

Obituary

JOHN WILLIAM FRANCIS KIDDEY (July 5, 1929 - November 13, 2021)

Jack Kiddey was an all-rounder of varying degrees throughout his career and an especially fine slip fielder. A brisk left-arm in-swinger, he could also get it to move the other way as well as extract good bounce and an extra couple of yards of pace when he wanted to.

Known for his accuracy, stamina and knack of creating game-changing moments out of thin air, he conceded a parsimonious 2.1 runs per over across more than 45,000 deliveries at club and first-class level.

He first joined St Albans in 1947 as a 17-year-old and impressed immediately with both bat and ball in our Second Grade A (now Championship) side.

It was in the middle of the following season he made his Premier debut. During only his second game, he evoked the spirit of England's Bill Voce of a decade earlier (or perhaps more accurately, that of Neil Wagner half a century later), by employing a spell of leg-theory which caused equal measures of discomfort for the batsmen and his own fielders perched close by behind square.

He finished with 15 wickets at 23.20 in his rookie senior season. The following year he was selected in the Canterbury Under-20 Brabin Shield side. Subsequently picked for a Canterbury XI in 1950, it would however be a further six years before he played a first-class match.

Kiddey played irregularly and mostly as a batsman in his first four years due to the rich cast of representative players available at the time. The likes of Tom Burtt, Matt Poore, Graeme Coull, Don Stark, Zin Harris and Bill Bell, between them took the lion's share of overs in an often spin-heavy attack.

It was in this time he developed his batting, in particular his footwork against spin. He was always eager to play a full array of attacking strokes, with particular fondness for the hook and cut shots and a hockey-influenced 'shovel drive'.

The best of his four senior fifties for Saints was 92 out of a total of 407 in the final-round game against second-placed Old Boys in 1950, a performance that set Saints up to claim their first senior title in 24 years.

He left Christchurch for the West Coast for three years, but upon his return in the St Albans golden jubilee season of 1954/55 they promptly won the senior title again.

However, he still yearned for a greater bowling workload to fully express his all-round talents, so moved to the Riccarton club in 1956 and it was they who truly saw the best of him. He made his only senior ton in his first season with the new club - at the expense of his old one - scoring a masterful 224 in little over three hours on Hagley Oval.


Though he stepped back from first grade in 1972 to become a menace to lower-grade batsmen instead, his senior career would later made it into a fifth decade when he filled in during the 1980/81 season, taking six wickets at the age of 51.

In his 29 appearances for St Albans he scored 752 runs at 22.12 and took 42 wickets at 23.79. His relentlessly accurate bowling accrued 864 victims all-up, the third highest tally in Christchurch club cricket. He took 52 five-wicket bags in 205 matches.

In his eight-year first-class career for Canterbury he took 141 wickets at 20.17 in 44 matches, including a best of 7-24 against Northern Districts in 1960/61. By all accounts he came very close to making the Black Caps touring party to South Africa later that year.

A talented sportsman, he played hockey for Canterbury and New Zealand in the 1950s also. He later became a Canterbury cricket selector.

Up until his passing he was one of only three known remaining senior cricketers for St Albans who played in the 1940s. He is survived by Betty, his wife of 70 years, and sons Martin and Grant.



President and Chairman's Report

They say that cricket is a great leveller and so that was proven this season. After a perfect summer of play last season and the trophy cabinet full, again weather, Covid and player numbers played their part and raised their ugly head.

While the club was tracking well at Christmas with some minor challenges ahead, it certainly was the season of two halves. Covid and weather were enough of a challenge with the Premier men's one-day competition basically a washout but also Covid added the extra pressure of not only players being unavailable at late notice, but also staff and personnel to prepare wickets and administer the game. This affected every adult and junior grade.

A huge thank you to the group that dug deep and worked through this period making all efforts to get players on the field. With numerous changes on the committee this year, I believe last season may have taken its toll on some.

Despite these challenges the club surpassed last year's membership with the highest increase in numbers for over a decade. We welcomed many new players and as well as returning ones along with new administrators as well.

Growth was not only seen in the juniors but also the increasing popularity of competitions for veteran players, with national and international tournaments for over-40s and over-50s seeing players re-join the game. For the second season in a row a new team entered the President's grade making the number the highest seen in the grade for decades.

The disrupted season still held great interest on the last day, with many members watching on at the Hagley Nursery ground as the Premier men took out the two-day title with only a handful of overs to go; a fitting finale to what was a long season on and off the field.

While we did struggle for numbers in certain teams, there were again some stand-out performances with title wins for four different sides: Premier men (two-day and Twenty20), Super Swingers (Cavaliers T20), Premier women (Kirsty Bond Series) and Social T20 women (Sue Brown Series). The Cavaliers result was notable for being an all-Saints affair, with credit to the Fozzies for finishing a close second on a brilliant final day. Our Chairman's Cup XI Lions also made the final for the first time. Congratulations to all sides.

Great team performances were built on the foundation of fine individual efforts and a number of players were rewarded with higher honours this season. Amy Satterthwaite and Lea Tahuhu again represented Saints on the international stage, though were

unceremoniously dropped from the NZC contract list after the disappointing White Ferns World Cup campaign. Amy announced her retirement from international cricket immediately thereafter, bringing a wonderful career to a premature end after 15 years at the top, including a brief period as the No. 1 women's ODI batsman in the world. Thankfully, Lea received a reprieve on the eve of the Commonwealth Games, earning a call-up as an injury replacement and promptly went on to collect a bronze medal. Other Saints representative players are listed later in this report.

These results were not only attributed to the performance on the field but the commitment and planning off it. Again we were excellently supported in that field with Fred Anderson, Kirsty Bond and Greg Dawson taking the reins with the adult sides and Trish Davis and her team of coaches in the junior section.

As much as any the struggles were felt by these guys with the players that were available along with those of the club captains (Barry van Beurten and Will Southby) by getting the numbers to play. A huge thank you has to go out to all of you for the great work you did.

Always a challenge is the finances of the club as it has become more and more of a task to achieve positive growth with playing numbers while balancing the budget at the same time. With that in mind we have to report a small loss of \$2530.

We have managed to complete one of our major projects set out three years ago, with all of our teams now fitted out in consistent St Albans colours and branding. On top of this additional equipment has been acquired as we look to enhance our training and match-day setups.

Again we were ably supported financially by our sponsors and partners. Kookaburra New Zealand/Australia, Moon Under Water, Denny's Thirsty Liquor, Sporting Edge and the continued excellent support by The Bealey Ale House and Maharaja Indian Restaurant. The support given by all of these people was instrumental in our club's success and greatly appreciated.

As I said earlier the tough season has taken its toll on the committee and we have a few vacancies to fill next season: coaching director, Premier men's coach and men's club captain, just to name a few. We will be recruiting strongly over the off-season.

One area we have worked hard on refreshing personnel-wise is our committee, with a number of new, younger faces being seconded during the season. Not least of these is my replacement as chairman, Clem Gibbens. In the latter stages of the winter we have been developing the new working president-chairman relationship and so far it has been an encouragingly smooth transition. Clem has taken the bull by the horns and already has a number of projects in the pipeline.

Next season Will Southby is stepping back from the men's club captain's duties to a general committee role. We also thank Brad Smith for his service, with two of his six seasons on the committee acting as our treasurer.

At the start of the season we had a major loss from the committee, after 29 years our president Graham Curgenven retired. Graham has been a stalwart of the club since joining 36 seasons ago. He has played not only a huge part as a player with his beloved BBBBs but also put his hand up to help drive and make the club we enjoy today.

During his time on the committee he has held the positions of: men's club captain (1992-95), chairman (1995-98), president (2017-21) and treasurer (2020-21). He was made a life member in 2003 and led the team that rebuilt our pavilion after the great fire of 2008.

Graham is not lost to the club. He is continuing in his 37th season with the President's side and will no doubt be seen back at the clubrooms celebrating after a day's play. A huge thanks from me personally "Daygo", for the support shown to me while chairman for what was sometimes interesting discussions on the direction we should be taking the club. I really have appreciated it.

The social scene was a huge issue for the club. Covid was a small contributor as to why we were kept away from the clubrooms. With the onset of another wave and the decision to keep the international programme running, Hagley Oval became a very attractive option for NZC and the ICC. With no guarantee that we would be able to use the pavilion a decision was made to make it available to host the events out front.

While disappointing that we have struggled to keep the club atmosphere we are famous for, it has ensured a little financial security over the next season. With the unseen and unplanned challenges such as Covid and others it has meant we can enter the upcoming season on a high and benefit each member of the club by having no increase in subscriptions. What it does mean though is that we have some ground to make up and will be making the social side of the club a major priority this summer.

Recruitment is be a huge task during the off-season and we have formed a strong subcommittee to drive this, with Matt Aspinall and Sam Kearns at the head. We will be looking to overseas players and advertising a new initiative supported by Kookaburra New Zealand, giving never-seen-before opportunities to both male and female players.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our governing bodies and funders for their continued support during the season. Mike Harvey and his team at Christchurch Metro Cricket, while offering some challenges, have also shown great support with the current environment to the club and it is greatly appreciated.

A big thanks to Air Rescue Trust, Christchurch Earthquake Recovery Trust, Mainland Foundation, Pub Charity and New Zealand Community Trust.

With pre-season having started already, and a revised international season ahead to watch from the balcony, plus our own personal goals to achieve, I look forward to seeing you all soon for what will be a great 118th season.

Men's Club Captain's Report

Welcome to my third and final men's club captain's report. It has been a pleasure to have been given the opportunity to be a part of the committee and help the men's side of the club. I will be stepping back next season to focus on my playing performance.

After all of the disruption that we have experienced due to Covid in the last couple of years it was unsurprising that pre-season training didn't get off to a perfect start with a national lockdown delaying sessions and, once we were back into it, limiting the number of people able to attend.

Pre-season trainings this year were moved to a new location, the Sporting Edge Indoor Centre on Matipo Street. This new location closer to town was a great asset, allowing much better access for people to make it to training. We are looking forward to the Sir Richard Hadlee Sports Centre being available as another great training location right on our doorstep.

After the highs of 2020/21 it was always going to be tough to repeat the dose, but we started in October with a strong contingent of seven men's sides ready to go.

Unfortunately, the weather didn't quite play ball and only the Division 4 and President's sides got underway on October 9. The following weekend had every team that missed week one getting a run instead.

The teams we entered were the same seven that we finished last season with, under mostly the same leadership as before. The only change being Jonathan Hanson (captain) and Kris Pagan (manager) taking over from Jono Hamilton for the Buccaneers. A big thank you to Jono for his leadership over the last seven years. The team wouldn't be in the position it is without you and I hope you can continue to be a part of the setup for a number of years to come.

The morning grade season followed a similar format to previous years, with a run of two-day games until November/December, followed by the Twenty20 competition. This has its final a week before Christmas to ensure the Premier winners have time to complete the Canterbury qualifying series for club nationals in April. The one-day competition runs after New Year, with the final few two-day rounds to close out the season.

In the afternoon grades, the Buccaneers played a round-robin for the entire season. The President's played a full round-robin of 14 games before splitting into top and bottom halves. The Cavaliers teams played two complete round-robins with a final between the top two sides on the last day of the season.

A highly motivated Premier men's side was looking to make their way back to nationals in Auckland after the Cornwall Cricket Club's decision to re-invite the 2019/20 qualifiers to the 2020/21 tournament, meaning that we missed out on attending despite winning the local competition last year.

This year they finished the round-robin fourth but comfortably accounted for Burnside West University in the semi-final, followed by an edge-of-your-seat final win in which Lachie Harper defended six in the final over. Unfortunately, due to the emergence of the Omicron variant of Covid, Canterbury Cricket made the decision to withdraw its entry to nationals, so we missed out yet again (for the third such time in all). Despite this, it was still the first piece of silverware for the club for the season and the fifth all-format title in a row for the Premier men, which is a fantastic achievement. In the other T20 competition the Sabres finished in a three-way tie for third but due to poor Net Run Rate missed out on the finals.

The one-day competition got off to a slow start with the first round rained off on the last playing day before Christmas. That evening was our annual Christmas party where fun was had by all who attended, although the turnout was lower than previous seasons due to the early cancellation of all cricket that day, meaning people had made other plans.

Into the New Year the one-day competition continued with some up-and-down performances by the Premier men and Sabres. The Jaguars continued to find the Division 1 competition tough going after gaining promotion from Division 2 last season. At the end of the round-robin the Premier men finished one point shy of fourth place, while the Sabres again finished in a tie for the final playoff spot, but missed out due to a poor NRR. A disappointing end to two title defences but time to refocus on the red-ball season.

As we headed into the final month and a half of the season the Omicron wave was starting to really bite in Christchurch, so Metro made the decision to allow teams to withdraw from games if a certain percentage of the team was isolating. Standings in affected grades would move to average points per games played rather than total points. While not an easy situation to deal with, I commend Metro for making a proactive decision to allow the season to finish as normally as possible while not compromising the health of the players. A particular thanks to Mike Fisher and Mike Harvey at the CMCA for their work at this time as we had several teams/games affected.

The two-day competitions were again coming to exciting conclusions, with the Premier men and Championship Sabres well and truly in the hunt to defend their titles. Both teams had games against Lancaster Park abandoned due to Covid in their club membership, but both went into the final fortnight against Burnside at home knowing what they

needed to do to win the grade. The Sabres side started poorly, handing the advantage to chasing Sydenham. Despite a strong final day to win the game outright, missing out on some valuable points on day one meant that Sydenham were able to hold on and take the title.

On the Nursery ground the Premier men were having a better time of it. A strong first-innings performance, highlighted by eight catches to Aaron Johnstone, meant that they knew what they needed to do going into the final day. After setting Burnside a target, they bowled them out around 6pm on the final day in front of several other St Albans teams to secure back-to-back-to-back titles and wrap up another great season for our all conquering Premier men's side.

As part of a great final day of the season the Cavalier Section 2 final was being played on Hagley 4 between our two St Albans teams. The Fozzies batted first and made a competitive 130/4, led as always by Kade Atkinson with 41 retired. In reply the game went down to the final over, with the Super Swingers getting across the line with four deliveries to spare. Congratulations to both teams for excellent seasons and a top final played in great spirit. Hopefully we will see these two sides taking each other on in the final once again next year.

We once again entered a Chairman's Cup team, made up of a range of players from across the club but limited in the number of morning grade players (and no Premier players) that are eligible to play. The team faced Heathcote first up in November, comfortably advancing to the semi-finals. The team easily dispatched Sumner to put them through to the final against Merivale-Papanui. The team got close but fell 25 runs short in a top effort. Thanks to Peter Mayell and NV Play it was the first game outside of the Premier men's that the club has live streamed, which went down a treat with the players and supporters of both sides as the highlights were broadcast on the Edgar Macintosh Park pavilion's big screen. We remain a big supporter of this competition and they way it can bring players together from across the club. We will be looking to enter another team next season.

In the Melhuish Shield, a competition in which clubs pair their teams prior to the start of the season and the combination with the most points wins, we decided on the following pairings: Premier Men/Championship Sabres; Division 1 Jaguars/President's BBBBs; Premier Women/Cavaliers Fozzies; Division 4 Buccaneers/Cavaliers Super Swingers. Despite some great performances from all teams across the season the combinations couldn't quite manage to keep up with the Marist-Harewood Division 5 and Division 6 combination.

Team Summaries

Premier Men – captained by James O'Gorman. The squad remained similar to last year. Attempting to replicate a historic season, the side was able to win the T20 and two-day competitions to end the season on a 37-match red-ball unbeaten streak.

Championship Sabres – captained by Will Southby. The Sabres struggled to back up from a three-title season. The team was unlucky to finish just outside the knockout phase in both white-ball competitions on NRR and coming second in the two-day competition by a narrow margin.

Division 1 Jaguars – captained by Duane Pettet. After gaining promotion the Jaguars were up against it in a strong grade. The team struggled and finished the season winless so will drop back to Division 2 next season and look to rebuild.

Division 4 Buccaneers – captained by Jonathan Hanson. The Buccaneers returned looking similar to last season and aiming to push on and win the grade. The team had some good performances but struggled to get games over the line at times, finishing the season with four wins, 10 losses and a massive nine abandoned games.

President's Grade BBBBs – captained by Scott Mason. Needing a large squad to account for the inevitable injuries that occur in this grade, the BBBBs started well, winning seven from 14 (with four abandoned) to qualify for the top half. The second portion of the season was tougher going with the team winning three from five completed games to finish fifth.

Cavaliers Twenty20 Grade Super Swingers – captained by Sam Price. Defending the Section 2 title the team won 12 and lost one on the way to going back-to-back. A great season for the team.

Cavaliers Twenty20 Grade Fozzies – captained by Kade Atkinson. After winning Section 3 last year the Fozzies looked to go one better in Section 2. They couldn't quite manage it, finishing a very good second to the Super Swingers. The team won 10, lost three and tied once over the course of the season.

A priority for the committee remains the need to secure a long-term home for the club that includes multiple playing pitches close to a pavilion and practise facilities. Also, in the interim, greater usage of the pavilion situated on the prime real estate that is Hagley Oval is needed to ensure a strong club culture is maintained.

Thank you to everyone on the committee for all the hard work they do to ensure the season runs smoothly and have supported whatever I have needed this season to get our sides out on the park.

Congratulations to all of the players who made representative sides, and to those players who achieved individual milestones throughout the season. Some that I particularly want to acknowledge are:

- Nicholas Hendrie, Aaron Johnstone and James Tapper for making the Metro Premier men's team of the year.
- Aaron Johnstone won the Chattel Hayes Memorial Challenge Trophy for the 11th time for most dismissals by a Premier men's wicket-keeper. His haul of nine in the final round got him over the line.

Women's Club Captain's Report

The season got off to a great start with further growth in player numbers in both female sections, retaining Saints' status as the largest female club outside of Auckland. The number of women's teams increased from two to three and the juniors stayed steady at six sides.

We were thrilled when Jodie Dean decided to move to Saints; she is a great prospect for the future of Canterbury Cricket and had a good year batting and bowling for the Magicians. It was also fabulous to welcome Ocean Bartlett (captain of the Central Districts Under-19 women) post-Christmas.

Our strong links with Manawatu culminated in us hosting two women's teams, who came down to play against us and some other side on the first weekend of the season. Manawatu brought down a strong Premier women's representative team to play us (minus our Magicians) and also a high school-aged team which played against our young Year 9 side. The games were all very close but Manawatu came out on top; next season we will field slightly stronger teams. A great time was had by all and some relationships have started to form as a result.

Our Under-16 side needed some stronger competition after winning all but one of their games quite easily. The highlight for them was a trip to Nelson during Canterbury Show Weekend to play the Nelson high school girls rep side.

The weather forecast was terrible and it looked likely that we would not get any games in, however we did. After the first game was rained out we headed indoors at Saxton Oval and split the two sides into three mixed teams and had a round-robin tournament followed by a barbecue. We then got outside and played a great game which ebbed and flowed but we came out victorious in the end.

The last day we got to play on the oval and use the facilities, a real treat for the girls (although just a couple of weeks earlier several were playing on Bert Sutcliffe Oval). This game was less competitive and was more a chance to give players who had not got much opportunity a chance to shine.

Again it was a really close game but Nelson was victorious in this case. Nelson also came down to Christchurch to see one of the Women's World Cup games and this allowed another game for our U16 girls – another exciting game which went right to the last ball for a result. Next season we will take a Year 7/8 girls team and a high school girls team up to Nelson during Canterbury Show Weekend.

We are also building strong links with the junior girls from Rangiora Cricket Club and in two more seasons we will see those girls start to trickle through to our U16 girls team.

We continue to be very proud of the achievements of Amy Satterthwaite and Lea Tahuhu as two of the world's top cricketers. This season Gabby Sullivan earned her maiden call-up to the New Zealand women's team for their ODIs versus England. Gabby was also awarded one of the eight White Ferns development contracts for 2021/22. Unfortunately, she sat the season out injured. Another ex-Saints player, Claudia Green, was also offered one of the contracts and she went on tour to England with the White Ferns.

Our Social T20 women are a great side that manage themselves and are nearly always at the top of the table. They did finish the season equal top with Lancaster Park, losing to them in the minor final on the last ball. It was great to see the runs and wickets being spread around, showing the depth that we are building, whereas most teams rely on only one or two players to fire every week.

The junior girls are well managed and developing great talent with good numbers. Well done to Trish and Matthew for having a well organised development section of the club.

Overall it was a great season with some strong players coming through the U16 ranks, many of whom should make the Canterbury U19 squad in coming years. The hardest part of the season was when we had to abandon several games post-Christmas when Omicron swept through the teams, especially our Premier Women. In addition, all but one of our Magicians were unavailable due to injuries or international duties. This meant that making the finals of the one-day competition was very difficult. However, we did win the Kirsty Bond Series.



Top Individual Performances

This summer was relatively light on individual milestones compared to previous years, in part due to there being far more days wiped out either by terrible weather or Covid variants.

Natalie Cox scored another early season ton; it's her fourth in the month of October (nobody in the last two decades matches that) and it's her fifth for the Premier women, all in the space of 13 innings in 12 months. Her lead atop the batting board only lasted a week however, as Greg Dawson's career-best 147* against Sydenham on the Nursery ground took over for the remainder of the season. It was his eighth Premier century, going ahead of Chris Harris into fifth on the Saints all-time ladder and he now has Frank O'Brien's record of 13 in his sights.

The club's most consistent and prolific run scorer during the season was newcomer Nic Hendrie and he was rewarded with a maiden Saints ton in the penultimate Premier two-day round.

Matthias Paltridge celebrated his 50th game for the club with his maiden ton (in his 61st innings). Tyler Lortan's 114 was his maiden Premier one-day ton and third overall. James Southby too scored his third for the club, becoming only the third Saint in 17 years to score a century in three consecutive seasons (joining Joel Turner, four for the Buccaneers, 2016-20; and Pierre Flavell, four for BBBBs, 2009-12).

Six-fors were harder to come by than ever, with only one past summer (2011/12) recording fewer than this year's two. Both came in the first month of the season, with the first being taken by a last-minute call-up for the Jaguars. Blake Barrett's 6-22 was the first five-for in a player's maiden morning grade men's appearance since Elliot Anderson-Evan took 5-39 for the 2B Cobras in 2015/16. His spell was enough to sit atop the bowling leaderboard for the rest of the season, achieving it on the same day that Greg Dawson produced the club's best knock.

Matt Aspinall's career-best figures of 6-31 came a week after Barrett's six-for. It was his second such bag and he's only the eighth bowler in the last 20 years to take a six-for in back-to-back seasons. Going with the three first-innings victims he snared, his 9-57 off 21 overs for the Sabres against Sydenham were the best match figures in the club.

The best figures from the other grades were 5-2 by Tim Jackson for the Buccaneers against the Richmond Rhinos, in what was just his third ever bowl for the club. Nicole Hay's career best of 5-5 for the Social T20 women against North West-Southern Districts was the top spell in the women's and shortest-format sections.

Robin James produced the best all-round one-day performance with 75* and 4-19 off eight for the BBBBs against Merivale-Papanui Gold. The best all-round two-day contribution came from Jack Harper with

99 runs for once out and 7-42 off 20 overs for the Premier men against Burnside West University. Matt Cameron very nearly became just the second Fozzies player to achieve a rare Cavaliers "double retirement" when he was dismissed for 44 and took 3-13 off four against the Heathcote Blazers. Batsmen in that grade have to retire at the end of the over they reach 40, and likewise can't bowl any further overs after taking their third wicket. Kade Atkinson scored 62* and took 3-13 off three against a Burnside team last year to be the first.

The sole hat-trick of the season flew under the radar for most but was special nonetheless. With the last three balls of her new-ball spell for the Premier women against Sydenham, Lea Tahuhu knocked the stumps over. Returning to the bowling crease 26 overs later, she cleaned up the No. 11 with her first ball, thus completing a rare double hat-trick. All the victims in her 5-15 were bowled and it was her last appearance before going off to the World Cup with the White Ferns. It's the first such double hat-trick since Scott Mason in 2017/18 and the previous one before that happened to be taken by Lea's wife, Amy Satterthwaite, back in 2009/10.



The Premier squad had achieved tremendous success in the 2020/21 season, winning all three available titles and were now tasked with the small feat of defending them.

The squad for the season was relatively unchanged, with only one debutant (Max Chaplin), Ian Souness playing his first full season and Matt Holstein would be lost to injury after just two games.

Twenty20 Competition

Saints would open this competition with a convincing win over rivals Burnside, dismissing them for just 54 with opening bowlers James Tapper (5-16) and Lachie Harper (4-12) doing the damage. Saints would chase the total inside 12 overs.

Three further victories of chasing totals under 100 would see the side qualify for the semi-finals with four wins and two losses.

The semi-final would see a repeat of the opening fixture against Burnside. Winning the toss and electing to bowl, the bowling attack would stand up again dismissing Burnside for 121 with the wickets shared, however notable figures of 3-14 for Tapper. The total was chased in emphatic fashion, led by Nic Hendrie (57 off 32).

The final would be played against Old Boys Collegians, who had previously beaten us in the round robin match. We were put in to bat and could only muster 135, built around Tyler Lortan's 69, however the total was deemed light on the high-scoring Nursery Ground.

Despite two early wickets from Tapper, Old Boys formed a strong partnership with two key players. Cruising at 100/2 the next three overs would see three wickets fall, two taken by Jack Harper, changing the game to 118/3.

Old Boys were still in control with over three overs remaining and needing just 17 runs. Saints got their tails up and started to apply pressure that saw the batting side go into their shells. Lachie Harper would bowl the final over with six runs required. Harper and the team held their nerve earning a fantastic comeback victory to successfully defend the first title of the season.

One-day Competition

The side's performances varied in the early stages of the competition, however there were some great individual performances. A century from Lortan and 5-13 by Tapper would spearhead a convincing victory over Sydenham.

The team missed out on a semi-final spot by one point and will rue some missed opportunities. The summer was not as resilient as the previous season with wet weather seeing three key matches abandoned.

Two-day Competition

The season began with four rounds of the two-day competition, keeping the same schedule as prior years. A strong start with outright victories over Heathcote and Sydenham saw the team well-positioned on the table. The latter victory including a five-wicket haul from Reid Gibbens and 147* by Greg Dawson. A hard-fought draw with East Shirley followed, before completing the first stage of the competition with a victory over Riccarton.

Sitting on top of the table by a small margin, red-ball cricket resumed mid-February against a strong Old Boys side. The Elmwood pitch was flat, making wickets hard to come by. Saints claimed first innings points after amassing 353/6, with a brilliant 128 scored by Hendrie. The match would finish a draw with Old Boys batting out the remainder of day two.

The fixture against Lancaster Park, which would have been a top-of-the-table clash, was abandoned due to Covid. The result would see Saints require an outright win and bonus points in the final match against Burnside. After being put in to bat, the top order fired with everyone contributing, but it was Jack Harper's 85* that helped drive us to a competitive total of 263.

Burnside made a steady start but when play resumed on day two Tapper (5-49) and Jack Harper (4-29) would see Burnside fall short of first innings, dismissed for 183. A long-standing record was broken during this innings with wicket-keeper Aaron Johnstone taking eight dismissals during the innings. During the season he would claim 35 dismissals in total, adding to his already mammoth tally.

After batting just 25 overs in the second innings Saints would set Burnside a very gettable 214 for victory. Early damage was done by Lachie Harper, dismissing both openers before cousin Jack continued his form by taking three. A tense finish was on the cards but Lortan was able to take 4-36 from a 10-over spell before Tapper would fittingly claim the final wicket of Carl Huyser to claim victory and secure the title!

Summary

The Premier side will farewell two players at the end of the season as they make a move to the UK for their OE adventure. Jack Harper and James Tapper have been instrumental over the years, both for their match-winning performances and contribution to the team culture. The side wishes them well in the UK and look forward to following their successes.

2021/22 was my first season as full-time captain for the Sabres, having taken over from Clem Gibbens towards the latter half of the 2020/21 season. I want to start by thanking him for all of the work he has put into this team and the club over a long period of time. Also thanks to the lads for making it an enjoyable season. I appreciate the effort everyone put in throughout the course of the season at both trainings and games during another Covid-affected season.

Speaking of Covid, pre-season kicked off a few weeks later than planned due to another outbreak. Once we got underway though it was full steam ahead into the start of the season with a settled squad looking to repeat the dose from last season.

Two-day Competition

The season started as usual with the two-day competition, with four rounds scheduled to be played to start the season and the three final rounds to finish it. Our season got off to a false start with the first week being cancelled due to rain.

We began a week later in the new white kit at the neutral venue of Polo 6 where we took on Sumner. We lost the toss and were sent out to field with both teams forfeiting their first innings to chase outright points.

Rather than the usual green seamer to open the season, this was tough work for our quicks on the artificial pitch meaning that spikes couldn't be worn. Tracking long wet grass onto the wicket meant that slipping and sliding was inevitable. Nevertheless all five bowlers used stood up and performed well, with everyone taking a wicket and no-one conceding more than 2.2 runs per over. We eventually bowled them out for 119 in the 66th over with Ian Souness the pick of the bowlers taking 4-27 from 19.1 overs.

That left us chasing 120 from about 50 overs, which sounded like it should be easy. We soon found it was going to be anything but, with our top order struggling we were quickly 25/4, Manpreet Sharma providing the only resistance with a nice looking 35. After a couple more quick wickets, Clem joined Luke Trigg at the crease and this partnership turned the game in our favour. Triggy knocked the ball around and rotated strike while Clem found a particularly effective method of

scoring in the slow outfield: going right over top of it. When Clem was dismissed for 38 off 19 we were only four runs away from victory. A couple of nervous overs later (including another wicket) we were home with our first victory. A great way to kick off the new season.

In the next round we had Sydenham at Sydenham. They had been our closest challenger in the two-day competition the previous season so we were keen to put in a good performance. We lost the toss again and were sent in to bat. A decent start saw all of the top four (Matthias Paltridge, Manpreet, Tommy Flavell and myself) all make it past 20, but none of us managed to get past 40. After a middle-order stumble some late power hitting from Shane Burton and Clem got us to a reasonable total of 218. Clem again top scoring with 55 off 35 balls.

In the field we got off to the perfect start with a wicket in the second over. Our seamers (Clem, Matt Aspinall and Shane) continued to pile the pressure on, taking seven wickets between them. The spinners then came in and cleaned up the tail, bowling them out for 144 and giving us a healthy first innings lead before the end of day one.

Come day two we were looking for some quick runs to set up for a declaration. Good contributions from Matthias (29) and T Flav (35) before some more power from Clem (37* off 18) let us declare just after lunch with a lead of 186. A great second innings bowling performance from us led by Matty taking 6-31 off 13, saw Sydenham bowled out for 86 to gather our second win of the season.

Next up we had Merivale-Papanui in our first home game of the season on Hagley 5. We lost the toss and were sent in to bat. We had also lost our top wicket taker from the previous season with Ian Souness earning a well deserved call up to the Premier men after an unfortunate injury to Matt Holstein. Apart from myself (59) and Robin James (47) we couldn't get going with the bat and struggled through to 175 all out.

That was always going to be tough to defend on a good Hagley wicket but we were making a good fist of it, reducing them to 83/5, led by Jack Anderson and Matty. After a decent middle-order partnership a flurry of wickets saw the equation reduced to 11 runs or one wicket. After a couple of half chances in the outfield and some near misses MP scraped over the line with a three-run first-innings lead.

A much better second innings performance saw us post 240/4 off just 43 overs with notable contributions from Sam Kearns (promoted up to open, scoring 42), Manpreet (42), Tom McClean (58) and Ryan (41*).

After our declaration MP were left 237 to win from 51 overs. In another effort that ebbed and flowed, we looked to be on top with MP 182/8 in the 40th over, but once again their tail end came to the rescue and they finished 230/9, our bowling effort led by Jando and Kearnsy (both with three wickets). The game drawn and our first points dropped of the season.

Our final two-day game before the white-ball cricket began was against Riccarton, again on Hagley 5. We lost the first day's play to rain so turned up on day two with it all to play for.

After losing the toss – I'm starting to see a bit of a trend here, maybe something for me to work on this off-season – both teams forfeited first innings and we were sent in to bat. We once again had a number of starts but no-one really kicked on to a big score. We posted 201, led by Jando (48), Hugh Symes (39) and Clem (39).

In reply Riccarton got off to a decent start before our spinners pegged them back (Sam with 4-22) before Jando came back for a second spell to rip through the tail and finish with 4-19 and cap off a great all-round day, bowling Riccarton out for 119 and securing our third victory of the campaign.

After a three-month window of white-ball cricket, we were back to the two-day competition in mid-February on top of the table but knowing that there was still plenty of work to do to secure back-to-back titles.

Our first game back was against Old Boys Collegians at Elmwood 4. For those that don't know the ground, it has a 40-metre boundary towards Heaton Street that a number of batsmen have used to their advantage over the years.

We lost the toss and were sent in to bat on a wicket that looked to be doing a bit. There were a few starts but not enough pushing on to a big score and we were bowled out for a disappointing 195. I managed to chip my way to a top score of 61.

With the ball we looked to be just starting to get the better of the conditions with Curtly Harper unplayable, before a rain shower came over and forced us from the field. When we returned the moisture on the surface seemed to help the ball skid onto the bat and the OBC batsmen got stuck into their work. After a couple of decent partnerships Jack Kane (on debut) and James Southby picked up a couple of wickets each to limit the damage to a 27-run deficit.

Knowing the competition was on the line we came out firing with the bat. Looking to post a total we could defend. Manny got us off to a good start (34), before James and Max Devonshire really took to the bowling. James finished 107* from 105 and Max 48* off just 18 we posted 281/5 off just 43 overs.

This left OBC 254 off 50 overs, what we thought was a reasonable target given the rate at which we had just shown runs could be scored, particularly when attacking the short boundary. Alas, it wasn't to be with OBC shutting up shop early and looking for a draw. We crowded the bat but OBC finished 210/6, our bowling effort led by Jack (3-50) and Matty (3-61), a great day two fightback coming up just short of securing the points we needed to help our title race.

Our next game against Lancaster Park was abandoned due to Covid running through their morning grade squad. This meant that the grade was now on a points per game average rather than total points, making the calculations the following fortnight that much more complicated.

Our final game of the season was against Burnside at home on Hagley 5. Knowing we would need to win outright, possibly with some bonus points depending on the result of the Sydenham versus OBC game, we were looking to come out strong.

Unfortunately we lost the coin flip again (finishing 0-6 in the red-ball competition in tosses), and were out to field. On a decent wicket, Burnside got off to a quick start but were quickly pegged back by the introduction of Hugh to the crease, finishing with 4-45 as Burnside were bowled out for 190. Our chase never really got going, stumbling along to be 143 all out, with Tommy being the only resistance scoring 57.

Come day two, we knew the game across town wasn't looking favourable with Sydenham looking strong favourites to beat OBC by an innings, meaning we would need to win outright by 10 wickets, or by seven wickets having chased a big enough score to earn extra batting bonus points.

The first job though was to bowl Burnside out, which we managed to do inside 30 overs thanks to a great effort from Curtly (5-40), and able support from Rogan Ross (2-23) and Max Chaplin (2-21).

This left us needing 162 to win, with the loss of three or fewer wickets making us champions. The chase got off to a solid start with myself (61) and Matthias (26) putting on 58 for the first wicket. Another contribution from Manpreet (33) had us in with a sniff but a few quick wickets put paid to that. We got across the line seven down, meaning we had secured a good win but fallen just short of backing up the title.

Our two-day campaign leaders were Will Southby (311 runs at 35), Manpreet Sharma (194 at 22), Clem Gibbens (171 at 43) and Matt Aspinall (22 wickets at 12), Jack Anderson (14 at 15) and Sam Kearns (11 at 13).

Twenty20 Competition

Our T20 competition got underway in late November with games against Merivale-Papanui and Lancaster Park. First up against MP we batted first, and after a slow start managed to build a decent middle-order partnership with Matthias top scoring with 26. We couldn't quite finish the innings off though and ended up 119/9, slightly below par.

A great start with the ball saw their captain removed second ball before Clem went on a rampage taking 3-18, before Tom McClean came on and took 2-16 from his four. We struggled to slow the runs from the other end though and MP managed to sneak home with three balls to spare.

Following that we were over to Hagley 2, but the less said about that game the better. We were terrible with the bat, being bowled out for 59, which LP chased down without the loss of a wicket inside the powerplay.

Next up we had our first midweek game against Burnside. Bowling first, a good team effort helped restrict Burnside to 101. After some top-order stumbles, we were steadied by Hugh with 28. A few more wickets saw us need 10 off the last two overs with only two wickets in hand. After some nervy moments including fill-in Tim Jackson attempting a reverse sweep, we made it past the target to get our competition back on track.

The next Saturday saw us take on Old Boys and Riccarton. First up against OBC, a good all-round bowling performance, highlighted by Matty taking 3-26, helped restrict OBC to 134.

A top-order collapse saw us fall to 9/4, before James (50 off 37) and Jono Hamilton (18, filling in from his usual Buccaneers duties) combined to get us back on track. Once they fell, Tom (34 off 24) and Sam (19* off 13) came in to finish the job for a great comeback victory.

That afternoon we took on Riccarton at Upper Riccarton, and bowling first we kept them to 148 with the wickets shared between the bowlers. Once again, we lost a couple of early wickets before Matthias (40 off 25) and James (57* off 37) combined to push us on towards victory. We pushed in to win with 15 balls to spare and take our campaign to three wins and two losses.

Our final midweek games was against Sumner at Hagley 5, were we won the toss and elected to bowl first. Sumner got off to a good start but were pegged back by Shane (4-26) and Clem (3-18) to keep them to 129.

In reply our chase never really got going, with wickets falling regularly and partnerships not able to get going. We ended up being bowled out for 119 with two balls to spare meaning we were going to have to win and hope that other results went our way to make the finals.

The last round-robin game was against Sydenham in a rain-reduced 16-over match. Bowling first we were able to restrict them to 73, with Matty, Sam and Tom picking up two wickets each. In reply we lost wickets throughout but got over the line through the cool head of Owen Rees.

This meant that we had finished third-equal on points but due to our earlier losses (particularly against LP) our net run rate was poor and we missed out on the semi-finals.

One-day Competition

The third competition we competed in was the one-day competition, which was scheduled to kick off in the final week before Christmas. In an event that was to foreshadow the rest of the competition, the week leading into the game was wet and all games were abandoned.

After a break for Christmas, we were back at it in early January, taking on Riccarton on Hagley 4. We were quickly back into our work, reducing them to 30/3. Despite some good middle-order partnerships we bowled and fielded well to restrict them to just 181/9 from their 50. In reply we always looked under control despite losing a few wickets and got home with four wickets and more than six overs to spare. The highlight with the bat was 54 from Nick Gibb, filling in from Christ's College.

Next up saw us take on Burnside at Burnside Park. We won the toss and elected to field. A good team effort led by Rob McClean with 4-26 off 10 helped keep Burnside to a reasonable 201/8. In reply our chase never got going with Shane the only one to reach double figures as we were bowled out for 82.

Our third completed game was against Sumner at St Leonards Square, for our longest road trip of the season. Sent in to bat by Sumner, we quickly made them regret that decision with Matthias batting brilliantly on his way to 126 to be last man out in the 50th over as we made 235. He received able support from James (46) and Shane (25) along the way. In reply Jando looked dangerous up top removing both openers on his way to collecting 3-27. The squeeze really came with Tom McClean entering the attack and collecting 4-26 off 10 as we bowled Sumner out for 160.

The rest of the season didn't go to plan with a default to Sydenham due to lack of players and washouts against LP and OBC meaning we narrowly missed out on the semi-finals with two wins, one loss, one default and three abandoned matches.

Our one-day campaign leaders were: Matthias Paltridge (126 runs at 126), Nick Gibb (54 at 54), James Southby (46 at 46) and Matt Aspinall (5 wickets at 20), Rob McClean (6 at 7) and Tom McClean (6 at 7).

A number of other players also contributed throughout the season to get us to where we ended up so thank you to everyone. A big congratulations to everyone who made their Sabres debut this season, it is great to have you on board.

Thank you to the club for providing us with the facilities to be able to do what we love week in, week out. We'll see you all in July for pre-season training at the new Hadlee Sports Centre.

After a successful maiden voyage the newly promoted Jaguars were ready to tackle Division 1 but, as it turned out, as the old adage goes, anything that could go wrong pretty much did go wrong.

Before and during the course of the season we lost the services of over half a dozen core team members due to promotions, unavailabilities, injuries and even an early-season club-switch in one instance. Covid reared its ugly head again to make it even more difficult as we were the side most affected whenever anyone across the morning grades had to self-isolate in quarantine.

During the initial two-day phase over the opening two months we fought hard and were actually pretty competitive for the most part. We gifted away a couple of golden victory opportunities due to a lack of ruthlessness and a shocking streak of drop catches. Knocking over teams in the second innings remains an Achilles' heel in this format.

By the time we hit late November however, player numbers ebbed and the Jags acutely bore the brunt of things, with scraping together a full XI becoming nigh on impossible.

This extra handicap of often playing with nine or ten up to the Christmas break was too much to bear for our understrength, low-on-confidence line-up, who were already battling to stay competitive in a much stronger grade than before.

In the midst of this we did however manage to make Marist-Harewood's first XI earn their victory against us despite us only having nine, of which half of us closer resembled an All Blacks front row from the '90s than prime Christian Cullen.

Results were punishing, to say the least. The silver lining to these clouds was we were often put out of our misery fairly quickly, allowing us to go and support the Sabres and Prems rather than prolonging the pain any more than strictly necessary!

The New Year brought a bit more resolve, with a number of much younger players queuing to help the side keep ticking over, though the outcomes were pretty much still set in stone.

Losing five of our last eight weeks due to a combination of bad weather and Covid was probably a blessing in disguise, with the post-mortem analysis allowed to begin a fortnight before the actual end of the season. In what turned out to be our final game we at least made the eventual champion Halswell Vikings side work hard for long stretches to overcome us, before their two-day title could finally be confirmed to be theirs.

Not surprisingly, the stats sheet makes for fairly grim reading, with only six batsmen reaching triple-figure tallies and just the two bowlers with double figures in the wickets column for the summer. The stand-out was Piers Landon-Lane, who easily topped our run charts and scored three of the four team's half-centuries as well as doing a tidy job behind the sticks once again. For his efforts he took out team player of the year honours.

Elliot Anderson-Evans was the rock with the ball again, having to do the lion's share of the work in a line-up that had even fewer seam options than last year. He had more than double the tally than the next best, our top spinner George Devine.

Remarkably, we had one seam bowling performance good enough to win a club award this year, with Zane Phillips' contacts list working wonders on a Friday evening: fill-in Blake Barrett peeled off a brilliant 6-22 against Merivale-Papanui for the club's best figures of the season in his only appearance.

Thanks to the whopping 18 players who made one-off appearances to help us out, namely: James Alabaster, Blake Barrett, Matthew Davis, Max Devonshire, Pierre Flavell, Clem Gibbens, Stephen Goodwin, Curly Harper, Jack Kane, Finn McCormack Young, Achindra Molamure, Cameron O'Brien, Daniel Patterson, Rogan Ross, Alex Scott, Manpreet Sharma, Henry Stewart and Toby van Onselen. They contributed 175 runs at 9.21, including the only 50 of the season not scored by Piers (58 by Achindra), five catches and 15 wickets at 23.53.

Having last year started what was to be at least a three-year project to revive the Saints thirds and shore up our morning grade talent pipeline, this year was a huge set of roadworks that has deviated us off course after the highly encouraging start to the journey.

However, if there's any learnings from being a long-suffering Penrith Panthers fan who has endured decades of heartache and obscurity, it's that I can remain firmly (and delusionally?) optimistic that we can and will resurrect something tangible out of the ashes of this campaign. Some strategic recruitment and a serious investment in talent development will eventually set us on the right path to where we want to be in the long haul. Looking forward to rebounding in style, back down in our happier hunting ground of Division 2!

A 'season of two halves' is the best way to describe how the Premier women's team performed throughout the 2021/22 season. Once again, an enlarged squad was utilised across the three competitions; the 50-over one-day competition and the T20 and new 'Fizz' 40 over format both of which comprised the Kirsty Bond series.

The 2021/22 season for the St Albans Under 16 Girls' team was an outstanding success in many factors. 

Treasurer's Report

The accounts presented to members recorded a deficit of \$2,530 for the 2021/22 season. This compares to the previous season's surplus of \$8,152 despite revenue increasing by \$10,743 from the prior year with Grants — other (\$23,545), Subscriptions (\$5,367) and Pavilion hire (\$7,402) having the largest increases. However, the deficit incurred as a result of increased expenditure over the year with specifically material costs — clothing increasing by \$17,641 from the previous year. Other significant increases of expenditure items included Material costs — gear & balls (\$2,311) and licenses (\$4,337).

Much of the year's financial results, both positively and negatively, can be attributed to a disruptive year with the hosting of the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup restrictions were placed on access to the clubrooms. Also, the abovementioned surplus of expenditure on material costs — clothing ensures the majority of teams are now wearing updated club uniforms, a cost not expected to be incurred for another few years.

The position of the club at year end reports net assets decreasing to \$81,523 compared to \$84,053 at previous year end. Despite the reduced net assets position, the balance sheet reports an increase in the liquidity ratio of 39.46 (current assets of \$44,714 compared to current liabilities of \$1,133) compared to 19.26 the previous year. This effectively means the club can pay its immediate debts 39 times over, an excellent position to be in.

Property, plant and equipment continue to reduce at the rate of depreciation with the only significant asset purchased in the year being a club laptop. The pavilion as usual forms the bulk of the assets with a closing book value of \$33,303.

Bruce Harris again provided his time to perform the auditing function for the club and once again, we thank Bruce for providing an invaluable service for the club. However, Bruce has notified this year would be his last year as the club auditor and enquiries are now proceeding for a new club auditor.

Overall, it has been a challenging year financially with events acknowledged above. I look forward to a 2022/23 year where the club can build on the momentum gathered from the excellent foundations now set in place.



Notes to the Financial Statements

for the year ended 31 May 2021

Note 1 - Statement of Accounting Policies

St Albans Cricket Club is a non-profit organisation. The financial statements are general purpose and prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice.

Unless otherwise stated the accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of earnings and financial position on a historical cost basis have been followed.

The entity qualifies for differential reporting because the Club meets the framework for differential reporting as the Club is not publicly accountable and is small. The club has taken advantage of all differential reporting exemptions.

Changes in accounting policies: There have been no changes in accounting policies which have been applied on bases consistent with those used in previous years.

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

Accounts Receivable are stated at their estimated realisable value. Debts which are considered uncollectible are written off. There is no other provision for doubtful debts.

Stock on Hand - Bar Supplies has been valued at lower of cost or net realisable value.

Stock on Hand - Balls has been valued at lower of cost or net realisable value.

Equipment on Hand has been valued by the Committee.

Sponsorship: Sponsorship for services rendered to the club are accounted for as revenue and expense at values approximating the cost of the service provided.

Property, Plant and Equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation has been calculated using the rates shown in the Property, Plant and Equipment Schedule (Note 2). Material, Nets and Junior Material have not been depreciated as the committee charges all repairs, maintenance and replacements to expenses.

A mortgage security over the pavilion is held by Westpac Banking Corporation. At 31 May 2022 there were no advances drawn against this security (2021 - nil).

Related Party transactions: The Committee are also members of the Club and pay subscriptions on the same basis as other members. Services provided have been supplied on normal commercial terms.




