Richardson and William Axup came to us via the Sport Lived programme. Simon George and Greg Wadsworth travelled as individuals for a southern hemisphere cricketing holiday, coming to Saints thanks to connections that they had with current or former club members. We were also fortunate to be able to secure the services of Ben Raine, a CCA exchange player from the county of Durham. I know all six players thoroughly enjoyed themselves at the club, with Greg Wadsworth even picking up the 2010/11 club player of the year award. Congratulations, Greg. We thank the boys for their efforts during the summer and ask that you be our missionaries over in the UK, should you hear of anyone wishing to either emigrate or come down under for a season.

At the end of the summer we farewelled Stephen Cunis, who had been with the club for the last 13 years either as a player, player/coach or solely as the Premier coach. Stephen came to the club as a 20-year-old from the Northern Districts area and in his time with us forged an outstanding playing career, not just with St Albans but also with the Canterbury Wizards. Indeed, if we were to select our best team of the last 105 years Cuni would go mighty close to making it into the final XI. That would make him the only non-New Zealand representative to be a part of that select bunch, such is the impact he made within the club. His socialisation of those in the top three men's teams of the club has become legendary. Woe betide those who failed to fall in line.

Thank you, Cuni, for all you did in the club. For those that were not at the club prize-giving night, you missed the presentation that was made to Stephen. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Stephen's wife, Kara, for all her help as a support person to Cuni and her contributions as a player and club secretary. Awesome. The Cunis family have moved back to Whangarei as the two earthquakes just got

the better of them after their home was hit hard not once, but twice. We can all understand. Good luck for your future cricketing endeavours.

At the beginning of last season it also became clear that Sarah Burke would not be playing any more cricket. With her entry into the police service I guess it just became too hard to juggle things. With her appointments to various non-cricketing areas it simply wasn't conducive to her continuing on. She is now working in the Auckland Police district.

Sarah joined the club from the Sydenham junior section in the mid-1990s in an effort to improve her cricket and play Premier women's cricket. It was obvious to experienced cricket scouts that Sarah, as a junior player, had all the necessary attributes to go far. As well as appearing 109 times for Canterbury and 44 for New Zealand she played 155 games for St Albans, making her the 11th most capped women's player in the club's history. As an opening right-arm medium-fast bowler she took 249 wickets at an average of 14.42 with a best of 6-18, placing her sixth-equal on the all-time wicket-takers list. Sarah was no bunny with the bat either, as 1880 runs at 16.49 and a highest score of 108 not out would attest.

Sarah was a great club member with an infectious laugh and an adventurous and sometimes zany streak. Sarah's attitude and willingness to help coach and take under her wing girls with less ability is already missed. Good luck in your future endeavours, Burkey. You are always welcome back to the pavilion if you're ever visiting during the summertime.

At the end of the season just finished Amber Boyce announced her retirement from all cricket. Amber joined the club at the beginning of the 2007/08 season and quickly became a very good Premier all-rounder. With 871 runs (including a dashing innings of 145 at the beginning of this season) at an average of 28.10 and 42 wickets at 21.19, Amber's abilities will be missed. She also played 43 games for the Canterbury Magicians. Thank you for making the trek up from Timaru each Saturday, Amber. We appreciate the effort. Hopefully you will be able to scout us a couple of Premier-level girls from the South Canterbury area.

With the season finishing five weeks earlier than planned the annual Saints and CCA prize-giving functions were justifiably low-key affairs.

We had about 70 people attend our club prize-giving night held at Robbies Riccarton. We would again like to thank Lee Germon for being our guest speaker and awards presenter. Greg Wadsworth, from our 2A men's side, won the coveted St Albans club player of the year award. Greg also picked up the trophy for club personality of the year. Matt Sutherland was presented with the Peers Cup, which was a fitting tribute to the work that Matt does on and off the field. Matt often operates well behind the scenes and his ability to make us (or save us) money is also very much appreciated. The infamous Rod McCurdy award went to Andy Murray for the wide-eyed exuberance exhibited in his unique approach to the game. Finally, Michelle Price was awarded the club supporter of the year award for her support of husband Jonnie and his President's grade side, both at games and after-match functions.

Our club didn't collect as many gongs as we typically do at the CCA awards function this year. However, congratulations must go to Amy Satterthwaite who did win the overall club and representative women's player of the year awards. The list of winners from our club prize-giving night as well as Saints winners at the CCA evening can be found later on this annual report.

In spite of the initial earthquake and subsequent aftershocks the club did try to carry on in a relatively normal fashion. We hosted the regular pre-season match against the Hutt District side, but the Embers trophy was not able to be prised away from the visitors after a close defeat.

Kevin Snook once again ran the popular Tuesday twilight cricket competition. This season the club had two sides entered, with both finishing mid-table. The second quake in February put paid to any finals matches, with teams being placed where they were when the competition was abandoned.

The club enjoyed a very vibrant Christmas function ... certainly if the mess left by the revellers, which was found in the pavilion the following day, was anything to go by. Thanks to the overseas players who organised the event. However, other social functions that are normally scheduled towards the end of the season - such as the bowl-off, race day and quiz evening - were shelved.

As club members will know, the CCA has a long list of criteria that a club has to "tick off" and undertake in order to be granted Premier men's status. With this comes supplementary funding from the model

that was introduced at the beginning of the summer. Previously this funding had been used by the CCA to employ three people with a support budget but the club chairmen felt that the returns were not great enough. Thus they presented to the CCA board a paper outlining a way in which clubs would receive better value for money if they were given the funding directly. To the credit of the CCA board they embraced the new ideas and, as such, we now get a grant to do much of the same work, but with a key directional change: we have control.

One part of the long list of criteria is the need for metropolitan clubs to have a minimum of four junior teams each season. At the start of the season in October we only had one side. Hence we needed to look creatively at ways to fulfil our obligation. We were given to February 14 to sort this challenge out. Work started straight away on trying to develop a working relationship with the Cathedral Grammar school and, after several meetings (and two steps forward and one step back), we signed off on an arrangement which was win-win for both club and school across a number of areas. This was endorsed by the CCA and we were out of the woods. The school has a natural fit with the club and this relationship will need to be nurtured and built upon, as it is a good one which will stand the club in good stead in years to come. We thank headmaster Owen Arnst, bursar Geoff Cain and teacher in charge of cricket Kirsty Bond for their help in making this happen.

With the devastation caused by the earthquakes and the necessary rebuilding of the city, the subject of the redevelopment of Hagley Oval as a Test and provincial ground has been put on indefinite hold. The original plans (that I commented on in last season's annual report) have had several changes made to them over the last 12 months and now hopefully they are sitting on a dusty shelf or in a forgotten drawer somewhere. I guess that the motivation, funding and timing is not right and would draw universal criticism if they were to go ahead with the development, particularly in the current environment. A number of major sporting facilities, which are either due for demolition or are simply in a poor state, will require many millions of dollars to repair or rebuild. Therefore, it is best to wait and see what might come from all the city-wide talks and meetings as to the best idea for the city's new sporting infrastructure, whether they be stand-alone or in some sort of complementary grouping.

With the CBD having been so severely wiped out and currently still a "no-go" red zone, there have been many instances of sporting facilities being rented by affected inner-city businesses. We have joined those

that have offered space and, consequently, The Star newspaper have become tenants of our pavilion. They have also rented the neighbouring Canterbury umpires' and Old Boys pavilions. This has helped our finances considerably, though the wear and tear is starting to become noticeable. It is expected that The Star will be in new premises in time for us to be back in our own pavilion for the start of the 2011/12 season.

The committee that was elected at the AGM has had some changes during the course of the season. Firstly, when it became apparent that no-one was going to step into the vacant women's club captain's position the committee asked me to assume the role.

Just prior to Christmas, Ben Brady relinquished his place on the committee and this was taken by Peter Mayell. After the Christmas break, Hayden and Trudy Pipe resigned to go on an extended overseas sabbatical. To help fill the breach Murray Griffin was approached and he agreed to return to the committee after a break of some years, having returned to Christchurch after working in Sydney.

At this time Matt Sutherland also kindly offered to "hold the fort" with regard the bar manager's position, which Hayden had also vacated. These were seamless changes and the 20-plus years of management experience added to the committee was welcomed.

At all times the committee has worked hard to keep the club on an even keel by balancing revenue and spending, with Lindsay Serra being the adroit and conservative financial helmsman. A small surplus has been shown, which is a good result under the circumstances. My thanks go to the executive of the club who were called to make or support strategic decisions on several occasions.

Of the current committee only Jarrod Stewart has advised that he will be not seeking re-election at the AGM on the second Monday in August. Although only a one-year committee member, Jarrod has taken big steps after a slow start and has turned out to be what I had hoped when he came on board. Thanks for your efforts, Jarrod. Hopefully we will see you around from time to time.

Not counting the extra meeting which the CCA board asked us to convene (to talk about such things as the Hagley Oval ground development and the club fulfilling its Premier status criteria), we had 11 committee meetings during the season. The eleventh meeting (to be held in late July) is also not counted in the following numbers.

I would like to also take this opportunity to thank a number of people who have contributed to the success of the club during the last 12 months. Firstly, thanks to Lee Germon, Mike Fisher, Mike Harvey and all the staff at the CCA for your support, wisdom and guidance. Tom O'Carroll, our groundsman, has also been a pillar of strength and has mostly gone along with our views and assisted on tricky issues when asked. Barry van Beurten has come on board in a variety of areas, most noticeably in the secondary/youth girls section. His "outside the square" thinking and new ideas have and will take us to places that others have failed to go to. We acknowledge your enthusiasm and motivation to help get the girls side of the club back to the strength it once was. To those of you that coached, scored, did bar work, helped with nets, transport and catering: we thank you for your efforts.

To the charitable trusts go our thanks, although returns and grants from them have slipped considerably from those of three or four years ago. We hope that the renewed vigour that we will raise in the next few weeks will help keep the club finances in the black - even given the prospect of signing an overseas player/coach for the coming season, which is always an expensive project.

Finally, we come to next summer ... with hopefully little further earth movement. There are bound to be some creative ways in which all the grades are accommodated, as a number of parks and pitches already signalled as being unavailable. The major concern is with player numbers. It is hoped that our club will have enough players to field at least the same number of teams as last summer. We already know of 10 players in the top three men's sides who have shifted away or likely will be unavailable for next summer. We will need to recruit like there is no tomorrow, particularly in the adult women's teams where we need 18 new players to fill spots in the Premiers and Division 1. Hopefully some innovative ideas will help us achieve this target.

Our finances will need a firm hand on the tiller. Revenue and funding will need to be taken to another level and we will need to maximise all possible opportunities relating to this. The committee, which will be elected at the AGM in two weeks' time, will need to be even more enthusiastic, available and energetic. We will also need to get the mighty Saints 'social train' back on the tracks. A new caterer will need to be found, as Ann Bergman has moved from the city as a result of the earthquakes. New men's and women's club captains will need to be identified. A new bar manager will need to be found, certified with a license and then trained up in the ways and needs of the club. A new coach of the top three men's teams will need to be signed. But, above all else, we will need to recruit, recruit, recruit. Playing members are the lifeblood of the club, not bricks and mortar.

We have had an incredibly successful club over the last few seasons. If we have a positive attitude we will climb out of the trough we are in. It's how well you do in the troughs that determines how easily you can climb back to the peak. St Albans and success have walked hand in hand over the last 25 years - let's quickly get back to this romantic notion. We have had several ups and downs over the last half century and we have always managed to bounce back from the bad times stronger and more successful than before. With your help - and guidance from an experienced committee - we will do this once again. The game of cricket is well entrenched in the city and most other clubs are worse off than us. Let us once again be leaders. The mighty, Saintly, rampant Lions will once again be kings of a devastated city.

I look forward to renewing acquaintances again - either at the AGM in a fortnight, at pre-season training or on opening day in late September. Until then, winter well my friends.

Men's Club Captain's Report

After a long and fruitless winter search for a men's club captain we discovered how George Bush must have felt looking for Osama bin Laden all those years! With no-one attracted to the position it was covered in no small part by the efforts of Alan Jamieson and Duane Pettet ... while I hung on to their coat-tails for dear life.

After claiming only one men's grade title the previous season there were large expectations of returning to the winners' circle in greater numbers. We wanted to rekindle the success achieved in the record-breaking 2008/09 season, when the men's section was responsible for as many as six pieces of silverware in the trophy cabinet.

The season got off to a shaky start with a magnitude 7.1 earthquake waking the city in the early hours of September 4. No-one was 100 percent sure how it would affect all of the clubs or even if the season would begin on time. However, the season kicked off as scheduled on October 2, with only minor disruptions for a couple of grades.

St Albans entered eight men's sides across a variety of CCA competitions. The only change amongst these was the loss of the 3C grade team from the previous season, countered by the introduction of a new group of club members into a side playing in the inaugural Cavaliers Twenty20 competition.

Although the on-field results were somewhat mixed for most teams, St Albans continued to be a club where the pavilion after-match functions remained jovial and in good spirits. 4As skipper Dan Stribling led the way on that front with a couple of sterling 'team talk' speeches.

A number of teams were poised to make a run for titles as the end of the season neared, but the thought of continuing to play cricket paled into insignificance once the full effects of the February 22 catastrophe had been felt by the city.

It was therefore no surprise that a unanimous decision was reached by the CCA and all affiliated clubs to call the season off shortly thereafter. This allowed people to reflect on what they had just experienced, mourn those lost in the tragedy and deal to property damage.

The Premier men won the Twenty20 competition in commanding fashion, going through the tournament unbeaten. Sadly, their chances of performing only the second back-to-back-to-back championship

runs by the club in the two-day competition were quashed by the untimely February quake. Their challenge in the one-day competition never really got out of first gear.

The 2A men will rue a poor afternoon's play on what turned out to be the last day of the season. They had been leading the two-dayers by a sliver going into the round but Riccarton pipped them at the post. Similarly they let a gilt-edged opportunity slip through their fingers on the final day of the Twenty20 competition, again having to settle for second. Ironically, despite winning just two of six one-dayers, they only missed out on the semi-finals after a net run rate count-back.

The 2B men were under-resourced and it showed for the most part. A forgettable one-day competition was however followed up by some encouraging fight in the Twenty20s, getting themselves into a 'final showdown' scenario but unable to finish off the job. They gradually improved as they progressed in the two-dayers, finishing mid-table.

The 3A men (the 'BBBBs') were once again the trailblazers for consistency and success in the club. Just two losses in 17 matches paved the way to championship glory by a margin of three clear wins. Commanding in anybody's language.

The 4As and 4Bs swapped grades from last season, with the promoted team led ably by Dan Stribling and finished in the top half of the table thanks to a series of good results in the New Year. The 4Bs featured a number of new players to the club and enjoyed an up-and-down season, ending up in the middle of the pack.

We seemed to be alright when it came to the key positions, with Amy Satterthwaite being confirmed as the Premier women's captain and coach of the top two sides.

Closer to the summer, Amy also took on the position of women's selector. However, the key position of the women's club captaincy remained unfilled until about mid-October, when I was reluctantly forced to take over the position.

However, it was the lack of players that ultimately determined the season would be amongst the worst in memory for our women's section. Without wanting to sugar-coat our difficulties or look for positives which weren't there, to only have two-thirds of a Premier women's side, no players for a second XI and then to have our social Twenty20 girls team pull out after a fortnight was quite debilitating and extremely disappointing.

In the end, we ended up with a Premier women's side that often played with nine or 10 players and, on one occasion, eight. I cannot believe - and am still in a state of shock - that a once-proud women's section could fall away so badly.

On the positive side the remaining players, who were mostly New Zealand (four) or Canterbury (two more) representatives, battled on and secured some excellent victories.

The overall situation, however, must be arrested before the 2011/12 season begins. Strategies need to be put in place to find at least 18 players to build up the numbers to fill out our Premier team, as well as giving the club a second XI (in Division 1).

In the main one-day competition the Premier girls finished a credible second behind the strong Old Boys Collegians-Country side, but in the Twenty20 competition we weren't able to secure any victories and found ourselves a distant fourth and last.

The other team which we fielded was in Division 3. This was a grade made up of secondary schoolgirls and those promoted from the previous season's Saturday morning junior team. Under the watchful eye of Barry van Beurten and coach Greg Wadsworth, these girls

Top Individual Performances

The 2010/11 season was noticeably lopsided when comparing big performances achieved with the bat versus those with the ball. While the 13 centuries scored by club members was a very respectable tally, only two six-wicket hauls were taken all season. This was a remarkably low figure, even taking into account the extraordinary circumstances which curtailed the season five weeks early.

Typically more six-wicket bags are taken than centuries scored in any given season, so this was a fair turn-up for the books. The batsmen of the club got in the thick of it right from the first day of the season, when Amy Satterthwaite and Amber Boyce both posted sizeable tons as they combined for a 219-run stand for the Premier women. It is normally good going if the club's first individual century is scored within the first month, let alone two occurring on the opening day.

Three sides accounted for 12 of the 13 hundreds, with the President's men leading the way with five; the Premier women accounting for four (after the combined women's section scored none last season); and the 2B men totalled three.

A player scoring more than one ton in a season is a fine achievement, so to have as many as three managing this feat was impressive. Amy Satterthwaite was one to do so, while Lloyd Richardson and Mark Hampton's efforts were even more special as they both scored theirs in consecutive innings. Hampton also still has the chance to shoot for three on the bounce when he has his first bat of the coming season.

Jared Roberts' 6-47 was his best figures for his new club (beating the 2-24 he took against his old club East Christchurch Shirley earlier in the season). The figures were the "worst" to ever top the Saints season bowling board, overtaking Dan Johnston's 6-20 from just last season.

Three players added to their tally of hundreds for the club, namely Mark Hampton (seventh and eighth), Amy Satterthwaite (fourth and fifth) and Pierre Flavell (fourth). Duncan Anderson's 6-49 was his fourth six-wicket haul for Saints.

Jonathan Price finally scored his maiden century for the club, having debuted at St Albans in 2004/05. Incredibly, for such a prolific top-order batsman, it took him 123 matches over the best part of seven seasons to break his hoodoo. Before he made his unbeaten 122 against Sumner, he had scored 3458 runs and passed fifty 25 times without reaching three figures. This included four scores in the nineties, with his previous best being 96 not out against the Sydenham Cardinals back in 2006.

With the paucity of big innings wicket hauls and the two-day competitions ending less than two-thirds of the way through, it's not surprising that nobody had a 10-wicket match. Tom Robertson came closest with 8-41 from 24 overs for the 2B men against Sydenham.

Notable all-round performances came from: Amy Satterthwaite, who dominated that opening game by following up her 167 with 4-23; George Earl, with 55 and 5-36 for the 2A men against Marist-Harewood (81 runs and 8-113 for the match); and Craig Coffey, making his debut for the club fresh off a plane from Brisbane, with 61 and 5-39 in a one-dayer for the 2A men against Marist-Harewood.

Evan Jones took the only hat-trick of the season, helping the 4A men to finish off the Sydenham Challengers' innings with a brutally efficient spell of 4-13 from just 2.2 overs.



After seeing almost all of the squad from the previous year returning there were lofty hopes of winning the two-day competition for the third consecutive season. Adding the one-day or Twenty20 titles to the trophy cabinet was also well within our grasp. With the winner of the one-day competition representing Canterbury at the National Club Championship at the end of the season, the CCA decided to play the competition in its entirety before Christmas. This season also saw the introduction of the Canterbury Under-20s team, which relieved the bye round and proved to be a real success.

One-day Cup

Once again we proved sluggish starters, with losses in our first two matches against the newly introduced Under-20s side and Canterbury Country. These were both games we felt we had chances to win but batting collapses at crucial times proved to be our downfall. We finally got off the mark with 76-run win over Sydenham with Ben Langrope continuing his strong start to the season with a well compiled 75.

We only came out of a big win against Marist-Harewood with one bonus point to our credit, having been docked the five win points for failing to remove the covers on time in the morning. It was poor reward for what was one of our most comprehensive performances of the season. Justin Gourlie took a remarkable 5-21 before Chris McGoldrick got off the portable treadmill he runs around on in the outfield to see us home with an unbeaten 64.

The next match against East Christchurch Shirley saw Duncan Anderson in his best bowling form, claiming 6-49 in East's score of 224/8. Unfortunately, it was to no avail with us falling 21 runs short.

Against Old Boys Collegians Greg Dawson (66) and Langrope (59) combined for a great partnership, before Dawson helped wrap up a comfortable victory with three wickets with his prolific turners.

However, the nail in the coffin of our semi-final hopes came courtesy of a poor performance against Riccarton. The only highlight being Craig “who’s throwing the coasters” Coffey posting his maiden Premier 50. We rounded off the one-day section with a tight seven-run victory over Burnside West University, with Michael Parlane scoring his first 50 for the club.

Twenty20 Trophy

This competition has proven an enigma for the club over the years with one unbeaten title-winning effort, surrounded by otherwise disastrous results. This season, however, we clicked as a unit and had three comfortable wins over Sydenham, Marist and Riccarton to set up a final match-up against Old Boys. In a tough, grinding match on a slow track we were seen home by Ben Langrope, who nudled an unbeaten 40, to become the first club to win this competition twice.

The success of the side in this Show Weekend competition was founded on an all-round team effort, with stand-out performances coming from a number of individuals when asked to step up. Michael Davidson was a stand-out player in the tournament, contributing well with the bat and hitting the most sixes over the weekend. With the ball he barely conceded three runs per over, with his most telling spell coming in the final, where he took 2-8 off his four overs. Justin Gourlie took the most tournament wickets; Aaron Johnstone completed the most dismissals; and Craig Coffey and Matt Holstein were right near the top of the run-scoring and wicket-taking charts, respectively.

Two-day Trophy

We naturally headed into our most favoured competition with a strong dose of optimism. However, the only things worse than our first turn at bat were Craig Coffey’s jokes and the stench from Matt Holstein’s bag after discovering a lunch his Mum made him in 2009. We were rolled for 120 by Old Boys and forced to follow-on after they made 245. Jared Roberts, who had shown a lot of promise all season, was rewarded for his hard work with figures of 6-47. On the second morning we were on the receiving end of some good fortune after Old Boys failed to cover the wicket, meaning no play was possible on day two and we received some bonus points from the situation.

The second match against Marist once again saw us struggle with the bat as we were dismissed for just 107. We bowled extremely well but the ball kept beating the edge numerous times and Marist managed to

eke out a first-innings lead. They did however leave the door open by declaring only 50 runs ahead. We were pretty confident if we could score 200 in the second innings, we could get our season back on track by bowling them out. In fact, we did a little better than that, declaring at 250/6 on the back of 50s from Ben Raine, Greg Dawson and Michael Davidson and a quick-fire 33 not out from James Richards. Holstein then continued his love affair with Redwood Park, proving the main destroyer with four wickets as we dismissed Marist for 135.

With rain meaning we lost day one of our match against East Shirley, it was decided both teams would forfeit their first innings and set up a chance for an outright result. After a top-order collapse we thought a draw would be a great outcome, but some real grit and fight from Greg Dawson (63) and Matt Holstein (46 not out) saw us through to 173. With time running out a fantastic performance by our bowling unit - led by Michael Davidson (5-19) - gave us a glimmer of hope of pulling off a miraculous victory. However, we ran out of overs with Easts hanging on at 108/8 when time was called.

Another strong bowling display from Roberts and Gourlie in the next match saw us roll Sydenham for just 72. Davidson and Raine then scored 50s to give us a 156-run lead. Despite being given ample time to bowl them out, we were denied by a gutsy batting display on a docile pitch as we toiled for just six wickets in an entire day's play.

Our tilt at the title was still looking good with us sitting in a very strong position after the first day against Burnside and still having to play leaders Lancaster Park Woolston. Sadly, the well documented events of February 22 brought an abrupt halt to the season.

All in all it was a satisfactory season. More importantly, the form of a number of players plus the continued success of our bowling unit has us in good shape. Given recent events and the uncertainty of who will be back next season we hope we can retain our 'out-of-towners' to have a real tilt at all three trophies.

On a final note, on behalf of the whole team, a massive thanks must go to Steve Cunis. Steve has had a huge hand in the success of our side in recent times in his capacity as both player and coach. Steve's hard-nosed approach has worn off on all those around him. Although you have moved back to the North Island we hope you will return to coach the club in years to come.

To call the season a 'challenge' would be a decent understatement as far as the 2B men were concerned in 2010/11. Possibly the most significant omen of what was to come occurred five minutes before the opening match of the season. Matt Sutherland (a last-minute ring-in from the 4B team) arrived to the warm-ups and attempted to catch the very first ball hit his way ... breaking his little finger in doing so. He was thus forced to spent the game across the road at the hospital and we played one short. When the season was abruptly ended in tragic circumstances in February, you knew it was just one of those years you had to shrug your shoulders at and take whatever lessons learnt from it to use next season.

We failed to win any of our one-dayers, with results ranging from comedic chokes through to outright spankings. Having been well dealt to by Lancaster Park Woolston in the opener, we soon found ourselves 46/6 at Sydenham. We did show some resolve, though, recovering to 162 on the back of a dashing 51 from Tom Robertson. This was to be our only non-defeat in the one-dayers after it hosed down during the lunch break.

Our limited batting depth was well tested in the next two matches as the bowlers were put to the sword to the tune of 261 and 320 by Old Boys Collegians and East Christchurch Shirley, respectively. We fell well short after spirited efforts, though Paul Thornton fulfilled some of his long-held promise with a classy knock of 86 in the latter game, showing just how effective he can be if he survives his first few nervous deliveries.

The Richmond match on Hagley 4 was possibly the craziest drawn-out finish to a cricket match that I have been a part of. We required just 25 runs off six overs to win, with five wickets in hand. However, a few dot balls and a few reckless swipes later, the equation had transformed to 14 needed off the last over with one wicket in hand. One delivery in the final over neatly summed up how spectacularly we had botched this chase. Our last pair, Andy Murray and Anu Diwakar, ended up at the same end after a stroke played to wide long-off ... and after approximately nine 'yes/no' calls between them, Anu jogged all the way back to the non-striker's end ... end result, no run. All told, five wickets fell to run outs or

stumpings as we fell four runs short. At least we provided some great entertainment for the 2A team, who could barely contain themselves watching this Keystone Kops saga from the sideline!

Our last one-dayer was remarkable for an amazing individual feat. Lloyd Richardson, who had averaged eight with the bat up to this point, launched a single-handed blitzkrieg which threatened to steal an improbable victory chase at Burnside. Promoted to open the innings, he posted his century when the scoreboard read 135/6 and ended up stranded on 149 off 137 balls (25 fours, one six) when he ran out of partners. He scored 78 percent of the team's total, while surprise pinch-hitting opening partner Anu was the second highest scorer with nine. The knock kick-started Lloyd's season as he followed it up with 129 in the following two-day game against Richmond, including a ton before lunch.

It was in the Twenty20 format where we were most successful. Despite a hiccup against otherwise-winless Sydenham, a series of clinical victories over Easts, Park, Richmond and Old Boys set us up for a winner-takes-all clash against Riccarton. Unfortunately, we failed to replicate what had brought us success previously. Our normally tight bowling unit gave away too many boundary balls and we fell too far behind the asking rate when chasing a tough target of 162 for the title. We gamely managed to get within 13 runs thanks to Simon George and Jonathan Hanson, but sadly we had to settle for second best on this occasion.

With many in the team not knowing each other prior to the season beginning, it was during the Twenty20s that the unit started gelling well, particularly thanks to the humour injected into the scene by the larger-than-life Jonathan Collins. We lifted in the field, producing a few immaculate displays that wouldn't have been out of place at much higher levels. This backed up some exceptionally tight bowling from the likes of Tom Robertson, Will Axup and converted medium pacer Jamie Schwass. Jamie's off-spin proved impossible to get away, as he took 11 wickets at less than six-apiece and had an economy rate of barely five-an-over.

The two-dayers were a mixed bag, but with some encouraging positives. First came an honourable draw on a belter of a pitch at Richmond; then we fought grittily to make Old Boys work for the outright points, leaving us to rue a terrible start to a match that was otherwise evenly contested; followed by a loss to Easts in a contrived single-day match, where our bowling penetration let us down after a champagne innings of 115 not out by Saints alumnus - and inspired last-minute inclusion - Bevan Rich.

Against a weakened Sydenham team we dictated terms from the off and extracted our sole two-day win just after lunch on the second day, on the back of eight wickets from Tom Robertson. The final match at Burnside

was left in an intriguing position as we scrapped our way back from 21/5 to make 147, then fought gamely to restrict the deficit to just 26 at stumps. Of course, we'll never know how the rest would've panned out.

Congratulations to team player of the year Tom Robertson. 400 runs, 18 wickets and 10 catches is a solid body of work - especially considering the varied roles required of him at times, ranging from complete spells with the new ball through to having to keep wicket at short notice.

Will Axup was our top wicket-taker with 25, deceiving many with his changes of pace as he often trundled in like a harmless little old lady only to catch the batsman unawares with an array of bouncers and brisk rib-ticklers. His unorthodox batting technique tested his captain's patience at times, but when it came off his cameos were fun to watch.

Andy Murray ('Metallica') wasn't far behind in the wicket-taking stakes but leaps years ahead of all in entertainment value. There was never a dull moment with him at the bowling crease, sometimes leaving his own fielders more bewildered than the batsmen with his unique phraseology.

Other regular players to feature this year were Clem Gibbens, a solid rival for 'Metallica' in the fired-up pace bowler stakes; Simon George, who found fine batting form with us and whose keeping was exemplary; as well as Patrick Sullivan, Craig Moore and Jonathan Hanson, who all made important contributions with bat or ball when asked to step up.







There is nobody in Christchurch whose life hasn't been turned upside down by the events of the past nine months. Sports organisations like ours are no exception.


If we want to get back on our feet and rebuild Christchurch as a wonderful place to live we need to take whatever steps we can to bring back "normal" into our lives. To this end your committee intends that for this coming season we provide to you all a full and active season of cricket.

I can report a small surplus for the past year of around \$3,000. Our income received a welcome post-quake boost by hiring out our pavilion to Christchurch Star from early March. This year also saw the introduction of a funding scheme from Canterbury Cricket "bulk-funding" many of our coaching, recruitment and development obligations. This arrangement is expected to carry on again this season and beyond.

We hope to continue building on this relationship this season.

With your support it will be done and the prospect of a full season of cricket ahead is a goal well worth striving for.

Review Report

The Members of the St Albans Cricket Club

I have reviewed the financial statements of St Albans Cricket Club on pages 95 to 98. The financial statements provide information about the past financial performance of the Club and its financial position as at 31 May 2011. This information is stated in accordance with the accounting policies set out in the Club's annual financial statements on page 98.

Executive Committee's responsibilities

The Executive Committee is responsible for the preparation of financial statements which comply with generally accepted accounting practice in New Zealand and which present fairly the financial position of the Club as at 31 May 2011 and the results of its operations for the year ended on that date.

Reviewer's responsibilities

I am responsible for reviewing the interim financial statements presented by the Executive Committee in order to report to you whether, in my opinion and on the basis of the procedures performed by me, anything has come to my attention that would indicate that the financial statements do not present fairly the matters to which they relate.

Basis of Statement

A review is limited primarily to enquiries of personnel and analytical review procedures applied to financial data and thus provides less assurance than an audit. I have not performed an audit and, accordingly I do not express an audit opinion.

I have reviewed the financial statements of the club for the year ended 31 May 2011 in accordance with the Review Engagement Standards issued by the New Zealand Institute of Chartered Accountants. These standards require that we plan and perform the review to obtain moderate assurance as to whether the statements are free from material misstatement whether caused by fraud or error. I also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

Other than my capacity as a reviewer, I have no relationship with or interest in the Club.

Statement of review findings

Based on my review nothing has come to my attention that causes me to believe that the accompanying financial statements, set out on pages 95 to 98, do not fairly present the financial position of the Club as at 31 May 2011 and its financial performance for the year ended on that date in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice in New Zealand.

Our review was completed on 28 June 2011 and my findings are expressed as at that date.

Notes to the Financial Statements

for the year ended 31 May 2011

Note 1 - Statement of Accounting Policies

St Albans Cricket Club is a non-profit organisation. The financial statements are general purpose and prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice.

Unless otherwise stated the accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of earnings and financial position on a historical cost basis have been followed.

The entity qualifies for differential reporting because the Club meets the framework for differential reporting as the Club is not publicly accountable and is small. The club has taken advantage of all differential reporting exemptions.

Changes in accounting policies: There have been no changes in accounting policies which have been applied on bases consistent with those used in previous years.

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

Accounts Receivable are stated at their estimated realisable value. Debts which are considered uncollectible are written off. There is no other provision for doubtful debts.

Stock on Hand - Bar Supplies has been valued at lower of cost or net realisable value.

Stock on Hand - Balls has been valued at lower of cost or net realisable value.

Equipment on Hand has been valued by the Committee.

Sponsorship: Sponsorship for services rendered to the club are accounted for as revenue and expense at values approximating the cost of the service provided.

Property, Plant and Equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation has been calculated using the rates shown in the Property, Plant and Equipment Schedule (Note 2). Material, Nets and Junior Material have not been depreciated as the committee charges all repairs, maintenance and replacements to expenses.

A mortgage security over the pavilion is held by Westpac Banking Corporation. At 31 May 2011 there were no advances drawn against this security (2010 - nil).

Related Party transactions: The Committee are also members of the Club and pay subscriptions on the same basis as other members. Services provided have been supplied on normal commercial terms.
