

President's Report

On behalf of the Executive and Committee, I have much pleasure in presenting the annual report and accounts covering the 2016/17 season, the 112th in the club's history. This is my 37th and final year of writing this section of the annual report, as I have decided to retire from my dual positions of president and chairman of the club. This will take effect at the 113th annual general meeting, on the first Monday in August. It is time for a new person to stand up and grab the club by the scruff of the neck and drive it forward to bigger, brighter and greater success.

Each time I have written this report I generally start with the season's weather and track conditions, and over recent years they have all been of a positive nature. However, this last summer bucked the trend, with a significant number of cancellations and rainouts. If it didn't rain on a Saturday, it did on the Thursday or Friday, making ground conditions unplayable, even though the Saturday may have dawned sunny. As usual, we had the normal dozen or so days where the temperatures were over 30 degrees; however, to lose about eight playing days - particularly for the afternoon grades - was disappointing. Christchurch Metro Cricket tried their best to rotate grades on the available pitches (including using as many artificials as they could find), but there were still grumblings from members about the overall running of the competitions and the best way to go about being fair and equitable. I guess that there can be no winners under these circumstances.

The poor weather did affect the club somewhat: whether it be at practices, after-match functions, social occasions or the irregular availability of players. I take my hat off to those responsible for running practices, selecting teams and making sure that most sides were full on playing days. From time to time we just had to play the odd player or two short, as trying to find players at the last minute was nigh on impossible. This affected the lower grades more than the higher teams.

Once we got the well-attended AGM out of the way in early August - which resulted in all the senior positions and general committee being filled - we then moved to the New Zealand Cricket High Performance Centre at Lincoln for seven weeks of pre-season indoor training. I guess it was there that one had an inkling that team numbers were going to be tight, with no increase in the number of teams seriously looked at. To have the success that we did from the three morning men's grade teams was testament to the players we did have and the skill and expertise of those running the sides, not to forget the coaching as well; two titles, two seconds and three thirds was a fine return. 2A and 2B captains Clem Gibbens and Nick Baker, along with team members, can be congratulated for their successful title-winning campaigns. The afternoon one-day sides mostly struggled to stay in touch with their grade leaders, but the 3Cs, President's and Twenty20 Cavaliers teams at least won more than they lost.

In the women's section, it was a season of contrasts. The Premier side had a season to forget. They were plagued with dicey, damp playing conditions in the early season; a lack of players; the unavailability of our best players for any length of time; and the need not to push the very young (but talented) players up to the furnace of Premier cricket too soon, all contributed to a below normal season. The regulars found it just too much to carry the side against the strong opposition teams and some serious thinking on the pathway ahead needs to be undertaken. Thought then needs to be turned into action. For too long ideas are never actioned or seen coming to fruition.

The Division 1 team had a very good season, just missing out in the final after probably playing their most unconvincing game of the summer. The more mature ladies' social Twenty20 team - being one year older but one year craftier and once again playing in a contrived competition - mixed success with disappointment. Oh, so close.

The junior girls team, on the other hand, played with composure and energy to achieve a grade win. Well done, girls. Thank you to Anthea and Craig Stanley for their guidance, direction, team management and coaching. I hear that the girls are already keen for the new season to arrive. Hopefully we will have a few more girls' teams to make it less lonely in the junior ranks of the club.

This summer the club failed to attract any overseas amateur players and our search for a professional player for the Premier men's team drew a blank. On balance, I think it has been recognised how important having overseas players is for the club, both on and off the field as well as for doing many of our midweek duties. This coming season we will need to make strident efforts to get this department back to being vibrant again and operating as an integral part of the club.

However, on the women's side we did invite and host a young lass from the UK by the name of Shona Keaney. After a promising start, she tailed away and struggled to dominate the Premier women's competition like we had hoped she would. It was a tough ask with the team not being able to generate any consistent traction. In the end, I think she lost some interest and started shifting her focus away from the cricket field. A big thank you to Barry van Beurten and his family for hosting Shona during her six-month stay. We wish her well in the years ahead and look forward to having others come over from the UK.

During the summer months we carried on the tradition of running a quiz night and once again a large number of teams took part. Organisers Duane Pettet and Scott Mason are a well-oiled combination and everybody seemed to enjoy the night. For the record, Ryan Thomas, his wife Linda and team-mates Brad Smith and Richard Carrigan won the top prize.

Towards the end of the season the annual club bowl-off was held, with Sean Carston reigning supreme.

The annual Christmas party and end-of-season wind-up were well attended and we thank Nick Baker for managing these functions.

Two prize-giving functions were held and both the junior and adult versions were well presented and well received. We had a great turnout for the juniors, but the adult night seemed to be about 20 fewer than average compared to previous years. Nonetheless, they were a fitting climax to the summer.

Clem Gibbens was presented with the main award, that of St Albans club player of the year. He thoroughly deserved this as the captain of the 2A two-day championship-winning team. He contributed strongly to the winning effort with both bat and ball. In addition, he carried out his men's club captaincy duties with ease and I am pleased to report he has again committed to the role for another summer.

A full list of club awardees from both our prize-giving night and that of Christchurch Metro Cricket's (which was held a week later at the Russley Golf Club) appear elsewhere in this report.

Once again, the club is indebted to a number of sponsors. We certainly appreciate the Liquorland cards as well as the Domino's vouchers for the best weekly batting and bowling performances. Thank you to respective sponsors Steve Crotty and Barry Cox for your continued support of the club.

We would also acknowledge the help from various charitable trusts, the folks at Christchurch Metro Cricket and the Christchurch City Council for their support.

Christ's College are also a significant sponsor of the club's operations, with regards the training and practice area that we use. Thank you one and all.

I would also like to thank auditor Bruce Harris for his expertise in performing the financial review of the club's accounts. He does this as a complimentary gesture. Thank you, Bruce.

We have been lucky to have had a solid commitment from various people over the summer. Special thanks and acknowledgement go to our practice pitch groundsman Tom O'Carroll, bar and catering lady Julie Reihana and, finally, Ryan Thomas who helped out Shona Keaney with coaching and game-management duties.

Greg Dawson, by all accounts, did a fine job of taking on the Premier men's coaching role, while a combination of Shuaib Munna, Ryan Thomas and others looked after the Premier women. Duane Pettet expanded his coaching duties to cover both second grade men's sides after the 2Bs earned a promotion after a strong previous season. It was pleasing to see both sides earn some silverware. I'm happy to report that Greg has been re-engaged as the Premier men's coach for next

season, while Chis Sullivan will take over the head role with the Premier women.

After-match functions were largely well attended, but the stop-start nature of the season made this a challenge. The previous two summers had returns from the bar of nearly \$13,000 (in a World Cup year when we were absent from the pavilion for several weeks) and nearly \$18,000 the year before. So, given all of the season's obstacles, to post turnover of \$19,000 was an extremely pleasing effort. This was helped along by several one-off functions, which is perhaps the way forward. The club spirit and camaraderie is a high point to the character of this club and long may it continue. Several initiatives to brighten up the social scene are being investigated and some new functions are due for instigation.

We need the support of all members at these occasions; as well as being added value to the game itself, it also brings in much-needed revenue.

In a couple of weeks' time the club will hold its 113th AGM, where several changes to the executive and committee are set to occur. Firstly, Bob Mather has voluntarily decided to step aside to let Ian Dempsey take over the position of patron. Thank you, Bob, for this very generous offer to stand down and let Ian have a year or three in this ceremonial role.

The club will appoint a new president and chairman, having concluded a months-long process of debates, candidate prospecting and interviews with potential appointees. I'm pleased to announce that the club committee has endorsed replacing the retiring incumbent with Graham Curgiven as president and Pierre Flavell as chairman.

During the year we lost the services of treasurer and Premier men's scorer Dave Perry. He accepted a job transfer to Dunedin and was a big loss, in both roles that he was involved with. Brad Smith quickly stepped up to the plate to assume the treasurer's position and has subsequently agreed to carry on. Brad would be the first to admit his lack of experience in this position, but as a banker he has all the skills and common sense to make the role his own for years to come. The position of Premier men's scorer is being attended to, and we are confident that an appointment will be made shortly.

As far as we know, there has only been one person intimate that they will be standing down from the committee, that of James Tapper. We thank James for his valued input. To have such continuity is pleasing, as we need an experienced group of administrators to move the club forward, gain more success and embrace the challenges and opportunities ahead.

Finally, I come to the last few paragraphs of my last ever president's report. I joined the club in early January 1965, after leaving Papanui High School. I was encouraged to join St Albans after a school first XI game against a team of old boys captained by John Ruston. I was just a regular player for several years, before accepting the position of men's club captain in 1973, which I held until 1980. The president of the day was Peter Guerin and he arm-twisted me into becoming his successor. I accepted and at the club AGM in August 1980 I assumed the dual positions of president and chairman. In my playing days I represented the club in 521 games, took 1260 wickets and scored 7008 runs. I was also honoured to have captained teams for 29 of those years, winning 13 grades. The rest is history and now after a total of over 50 years in the club - including 37 years as your president (and 28 of those as chairman) - it is time for me to pull stumps, burn the whites, throw out the boots and pass the baton on to a new group of administrators.

As an administrator, I have had equal success steering the club through many highlights and several challenges: the merger of the stand-alone St Albans Women's Cricket Club with the men's club in 1977; several building extensions, including a major one in 1984; the introduction of professional players (and more latterly the amateurs); the club centennial in 2005; the rebuild after the arson attack on the pavilion in

2008; the innovative twilight and indoor competitions that went for many years; and the winning of 135 men's and women's grade titles (plus 20 Petersen Shields for overall club supremacy) have all been highlights. Finally, to see so many New Zealand, Canterbury and under-age representative players achieve higher honours from the club was an undoubted highlight.

The club has a strong balance sheet and over the years has had hundreds of hard-working volunteers whose sole aim was to make the club great with longevity in mind, building on our long history. I would like to acknowledge Lindsay Serra for being such a highly valued right-hand man over many of my years behind the wheel.

Challenges have been regular and revolved mostly around council and government red tape, law changes, the great flood, the great fire and, of course, the home ground redevelopment of the great "Lions Lair" that is Hagley Oval. We have weathered all of these and become a top 10 New Zealand club in the process. I've had my moments with other administrators from both rival clubs and higher-level officialdom; never over a personal issue, but always working hard for the club and at times taking a few black eyes for my troubles.

Challenges lie ahead for the new group of administrators, however I'm confident that they will steer us along the right path, so that we can all attend the 125th anniversary celebrations in 2030 with pride and a sense of achievement.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my many years at the club and more latterly as the president and chairman. I have worn the dark blue, light blue and gold of St Albans with dignity and respect, trying to uphold the history and tradition at all times.

It is now time to pass the mantle over to new guardians and for me to just carry on as a passionate life member of the club. I would also like to acknowledge the support and encouragement of my ex-wife Jill and our two daughters, Kimberley (deceased) and Megan. All three ladies have played for the club, been administrators and great supporters of what I have achieved over the years. After suffering two personal losses - a divorce and a death - at times I wondered if I should keep going. However, I found the strength and willpower to refocus and continue on building St Albans into what it is today. Thank you, Jill. Thank you, Kimberley. Thank you, Megan.

I wish the club well for the coming season. I guess I might be spotted around the grounds or up in the pavilion lounge from time to time. As they say, you can take the old guy out of St Albans, but not St Albans out of the old guy.

Men's Club Captain's Report

This season was my first in the role, having taken over from Dan Johnston at the beginning of the season. I'd like to begin by saying Dan had done a fantastic job and I certainly had big shoes to fill. It was a definite learning curve for me and I appreciated all the support I received from some members of the club throughout the season.

The season again started mid-August at the New Zealand Cricket High Performance Centre at Lincoln University. During the off-season there had been a changing of the guard, with Ben Langrope and Greg Dawson taking over the Premier men's captaincy and coaching roles, respectively, from the departing James O'Gorman and Richard Pithey. Duane Pettet also took over the coaching role of the joint second grade (2A and 2B) men's squad. The status quo remained for the afternoon grade teams. The loss of several morning and afternoon grade players, as well as not opting for an overseas professional or amateurs, meant there was a bit of concern about the playing numbers. As we got closer to the start of the season, the playing groups started to fill out so we were able to maintain the same number of teams from the previous season: three in the morning grades and four in the afternoon grades.

Having no set home ground we again found ourselves living a nomadic lifestyle to begin the season. Just prior to Christmas however, we welcomed back our temporary home with the newly upgraded Hagley Corner (formerly Hospital Corner). Two full-size ovals were available straight away, followed by two smaller ovals at later stages. As we had done in previous years, we started the season practising at the artificial nets at Christchurch Boys' High School, before transferring to the Christ's College grounds on South Hagley Park once the grass pitches were able to be prepared.

One of the biggest changes implemented by Christchurch Metro Cricket was a new competition structure introduced to the morning grades below Premier. The existing eight 2A sides plus top four 2B teams merged into a 12-team grade, split evenly into two sections (Red and Black). As a result, we had two teams in this combined grade due to the success of our 2B side the previous season. To avoid confusion, the 2As and 2Bs gained the monikers of 'Sabres' and 'Cobras', respectively. As well as a new structure, a new format was also introduced: timed cricket, which has been played for a long time in quite a few parts of the UK. A mid-season promotion/relegation system was also put in place, where the top three teams from each section combined to form a renewed 2A grade and the bottom three would make up the 2B competition. The placings were determined by the summed-together points from the timed cricket and one-day competitions, which wrapped up just before Christmas. It meant that feasibly we could have had two teams playing together in either grade;

in the end we came very close to having both sides in 2A but the Cobras just fell short.

The beginning of the season was very much a stop-start affair, with much of the first six weeks heavily affected by weather. Besides inclement Saturdays, copious amounts of midweek precipitation compounded the issue by not allowing a significant number of grounds to be prepared. This meant that certain or all grades ended up being called off early; typically the lower afternoon grades were the ones to suffer first.

The first half of the season wasn't too successful for the men's side of the club. Both the Sabres and Cobras finished mid-pack in their timed cricket competitions and missed out on the semi-finals in the joint one-day competition. The Premier men stumbled at the semi-final stage of their one-day competition. It also meant we missed out on a potential three-peat and, with it, another crack at the National Club Championships in Auckland. As mentioned earlier, the second grade split also occurred with the Sabres now in 2A and the Cobras in 2B for the two-day competitions.

The usual Christmas layoff came and went, with every team seeking to revive what had been stuttering campaigns thus far. The morning grade men restarted in a restructured Twenty20 format, which saw the metropolitan and suburban teams (plus some schoolboy sides) come together to form a new three-tiered series. It was a highly successful format for the club, with all three sides qualifying for the semis; the 2A Sabres going through unbeaten. For the second time in two competitions the Premier men fell at the penultimate hurdle, however the Sabres and Cobras both recorded wins to advance to their respective finals. Come finals day on Waitangi Day, it wasn't to be for the Sabres, losing a tight game to rivals Riccarton. However, the Cobras provided the club's first piece of silverware for the season, overcoming a slow start to beat East Christchurch Shirley.

The final push to the end of the season saw several teams in with title shots. The morning grade men finished off their two-day competitions; while the 3C, President's and Cavaliers teams were all well and truly in the hunt in their competitions. Unfortunately, both the 3Cs and Cavaliers faded towards the end of the season, with some close losses ultimately leaving them in mid-table positions. The President's team made the top-section cut-off, to leave a mini round-robin to determine the minor competition winner after finishing fourth in the championship. However, as at the start of the season, the weather had the final say. With only one of their three scheduled games being completed, they also fell short of winning a trophy. They did however win the Graham Frampton Memorial Challenge Cup, which is awarded on a Ranfurly Shield-style challenge basis. Our team will hold on to it for the winter after winning it off East Christchurch Shirley Gold in the final championship round.

As the season drew to a close for the morning grade men, the weather started to have its say again. All three teams theoretically remained in the hunt for silverware.

The Premier men started with two draws and a loss in the first three rounds, before bouncing back with three straight wins. The gap was too big though and rain on the final day left them having to settle for a fifth-place finish.

The 2B Cobras found the going tough in the reshuffled competition. The pre-Christmas second grade split saw two strong former 2A sides drop into the 2B grade, including the defending 2A two-day champions. This meant the Cobras had a monumental task to retain their two-day title from the previous season. It wasn't to be however, with some tight losses and a rare tie ultimately meaning they also finished fifth.

The 2A Sabres, on the other hand, were unbeaten in their competition (two draws and three wins), meaning there was a nervous wait following the finish of the last game to see if they had done enough. They went into the game with a 1.2-point lead over Riccarton, and once the news came through that Riccarton had not secured bonus points despite winning their game, it meant the Sabres won their first piece of silverware in eight seasons.

Special mention goes out to Premier batsman Greg Dawson and Premier/2A bowler Reid Gibbens, who were the club's top run-scorer and top wicket-taker, respectively. Greg continued his consistent form of a few seasons now, racking up 692 runs with seven 50s, which is all the more impressive given some of the bowler-friendly wickets that he had to contend with throughout the season. Reid really took ownership of the new ball, in what was his first full season with club, picking up 47 wickets including a maiden Premier five-wicket haul and incredible innings figures of 7-3 for the 2A Sabres. Congratulations to you both.

Team Summaries:

Premier - captained by Ben Langrope. It was somewhat of a rebuilding year following the departure of some key players and were unable to secure the services of any overseas players. It meant that the team didn't quite manage to pick up the trophies they had done in previous seasons. They reached the semi-finals in two competitions - losing to the eventual champions in both - and finished fifth in a quite congested table in the other competition, showing that the team was still very competitive. Greg Dawson was as reliable as ever at the top of the order and James Tapper led from the front with the ball. I'm sure we will see the team back in the winners' circle again next season.

2A Grade Sabres - captained by Clem Gibbens. Despite a slow start to the season, the team built up momentum nicely, losing only one game after the mid-season break. Though the side missed out on the one-day semi-finals prior to Christmas, they still qualified for the revised 2A grade and didn't look back from then on. They went unbeaten through to the final of the Twenty20 competition, only then to lose the decider. They then claimed the two-day title for the first time in eight years, with younger players such as Alister Collins and Reid Gibbens stepping up to lead the charge with bat and ball. I'm sure the team will look to build on this next season and hopefully more trophies will come with it.

2B Grade Cobras - captained by Nick Baker. It was a tough season for the boys in some regards. The restructuring of the competition meant they found themselves in the combined second grade facing tougher opposition than previous seasons. Like the Sabres, the season didn't get off the greatest of beginnings, though they did inflict a couple of upsets against more fancied opponents along the way. Ultimately though, they found themselves back in the 2B grade. The team hit their straps in the New Year, bouncing back from a first-up defeat in the Twenty20 competition to go on an unbeaten run thereafter, claiming the first piece of silverware for the men's side of the club. It was tough going from here though, and they couldn't build on that momentum, eventually finishing fifth in the two-day competition. With Sam Flavell and Andy Murray leading the charge as the chief destroyers with bat and ball, there is plenty of hope for next season with these boys.

3C Grade - captained by Jono Hamilton. These boys were another team to be affected by the early season weather. Between that and a struggle for players due to absences or key members being required to move up to help the morning grade teams, it meant that they struggled to get any continuity at times. They were always sniffing around the top of the ladder or thereabouts, but couldn't quite get close enough for a shot at the title. Wicket-keeper/batsman Joel Turner led the way with the bat, while the wily spin of Matt Fergusson always meant they were in with a shot. With a bit more consistency next season I'm sure these boys will be a force to be reckoned with.

4B Grade - captained by Steve Foxcroft/Kris Pagan. It was an especially tough year for this side. The early season weather was extremely unkind to these boys, seeing much of the first six weeks rained out. Playing numbers were also an issue, with them regularly playing one or two short, despite plenty of late scrambling to get a full line-up. The co-captains were each critical for the team, with the bat and ball respectively, and Nick Burson had a fine season as he topped both the runs and wickets tallies. Hopefully we will see these boys back to winning ways next season.

President's Grade - captained by Scott Mason. It was another lean season for the BBBBs. The weather impacted their early momentum, but despite the stop-start beginning the team did enough to sneak into the top-four section when the grade split. Sadly, the weather again reared its ugly head, meaning the chance to claim the secondary trophy went begging. They did however manage to claim a piece of silverware: the Graham Frampton Memorial Challenge Cup, by beating the previous holders in the last game of the round-robin phase. Mark Hampton - though he couldn't repeat his feats from last season - was again the main man with bat in hand, and skipper Scott Mason was as reliable as ever with the ball. I wouldn't be surprised to see these boys back in the hunt for more trophies again next season.

Cavaliers Twenty20 Super Swingers - captained by Sam Price. The Super Swingers were the quiet achievers of the club in the afternoon grades. Despite the early season interruptions, they managed to work away and qualify third after the round-robin stage in their competition. Unfortunately, a last-ball loss in the third-place playoff resigned the team to fourth. The team, as in previous seasons, were led by Michael Goldsborough with the bat, and by Andy Rogers with ball. I'm sure we will hear of more success from these boys next season ... and hopefully more of Captain Sam Price's post-match speeches.

Representative Players

Again we didn't feature a first-class representative, but for the second year running we had a large number earning honours at district association level or better. The 12 different players who featured in Hawke Cup cricket or higher is the best in a couple of decades (surpassing last year's 11). Congratulations to the following:

Women's Club Captain's Report

As you read through the reports in this book I expect the mention of rain will become a bit of a theme. Certainly I have never experienced such a wet season since I joined the club in the late 1980s. On top of that, player numbers were down as well.

It becomes very hard to motivate players week after week as games were cancelled or washed out. Some weeks we struggled to get games and in others the battle was to field full sides. That being said, it wasn't all gloomy. In fact, there were some significant achievements and signs of a bright future for the women's section.

At the start of the season everything looked pretty good on paper; we were in good shape. All the sides from last season returned, except the Super 8s junior team for which we received only two or three registrations.

Christchurch Metro Cricket also made changes that reduced the Premier women's grade to just four teams. Clubs were pooled into four zones so that non-Premier clubs had a player pathway right through to Premier level without having to change clubs. It was good in theory; we'll get to how it worked later.

Club Cricket

The Premier team started out under coach Shuiab Munna and captain Natalie Cox. However, Shuiab was unable to continue after Christmas and Natalie picked up an injury that curtailed her season as well. I can't thank Tegan Weston enough for really stepping up in Nat's absence, despite the difficulties.

We had the services of Shona Keaney from England, an opening bowler with experience in the Essex team. We were also lucky to find another player from England, Lizzie Dillam, who was studying here for a year. Without those two players we may not have been able to field a side at all. My thanks to both for also putting in a lot of time coaching the juniors.

It would be fair to say our results were disappointing, but that is not the fault of the players. With our six representative players unavailable for virtually the whole season - a total of only 29 Premier appearances between them - wins were few and far between.

In order to field a side we often called up players from wherever we could find them. The list of players that appeared for the side was longer than the supporting cast in a Peter Jackson film. We are developing strength at the level below, but they are far from ready to make the move up to Premiers full-time. Recruitment this winter will be a high priority.

The Division 1 and the Social Twenty20 grades were combined to form a single grade of nine teams before Christmas. While it provided players with a wider range of opposition to face, it was a little confusing at times; some games were nine-per-side, 35-over format and some eight-per-side Twenty20 format, depending on who the opposition was. After Christmas, the Ashburton team merged with East Christchurch Shirley and the grade was split into two separate Twenty20 competitions in February. The season concluded with Twenty20 and 40-over competitions within those same groupings. Overall our results were pretty solid with one trophy and three second placings.

The Social Twenty20 team started out well, but unfortunately some results were not entered into the system before Christmas, resulting in them missing an opportunity to play in the top section in March. Punam did a great job managing the team and keeping me informed throughout the season. The side was weakened with the loss of Camel Hamel (moved back to Wellington) and Monique Pettet (injury) but still managed to win eight of 13 completed matches and finish second in the latter two sections they played in.

The Division 1 side was co-coached and managed by Nick Glennie and coached by myself. They were placed fourth pre-Christmas, but then won the Twenty20 competition in February and just fell at the last hurdle in the 40-over competition, finishing second after dominating the round-robin. They were great results considering the constant changes in line-up from week to week. The players had to cover for the other teams (Premiers, Social Twenty20 and Division 2) almost every week; some played morning and afternoon games on the same day. The depth of ability in this side is amazing, led by skipper Grace Ansell, who averaged 90 with the bat. I have no doubt most of this side will go on to be very successful Premier players and beyond.

The Division 2 side began the year as juniors in a Year 8/9 grade. After Christmas the entire grade became known as Division 2. Managed by Nick Glennie and coached by Shona and Nick the girls really developed well. Pre-Christmas results were reasonable but the side relied heavily on players coming down from the Division 1 team to lead the way. Post-Christmas it was a real struggle as the team regularly played short and results fell away. However, the core of the team is strong and some smart recruiting over the winter should see a dramatic improvement next season.

With the promotion of the Year 8/9 to Division 2 we essentially had only one junior team. The Year 5/6/7 side was ably managed by Anthea and Craig Stanley. They worked tirelessly with help from Lizzie and the team's development throughout the season was excellent. When the girls moved to hard-ball cricket post-Christmas they really showed they were ready to step up, eventually winning the grade on the last day.

The Zone system

This season saw the introduction of a zone system. I won't explain it fully here but, in short, it allows clubs within the same zone to exchange female players on a day-to-day basis to help ensure teams are able to field sides. I must applaud the administrators for their forward thinking. While there were some teething problems, we were grateful for the use of players from the Merivale-Papanui and Burnside West University clubs at various times through the season. I hope we have fostered good relationships there for the future.

However, the players and administrators really need to buy into the system and continue to look forward. I am frustrated by the lack of concern that some of the game's custodians have shown. Comments regarding what "this club" or "that person" did in the past only mire us in parochial infighting. That mindset is detrimental to the goal of promoting women's cricket. Put aside those differences and do what is best for the players and the sport.

Top Individual Performances

It was the leanest year for standout batting and bowling performances for the club for some decades. Some of that is inevitably down to the number of weeks washed out - certainly the paucity of centuries is to be expected given how often batting conditions were less than ideal. However, it is a little surprising how few outstanding bowling spells there were, with wickets mostly shared around by our bowling units.

All three centuries came in the men's section. The best knock from the women's grades was Natalie Cox's 73 for the Premier side against the Sydenham Stars.

The top innings came when Joel Turner took full advantage of the flattest conditions possible for batting. He made his 127 not out on an artificial deck at Walter Park, when regular pitches fit for purpose were in scarce supply in the first month. It is the lowest individual score to top the Saints batting charts in five seasons. It was Turner's second century for the club, besting his previous best of 101 for the 2Bs against Hornby three seasons ago.

James Richards' 111 not out was only the third known century in Twenty20 cricket for the club, after Michael Davidson's 105 for the Premier men in 2005/06 (the first season it was played in Christchurch club cricket) and Mark Higgin's 123 not out for the Cavaliers Gold Twenty20 men in 2014/15. His whirlwind 59-ball knock (which included eight sixes) was his maiden century for the club, coming in his 94th game for St Albans. It goes some way towards erasing the nightmare associated with his previous best: he sat unbeaten on 99 for an entire week only to be dismissed first ball on day two of a Premier game against Lancaster Park Woolston five years ago.

18-year-old Sam Flavell had filled in for father Pierre's team (and others) a number of times since he was as young as 10, but only started playing full-time last year. He finally cracked three figures in his 40th game for the club, eclipsing his previous best of 55 not out against Marist-Harewood earlier in the season.

All four six-fors too came in the morning men's grade; in fact, the top 10 bowling spells all did. The best in the afternoon grades was Matt Fergusson's 5-29 for the 3Cs against Marist-Harewood and Jodi Archbold's 4-4 for the Social Twenty20 side were the best women's figures.

Reid Gibbens' extraordinary spell of 7-3 off six overs is the cheapest six-for for the club in three decades. Nobody has taken as many wickets for as few runs since Fiona Kemp (also 7-3) for the second grade women against East Christchurch Shirley in 1986/87. Sarah Parker's 8-4 against the same club in 2008/09 rates an honourable mention. It is Gibbens' maiden six-wicket haul for the club and

surpassed his previous best of 5-23 for the Premier side against Sydenham earlier in the season. His match figures of 8-18 off 13 overs were only bettered by 2A Sabres team-mate Hamish McLean, who took twin five-fors in a haul of 10-54 off 24 overs against East Christchurch Shirley in the final match of the season.

Matt Holstein was only back in town for a month mid-season, but it was like he was never away when he took 7-15 off 12.4 overs in his first game back. They were his career-best figures and second six-wicket bag, after taking 6-32 against Marist-Harewood way back in 2009/10.

Andy Murray tripled his career tally of six-wicket bags, with his 7-16 beating his previous best of 6-32 against Riccarton in 2013/14; which coincidentally were the same figures as his second bag taken later this season.

There were no hat-tricks this season, keeping up the unusual pattern of their either being zero or three hat-tricks in a season for the past six years.

Two of the best all-round performances of the year came from James Richards in consecutive games for the 2A Sabres in Twenty20 cricket (111 not out and 3-16 off four overs then 54 and 3-14 off four). Earlier in the same competition Clem Gibbens scored 51 and took 4-12 against a Christchurch Metro Secondary Schoolboys XI.

In two-day cricket Tom Meyrick took 5-43 and made 72 in a day for the Premier men against Riccarton. Leighton Calkin was the nearly-man in all four innings for the 2B Cobras against Hornby, scoring 43 and 39 and taking two four-fors.



The 2016/17 season started off with a few differences from the previous seasons: new captain, new coach, no signed overseas professional and a couple of mainstays choosing to brave a UK winter. This meant it was an opportunity for local guys to step up to the plate and a good chance to finds some new players for the club. Also, we were lucky to welcome back a few old faces that had been missing over the last few years.

Two-day competition

The competition followed its usual format, with two games to start the season and the other five played after the one-day competition ended.

The first game was against Lancaster Park at Garrick Park with James "Trapper" Tapper continuing where he left off from last season, picking up a five-wicket bag to help us bowl LP out for 110. We managed to get 155/6 at the end of day one, thanks to Greg "Coach" Dawson being 76 not out. Unfortunately, day two was lost to the weather gods.

We were then off to the "Birdcage" to face East Christchurch Shirley, where batting first we made a competitive 215/6 declared after 60 overs. Dawson continued his love for scoring runs at Burwood Park with another fine knock of 73 and Ben Langrope chipped in with 51. A solid bowling display saw Saints take an 82-run lead into the second innings with Tapper taking three wickets. We then set them 228 off 58 overs, however after another great bowling effort by all we came up just short. Easts held on for a draw, ending up on 86/8 off the 58 overs with Langrope taking 3-15 off 13 overs.

The next round wasn't until the last fortnight before the Christmas break. We played Burnside on the new Hagley 5 ground (the old Hospital Corner 3). This was probably our worst performance of the season, losing outright by 97 runs. We took a slender five-run lead into the second innings after bowling them out for 116. Burnside set us 174 to win, however we were all out for 76. Cam Johnson and Tapper took four wickets each in the second innings.

With two draws and a loss we needed to get back on track fast, which we did by winning our next three matches, against Riccarton, Sydenham and Marist-Harewood. Against Riccarton, Tom "Tinder" Meyrick earned the team a keg with his five wickets and 72 runs in the first innings and a seven-wicket bag from Matt "Rooster" Holstein in the second saw us comfortable winners by six wickets.

Most of day one was lost to weather against Sydenham, however both teams declared first innings to play for outright points. After a good performance with the bat from Dan Sharples (70) we set Syds 195 to win off 58 overs. We managed to bowl them out 34 runs short of the target, with Scott Johnston taking 5-34 off 11 overs.

The win against Marist was by an innings and 23 runs. Batting first we made 222 off 56 overs, with Dawson scoring 87 and Ryan "Singy" Cockburn chiming in with a good 33 in the middle order. We then rolled Marist for 94 and 105, with Langrope and Holstein combining for match figures of 12-41 between them.

This then gave us a mathematical chance to win the competition in the last round if we had a big win over Old Boys Collegians. However, a first innings loss took care of that and the second day was lost to weather after only an hour's play. We batted first and made 198 on the back of 71 from James "Fulton" Richards, however OBC got to 201/6 with ease and declared after 54 overs. Jamie "Nutbrown" Brown bowled with his usual heat and aggression to take 4-39 off 17 overs. We ended up finishing fifth overall, with OBC taking out the title.

One-day competition

Going into the white-ball format as defending champions, we started off on the right foot with five wins out of five. The first game was against Marist on Labour Day Monday. Robbie "Gas Bottle" Polson put the shoulder charge of the year on the captain in warm-ups, which resulted in stitches. James "Matthew Michael" Bevin was luckily on hand to assist with his medical know-how. We managed to win by eight wickets after chasing Marist's 122. James "Corpse" Southby took 4-32 off his 10 and Dawson again scoring an unbeaten 50, sharing an unbeaten partnership of 65 with Bevin to see us through.

Game two was against Syds on the Cricket Live Day at Burnside Park. After average weather on the Saturday, the game was rescheduled to the Sunday. This saw the return of David Twigg and the introduction of Mario "Spank Spank" Stols to the side ... and what an introduction it was! Mario opened the bowling and took a wicket with his first ball for Saints, on his way to figures of 3-18. But the day belonged to Reid Gibbens, who bowled the spell of his life (5-23 off 8.5 overs), including the big wicket of the evergreen Chris Harris for a duck. This meant we were chasing just 91 to win. Though we managed to lose six wickets along the way, Bevin batted confidently for 42 not out to see us through to the end. We then travelled back to the Birdcage for another battle with Easts. We bowled first and restricted the home side to 163. Bevin made sure the chase was no contest, again batting confidently for 73 off 75 balls. Our six-wicket win with 16 overs left also saw us become the holders of the Challenge Trophy.

At Burnside Park we posted a competitive 204/5, thanks to a surprisingly patient knock of 83 from Langrope. He partnered up with Richards for a 105-run stand for the fifth wicket. The game was in the balance with the home team 135/4, but two crucial run outs and a stranglehold from spinners David "Noise" Armit and Cockburn saw us victors by 54 runs.

Our game against LP at Garrick Park was weather-affected and reduced to 38 overs per side. The captain was again in the wars with a dislocated finger, however the boys played on and restricted LP to 151; three wickets to Stols and a good spell by Bailen "Smile" Thatcher. Contributions by Polson, James Southby, Cockburn and William "Chip Chip" Southby saw us winners by six wickets.

With a semi-final spot already secured with two rounds to play, this was where the season took a turn for the worse. We won the toss and batted first on a good Hagley Oval wicket against OBC, however could only post 163. This proved no challenge for OBC, who ran away to a seven-wicket victory with 16 overs remaining. The only highlight was Richards earning the lads a keg by taking a wicket towards the end of the game. This also meant we lost the Challenge Trophy to OBC. Our game against Riccarton at Upper Riccarton Domain coincided with a Mid Canterbury fixture, which meant half of the team were unavailable. We lost the toss on a damp wicket, but posted a competitive 170 after a good opening partnership by Richards and Dawson. However, Riccs made light work of the total, winning by six wickets with 12 overs remaining.

Qualifying second after the round-robin saw us matched with third-placed OBC at Elmwood Park in the semi-final. Overnight bad weather led to it being shortened to a 28-over match. We won the toss and decided to bowl and OBC made a fair total of 145/6. The chase got off to a poor start, losing wickets in clumps with no partnerships able to get going at all. Reeling at 54/8, Tapper took the bull by the horns and showed some real grit and determination to get us back in the game. Together with Alister Collins they put on 71 for the ninth wicket. Cam Johnson also showed fight as he and Tapper got it to needing nine off the final over. Sadly, it wasn't meant to be, with Tapper's memorable knock of 67 - and the game - ended by a direct hit run out from the boundary on the first ball. OBC went on to win the title, beating Riccarton in the final.

Twenty20 competition

This competition took on a new look from that of previous years. The Premier sides were joined by four Senior A teams to form two pools of six, from which the top two teams advanced to semi-finals. There were double-headers on two Saturdays plus a Thursday twilight fixture.

The first two rounds were at Burwood Park, with game one against Halswell on the tiny No. 2 ground. We batted first and things weren't looking good after a maiden in the first over. Halswell were confident in their start, however the next 19 overs were a bloodbath. We posted a mammoth 245/4 thanks to Polson (73), Dawson (52) and James Southby (45). We then had a disciplined bowing performance to bowl them out for 147 in 18.5 overs. Southby wrapped up a memorable game with 4-25 off his four overs.

We then had a tight battle with Easts on the No. 1 ground. They posted a decent total of 153/6, with Meyrick (2-23) being the best of our bowlers. The chase got off to the worst start, with Dawson being run out without facing off the first ball of the innings. However, the boys rallied to win by

three wickets with two balls remaining. Dan Sharples was the hero with a great knock of 54 from 38 balls, including five sixes. The innings was finished off by Meyrick in his usual casual manner.

The Thursday night fixture against Riccarton was where we would suffer our first loss. Playing on Hagley 5, we could only post 86 as again a lack of partnerships let us down. We managed to take the game deep, however Riccs did what they had to, winning by five wickets with four balls left.

The final double-header was again at Hagley, where we needed two wins to make the semis. We started off by beating Marist by 46 runs as Polson (70 not out) and Dawson (61) impressed with a 122-run opening stand on the way to a total of 145/3. The bowlers then knuckled down to restrict Marist to just 99/6 off their 20 overs. Wickets were shared around, though Tapper had staggering figures of 1-5 off his four overs.

We posted 136/5 in the final game against Sumner; Dawson again profiting with 59. This proved to be too much for the Senior A side, with the bowlers restricting them to 86/6. The highlight was Meyrick with tidy figures of 2-12 off four.

This meant we qualified second in our pool and would face Sydenham in another Thursday night fixture for a spot in the final. After choosing to bat first, we were back to our old tricks with no partnerships of substance and could only post a total of 81. Again the bowlers showed fight after Syds got off to a flyer - 44 off 5.5 overs - to pull the game back, taking six wickets for the next 20 runs. However, Syds inched their way over the line, running out winners by four wickets with three overs to spare. Thatcher was the best of our bowlers with 3-11 off four overs. Syds went on to beat LP in the final on Waitangi Day.

All in all, it was a decent season for the team despite not picking up any silverware. We lost two semi-finals to the eventual competition winners and had a chance to win the two-day competition on the final day. With just a touch more luck we could've easily collected a trophy or two. A special mention to the lads that made their Saints Premier men's debuts throughout the season: Ryan Cockburn, Jamie Brown, Sean Carston, Hamish McLean, Sam Gilbert and Mario Stols. Congratulations to Greg Dawson, who was our team player of the year and was also named in the Christchurch Metro Premier men's team of the year.

I would personally like to thank Greg Dawson for his efforts throughout the year as coach. A special thanks our scorer David Perry for his contributions over the last five seasons. Unfortunately, he won't be with us next year, but on behalf of the team and myself we wish you and your wife all the best in Dunedin.

I have really enjoyed my first year as captain and thank everyone who has helped me get through it. I'm already looking forward to next year, in our attempt to get some silverware in the cabinet and chant "Oh, when the Saints".

The 2016/17 season threw up some new challenges for the 2A Sabres team. Though the core of the squad remained the same, the loss of club stalwart Dan Johnston and opening bowler Emmett Boyle - as well as not having any overseas players - meant we were looking at a quite different team.

An off-season restructure saw the best 2B grade teams combine with the existing 2A sides for the early part of the season. The points from the new timed cricket format (a one-innings game which effectively mimics the second day of a two-dayer) plus the one-day competition would determine the composition of the 2A and 2B two-day competitions thereafter. This meant there was more than just silverware to play for, with the threat of relegation also hanging over our heads.

We began with the new Graham Dowling Series (timed cricket), which made for a challenging start to the season. No-one was really sure how to approach this style of game, so we were learning as we went along. This, coupled with the weather having a say in many games early on, meant we didn't start the season particularly well and eventually finished in the lower half of the table.

The pressure was now on us to deliver a strong showing in the one-dayers to ensure we qualified for the 2A two-day competition. We started the campaign well with big wins over Old Boys Collegians, Hornby and Merivale-Papanui. Despite a subsequent stumble against Lancaster Park, we were still in line for a semi-final spot heading into the final round-robin game against East Christchurch Shirley. Due to various reasons we had to field a weakened side and also ended up on an artificial pitch, just to make it interesting. Unfortunately, it wasn't our day and we finished just outside the playoff reckoning. However, we had earned enough points to survive the grade split, after some help from other results.

We wound up before Christmas with a single two-day game against rivals Riccarton. The first day saw us already facing a hefty deficit. We managed to chip them out early on day two, but still had to bat deep into the day to ensure we didn't lose. We were eventually dismissed after a grafting for 88 overs to set up an exciting finish, with Riccarton requiring 120 off 18 overs to win. They had a crack, but after losing six wickets they shut up shop and we salvaged a draw. In hindsight, I believe this result ultimately set us up to win our first piece of 2A silverware in eight seasons.

Following the Christmas break the new Twenty20 competition - which put us up against Senior A and schoolboy teams - kicked into gear. The campaign was quite successful, as we went through the round-robin undefeated. We won our semi-final relatively easily against Lancaster Park -Addington to set up another final against Riccarton (a repeat match-up from last year's one-day decider). But, again, it wasn't going to be our time as we failed to put enough runs on the board early on. We were probably 30 short of a decent total and Riccarton ended up coasting home in the end.

As per usual, the run home consisted of two-dayers. We managed to grind out an outright win against Heathcote, before the weather once again intervened against Sydenham. We lost the entire first day's play but agreed with Syds to make the bold move of playing a brief first innings bash instead of just forfeiting them. The decision was vindicated as we managed to grab crucial extra points out of it.

The next game against Lancaster Park would ultimately define our season. They were just ahead of us on the table and a loss would spell the end of our title chances. We got put in to bat on a wet Garrick Park pitch and battled our way to what felt like a competitive total of 211, given the tough conditions. What then happened in the hour leading into the tea break changed our season. We bowled them out for a paltry 28 - in no small part to the efforts of Reid Gibbens, who took an astonishing 7-3 in six overs. We enforced the follow-on, and though Reid wasn't able to replicate his first innings effort, everyone else chipped in to wrap up a crucial innings victory inside a day.

The final game against Easts was a bit of a grudge match. They had knocked us out of one-day semi-final contention and they themselves lost a Twenty20 final to our 2B Cobras, so both sides were looking for payback. We needed to win (and win well) to snatch the title from Riccarton, who were looking for a sweep of all competitions in the grade. We started very well, posting 236 first up. The bowlers then went to work and we were looking very good, finishing the day with Easts eight down and still 120 runs in arrears.

We came back the next week buoyed by the prospects of what the day could bring. But, as happened so many times during the season, the weather wasn't playing ball. Overnight rain had delayed the start and once we got going Easts made us work hard. They passed the follow-on mark before being dismissed, leaving us ahead by 81. The weather once again set in to further delay the game. With uncertainty about time remaining, our second dig wasn't our best work and we stumbled to 79/7 before declaring.

This left us 35 overs to try and take 10 wickets to win the title. We got a couple of early breakthroughs, but then they really dug in. After coming so incredibly close to two-day success the previous two years the title seemed to be slipping from our grasp once again, as both time and overs diminished and the conditions threatening to go south the entire time. That was until Dave Armitt and Hamish McLean turned the game for us ... literally. The spin twins combined for seven wickets and we took the final

wicket just in the nick of time. However, because the scoreline was closer than we would have liked, we couldn't yet celebrate. We had to endure a 20-minute wait for word to come through that Riccarton had failed to secure any bonus points in their match, meaning we had indeed secured the title.

Despite the slow start to the season, we managed to lose only a single game after Christmas. I have to give credit to the team for working as hard as they did to earn that elusive title. Every single player contributed throughout the season but I can't name everyone. I do, however, need to mention Alister Collins and Reid Gibbens. Alister, while still young, stepped up as my deputy this year and certainly helped me throughout. He was immense behind the stumps and was the leader with bat in hand. Reid was another young player who stood up this year. He led the bowling attack all season, no better exemplified than by his season-defining spell against Park.

It was a rollercoaster season for the team, but we clicked at the right time to break the hoodoo that had long loomed over us. With so many young players stepping up, the future looks bright for the Sabres. We have the foundation, now we can build on it this upcoming season and I'm excited to see how far this team can go.

The season of 2016/17 was a fairly torrid one for the 2B lads. About the only thing we nailed pre-Christmas was giving ourselves the name of the St Albans Cobras. A hell of a title, though. The Cobras turned things around dramatically in the New Year and began the second half of the season with another Twenty20 title under the belt - the second in as many years. Sadly, we ran out of steam and could not translate our triumphant T20 form into a two-day competition three-peat.

Our campaigns in the one-day and new timed cricket formats went fairly similarly: decidedly underwhelming. Thanks to a grade restructure we were now playing against a mixture of 2A and top 2B sides before Christmas. We definitely noticed the step up from 2B to 2A - the bowlers aren't much quicker but they are far more consistent and have lot more variation at their disposal. Similarly, the batsmen we came up against were solid performers and made fewer mistakes.

We did however fare decently against the 2A sides we met, managing to earn a few good scalps. Unfortunately, there were other times when we set up opportunities for ourselves but fell over when it came to the crunch - case in point: failing to chase 80 in the season opener against Riccarton's fabled 2A side. Our mid-table finishes in the Graham Dowling Series and one-dayers left us just shy of the top three slots in the combined points, which ultimately determined which grade we'd play our two-day cricket in after Christmas (2B).

The real story of the season was our continual struggles in the batting department, particularly at the top. Coming into the season we had lost the very solid opening combination of Duane "Sneak" Pettet and Joel Turner, who had been a big factor in the previous seasons' successes. Before Christmas we must have tried about six different opening pairs, with little success. The failed opening stands each week did not set the lads up well and partnerships down the order were scarce. It was like we had gone back in time to the days when we constantly relied on the tail-end to bail us out ... except the tail was generally at the top of the order this time around.

The newly reformulated Twenty20 competition greeted us in the New Year and I think the lads were pretty keen to shake off the troubles

from the earlier part of the season. Walking into our first fixture we all thought we had it in the bag - how wrong were we! We failed in all facets of the game to lose to Riccarton's 2B side, a team who hadn't beaten us in a long time.

After a wee bit of soul searching - and a few canings from coach Sneak with his side-arm in the nets - we decided to get our act into gear. Although it wasn't a particularly convincing performance, we managed to edge past Lancaster Park's 2B side on a bleak Thursday evening in Woolston - fortunately the sprinklers didn't come on mid-game this time around! The standout performance in that game was Leighton "Macaulay" Calkin's 5-1 from four overs. Special mention to Andy Murray who, as usual, was not clued on to what was happening in the park and gave away the sole run from the spell.

We then went on to claim two big wins, against East Christchurch Shirley's 2A side and Hornby's top team. I think that was about the only day the opening batsmen and the rest of the top order didn't completely embarrass themselves. Lars Davison's bowling spells were highly influential on the day, taking 8-42 off eight overs across the two matches. Although Lars probably didn't perform as well as he would have liked to with the bat, he quite often found himself bowling - and performing well - in pressure situations.

We then found ourselves in a Thursday afternoon semi-final against Old Boys Collegians' 2B side. We reverted to our old tricks and almost completely screwed it up with the bat, only managing to stumble to an inadequate 123. The bowling attack started fairly solidly ... until the sixth over. The very lad who had just taken the club's best T20 bowling figures a mere fortnight earlier went for 26 runs in a single over; in doing so OBC doubled their score to 52 from the powerplay. We were up "\$#!%" creek, but fortunately my rare toss win earlier provided us with one advantage: it meant we were bowling last under rapidly-darkening late-evening skies. Master of hide-and-seek Jamie Brown proved completely unplayable in his two overs at the death and we were able to steal a four-run win. Special mention to Ben "Frank" Alexander, who bowled an uninspiring yet unhittable spell in the middle overs.

The final was played at Hagley Corner on Waitangi Day Monday - on the very pitch we were halfway through a two-day game on. After winning the toss and choosing to bat you would have thought we knew how it would play, having been on it two days earlier. We did, but that wasn't the problem. The top order went back to having their usual brain explosions and got themselves out cheaply. Sneak and Joel (the finals specialists back up from 3C) found themselves together at the crease for the eighth-wicket partnership. Boundaries were hard to come by but the pair put on a crucial 38 in five overs to get us up to a defendable total of 111. I don't think I had ever seen Joely run so much - poor bugger! The bowlers all chipped in with some really tight

spells and a crucial run out saw the momentum of the game swing in our favour. Nathan Court, making a guest appearance for the final, cleaned up with his ever-reliable, metronomical bowling action. We nailed back-to-back Twenty20 titles after only giving away five runs in the final two overs.

The highlight of the two-day competition would have to be Sam Flavell's maiden century for the club. He toiled away early on the first day against Hornby and tried his best to get himself out before he reached 30. Fortunately, something just clicked for the young lad and he started to see it like a beach ball, smashing fours and sixes to all parts of the park. Top effort Sammy, and thanks for completely overshadowing my maiden club 50!

Jared "Jazzy J" Weston had a pretty good season with the bat in hand, racking up 322 runs for his most productive season in five years at the club. You could usually count on Jazza to pull out a quick-fire 20 or 30 to keep the team's head above water. His struggles with ball-in-hand continued, but I think he has it sussed now and should be ready to open the bowling early doors next season. The standout bowling moment from Jazz came when he took his second wicket for the season to bring his average down under three figures.

Andy Murray was our player of the year and rightfully so too. He took a whopping 46 wickets at less than 15 apiece. He also found himself opening the batting for a good part of the season too. He took on the opening bowlers in his own unique style, mostly cutting and slicing over cover/point. Well done Andy, you had a great summer mate.

Although the past season was not as successful as recent ones - especially given the high bar we set for ourselves previously - it was definitely an enjoyable one. It can't be all bad if you still collect some silverware despite not reaching your full potential and playing against higher-graded teams. Thanks to all the fill-ins who played for us - generally at short notice - and to all the supporters who came down to give us their best.

I have loved the past five years at Saints and am gutted that I am leaving. I wish you all the best for future cricket (and non-cricket) endeavours and hope to catch up with you again soon! Cobras For Life. Thkk Thkk Tsss!

An honourable mention is made to the many I haven't named, who gave up their Saturday afternoons for a spot of cricket. No doubt everyone in the team is glad I've stopped annoying them ... at least until next season.

Paris Andrews has a great bowling style that makes it difficult for batters to score from. She is a great team player who fitted in well, but chose to retire from cricket midway through the season.

Grace Ansell had a fantastic season with both bat and ball. She was the Division 1 season MVP on the back of a batting average of 90.50. She went from strength to strength and by the end of the season was

batting technically the best I have seen from her. I am looking forward to seeing a century from her next season.

Lily Collier matured well as a player this season. Her batting was her strength this year, with a team-high score of 68 not out earning her the team batting award. In the latter half of the season she took over the wicket-keeping duties, as she felt the team was best served by having the other keepers bowling - a very selfless act in putting the team's needs ahead of her own. Incidentally, she did a fine job behind the stumps.

Georgia Edge shared the team bowling award, with some very fine bowling at the start of the innings. She is one of the straightest wicket-to-wicket bowlers in the grade and, combined with her pace, has ensured that she is both one of the highest wicket-takers and most economical in the team. I am looking forward to seeing her scoring more fifties with a little more aggression in her batting next season.

Charlotte Glennie is in the process of learning the art of spin bowling. She has taken to it very well and, with practice in the off-season, will have a great next season. She worked on being more aggressive with her batting, which helped her score more runs late in the season. This will help her score even more next season.

Petra Jack has the advantage of height on her side and she used it well. Her bowling style gained great bounce from pushing the ball hard into the pitch, making it a real challenge for middle-order batters. She had a great season in the field and I look forward to seeing her progress more next season.

Chantelle Lewis has a very nice style of swing bowling, but unfortunately the statistics do not tell the full story. Her best performances with bat and ball came in the same game, when she filled in for our opposition. She carried her bat for 37 (the highest score for their team) and took two wickets. In another match that was abandoned, she also took two wickets.

Brianna Longdin shared the team bowling award with Georgia. She has a highly deceptive bowling action, with very quick arm speed from a short run-up. She gets a lot of swing, which causes no end of problems for opposition batters. She is very much a pinch-hitter who scores runs very quickly. Next season I am looking forward to seeing her increase her run-up and gain even more speed with her bowling.

Lucy Murray is our opening batter and is also a very strong pace bowler. The stats do not reflect her ability with the bat. She had a great bowling season, with an excellent economy rate and lots of wickets. She is a real asset in the field and has a super strong arm. I am really looking forward to seeing her getting the runs she deserves next season as I know she is more than capable.

Isabel Simmons had a very strong start to the season, taking many wickets while conceding very few runs, including a season-best 3-3 from five overs. She is a very hard-working player who practices hard and is always dedicated in the field. I am really looking forward to seeing her continuing her hard work and getting some really great results with both her batting and bowling next season.

Brydie Washington is the life of our fielding outfit. She is extremely active in the field as well as being very vocal; on top of this she has the strongest throwing arm in the grade. She covers the most distance of any player, fielding permanently at her favourite position of fine leg. She had a great season with her bowling, with an impressive action that causes middle-order batters a lot of grief. She is a very capable batter and I am really looking forward to seeing her enjoy her batting more next season and scoring lots of runs.

I was very proud of the results that this team has achieved this season. They gelled really well together and achieved these results through hard work. The biggest key to the side's success was that they had fun and enjoyed being together as a team. Even though we won the Twenty20 series, the longer format suited the team more due to our depth in both the batting and bowling departments.

The biggest challenge we had was making sure that everyone had chances to perform. Everyone in the team can bowl well and at least six players were more than capable of opening the batting. The spirit in the team was fantastic and it showed in the results that we managed to achieve.

The team has been an absolute pleasure to manage and I look forward to getting them all together next season to improve even further. We achieved a lot this season and had a lot of fun in doing so. Together as a team I am confident that next season we will achieve even more.




Above: The successful Year 6/7/8 team after finishing up joint hard-ball grade winners on the last day of the season.

Treasurer's Report

I am pleased to provide my first report as your new treasurer. I wish to make a special mention of David Perry, who was treasurer for the majority of the season before he relocated back to Dunedin. I thank him for all his support on getting me up to speed on the requirements of the position.

After the disappointment of last season's results I am pleased to announce a surplus of \$4837.

The principal reasons for the turnaround from last season were increased revenue gained from our bar takings, the income gained from hiring out the pavilion to the English language school and lower expenditure costs. The additional bar takings were particularly pleasing given the wet start we had to the season.

The club did not engage the services of a professional this year, which played a part in reducing our expenses. However, with the likelihood of a professional's services being required in the coming seasons we will continue to likely rely on charitable trust grants and/or to explore additional fundraising opportunities to ensure the stability of the club.

The support of the club by its members is crucial for the financial success and viability of sports clubs in general. With social changes in recent decades the need for members to return to the clubrooms after games have finished is more important than ever.

Looking ahead to next season, with Christchurch hosting the Golden Oldies Tournament in April and St Albans being a host club, this could provide a revenue boost and the club will need to explore how we can make the most of this opportunity.

Finally, the club will look very different next season with a new president and chairman set to replace Alan Jamieson, who has decided to retire. I would like to take the opportunity to thank Alan for the support he has given me and the outstanding contribution he has made to the St Albans Cricket Club over the years. His commitment has ensured he leaves the club in a strong position for the future.



Notes to the Financial Statements

for the year ended 31 May 2017

Note 1 - Statement of Accounting Policies

St Albans Cricket Club is a non-profit organisation. The financial statements are general purpose and prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice.

Unless otherwise stated the accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of earnings and financial position on a historical cost basis have been followed.

The entity qualifies for differential reporting because the Club meets the framework for differential reporting as the Club is not publicly accountable and is small. The club has taken advantage of all differential reporting exemptions.

Changes in accounting policies: There have been no changes in accounting policies which have been applied on bases consistent with those used in previous years.

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

Accounts Receivable are stated at their estimated realisable value. Debts which are considered uncollectible are written off. There is no other provision for doubtful debts.

Stock on Hand - Bar Supplies has been valued at lower of cost or net realisable value.

Stock on Hand - Balls has been valued at lower of cost or net realisable value.

Equipment on Hand has been valued by the Committee.

Sponsorship: Sponsorship for services rendered to the club are accounted for as revenue and expense at values approximating the cost of the service provided.

Property, Plant and Equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation has been calculated using the rates shown in the Property, Plant and Equipment Schedule (Note 2). Material, Nets and Junior Material have not been depreciated as the committee charges all repairs, maintenance and replacements to expenses.

A mortgage security over the pavilion is held by Westpac Banking Corporation. At 31 May 2017 there were no advances drawn against this security (2016 - nil).

Related Party transactions: The Committee are also members of the Club and pay subscriptions on the same basis as other members. Services provided have been supplied on normal commercial terms.

Review Report

A review is limited primarily to enquiries of personnel and analytical review procedures applied to financial data and thus providing less assurance than an audit. I have not performed an audit and, accordingly do not express an audit opinion.

I have reviewed the financial statements of the club for the year ended 31 May 2017 in accordance with the Review Engagement Standards issued by the New Zealand Institute of Chartered Accountants. These standards require that we plan and perform the review to obtain moderate assurance as to whether the statements are free from material misstatement whether caused by fraud or error. I also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

Other than my capacity as a reviewer, I have no relationship with or interest in the Club.

Statement of review findings

Based on my review nothing has come to my attention that causes me to believe that the accompanying financial statements, set out on pages 106 to 109, do not fairly present the financial position of the Club as at 31 May 2017 and its financial performance for the year ended on that date in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice in New Zealand.

My review was completed on 27 June 2017 and my findings are expressed as at that date.




